

CITY COUNCIL STARTS WORK ON BOND ISSUE

Preliminary work on the \$70,000 bond issue to provide funds for another fire station in Klamath Falls will be started by the present city council and until the new council takes office it will continue with the plans. It was stated last night by Mayor T. H. Watters.

However, the new mayor, F. H. Cofer, and the new councilmen, A. B. Moore, E. W. Vanlics, James D. Smith and H. M. Bagley, will be asked to sit in on this matter in order that they may continue with the bond issue after the first of the year, according to the mayor.

The present council will do no work on the armory bond issue, Mayor Watters said.

Ordinance Amended
A clause of the ordinance regulating city traffic was amended at council meeting last night to provide a 36-foot strip on the south-western and northwestern corners of each intersection on Main street from Second street to Esplanade to provide a cleared space to be used as loading zones for passenger vehicles. A representative from the Klamath Falls Bus company was present and explained that the company had been having trouble in loading and unloading passengers on account of cars parked too near the intersections. This amendment also prohibits parking within 20 feet of hotel or theater entrances, 10 feet of fire hydrants, two feet from street corners, and prohibits parking of vehicles on the east side of Fifth street from Walnut to Klamath avenue.

Discuss Airport
In answer to a question from Councilman Van Camp concerning the opening of the new municipal airport, Mayor Watters explained that the work is still in the hands of the chamber of commerce airport committee, but he did not believe that a formal opening is planned because of the cost. He said he understood that several Ford planes are expected to visit Klamath Falls about November 19 and there may be an informal ceremony opening the port at this time.

Cemetery Plotted
A plot of Linkville cemetery shows a number of graves located in the right of way of Lexington street. Feasibility of closing the street or changing the right of way was discussed, but no definite action was taken, since City Engineer Kelley stated that it will be necessary to replat it and in the plans the vacant sections of land would be marked into lots.

No Reports
There were no reports from the various committees, but the street committee was authorized to make necessary repairs on the macadam paving on Third street as soon as possible.

Miscellaneous
Mayor Watters announced a budget committee meeting for Thursday afternoon at 3 o'clock and reminded the council of the hearing for A. Botti Friday afternoon at 2 o'clock when he will be asked to show cause why his license should not be revoked. Botti was recently arrested and fined after liquor had been found on his premises.

Building Permits
Building permits for the past week reached the lowest mark in months with only three permits allowed, aggregating the small sum of \$500.

New Officers Present
Mayor-elect F. H. Cofer, E. B. Moore and H. M. Bagley, who will take up their new duties as councilmen the first of the year, were present at last night's session.

On the return trip the buses will leave Corvallis about 3 p. m., and Klamath Falls people can board their sleeper at any time during the evening. It will be attached to train 15 and set out here for occupancy until 8 a. m.

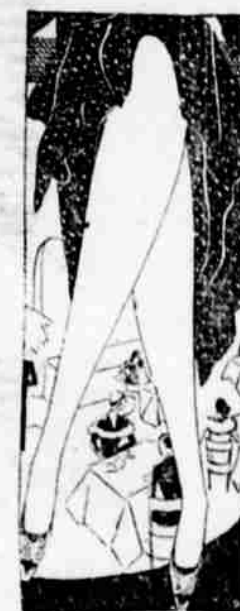
