

VETERINARIAN HAS AUTHORITY TO BAR SCHOOL

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 12 (AP)—On the basis of information furnished by Dr. W. H. Little, state veterinarian, the attorney general has ruled that the veterinarian has authority to bar a school from conducting a "breeding school" in this state.

Little furnished the attorney general with a pamphlet advertising the Graham-Kansas City enterprise, in which appears the statement that "we guarantee to teach any average breeder or herdsman how to make barren cows breed." Graham has advertised a school in Portland from November 11 to 15, and Dr. Little says that Graham is giving instruction which is not provided for through the state schools or colleges of Oregon, and that he has no license to practice veterinary medicine or surgery in the state.

Relates Graphic Tale of Tragic Fight With Death

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It was possible to give him, drivers sold a graphic story of how the Brooklyn captain, and of the morning hours that followed.

Tremendous waves, he said, beat the bow of the little 33-ton schooner, making steering impossible. Eventually, he related, something must have happened to the engine. The one remaining lifeboat was launched, but it filled with water. The cook, a waiter, a fireman and the engineer could not move the lifeboat because of the water shipped.

Seas splintered vessel.

The pilot house, and then the superstructure were torn away as the angry seas pounded the vessel from side to side.

"The next time the Brooklyn turned over, she came keel up," he said. "The men climbed the side. I saw the skipper (Captain T. J. Tuftesson) in the water and some of the men alongside of him. They looked glassy-eyed."

A wave struck the hull, sweeping Greve and his mates into the water.

"Chris Sandler said it was awful to die," he related, and he answered, "we'll do the best we can."

His three days on the water were filled with wandering.

"I swam as far as I could to get away from the main wreckage," he said. "Later I found a piece of bulkhead, four feet wide and eight feet long, with a beam six by six inches standing out two feet on each side. Then I took in two pieces of one by four inch plank and used them for paddles."

Tells Unanswered.

He said he was carried opposite Trinidad head, 20 miles from the scene of the wreck. Saturday night, he could see lights from the mainland, but though he called until I thought my lungs would burst no one seemed to hear me."

Sunday at daybreak he was opposite the old whaling station at Trinity, and summoned all his strength to paddle to shore, only to be fought back by sea currents.

Waves Piled Over Him.

Waves piled over him, throwing him against the wreckage, breaking his skin and tearing his clothes.

"I don't remember much else," he finished.

Mrs. Greve said in San Francisco, twice before the seas had him and his boat in its grip, but he came away alive.

In 1922 the schooner Girlie Maloney crashed on the rocks near Albion. The crew swam ashore while Greve waited through the night. With dawn, seeing the boat was fast, and in peril of breaking up, he swam the three miles in oil skins and boots.

Last year his boat, the Prentiss, lost a propeller near Coos Bay, Ore. It drifted 48 hours before a steamer came to its aid and towed it into port.

ENGLAND AND INDIA CONFER

LONDON, Nov. 12, (AP)—King George, ruler over the mightiest empire of all time, today convened representatives of Britain and India in a conference which during the coming winter will attempt to evolve a government for the Asiatic empire satisfactory to its restless millions.

His majesty, expressing anxiety at the course of events in India, told his hearers he would follow their deliberations with closest attention, but with confidence in their success.

"It is my hope that the future government of India," he said, based on foundations of mutual obligations and their recognition and fulfillment, "will give expression to her honorable aspirations."

The formal, imposing opening of the deliberations was held amidst the gorgeous royal trappings of the royal gallery of the house of lords, official home of the British parliament.

Eighty-six delegates were present. Of these, 57 were from the province of India, and 16 from native Indian states, including nine powerful ruling princes. Thirteen were members of the British parliament.

Meanwhile, in far-off Hindustan, Mahatma Gandhi, picturesque and ascetic leader of the widespread Indian revolt for absolute independence, was watching proceedings in London from an Altona prison cell. He and the millions of rebellious, resentful Indians who follow his word, were not represented at the assembly, which they voted months ago to boycott.

Police questioned Mrs. Paris throughout the afternoon, while detectives attempted to determine whether the stabbing of Mrs. Bowles was murder or suicide. Death by her own hand was possible, detectives believed, but until further questioning they refused to admit its probability.

Detectives announced that Mrs. Paris, who was known, too, as Irma Louks, was making a statement accounting for her actions. Bowles was being questioned in another room.

Police who first investigated case said it appeared to them Mrs. Bowles killed herself after a quarrel in the apartment.

Bowles called a mortuary, his attorney, and then the police. Detectives did not reach the apartment until more than an hour after the tragedy. When they did arrive they found the kitchen had been cleaned.

Patched together from statements made by the two principals in the case it appeared Mrs. Bowles had gone to the apartment of Mrs. Paris to question her.

The Roll Call during the year ending June 30, 1930, resulted in 4,139,956 members in the United States.

The Red Cross is chartered by the Congress of the United States. In the activities of the Red Cross are reflected the wisdom and humanitarianism of Theodore Roosevelt, of William Howard Taft, of Woodrow Wilson, of Warren Harding, of Calvin Coolidge and of Herbert Hoover; the men who, from their White House offices, have stamped their own personal approval—and the approval of the American people—on Red Cross stewardship.

The Roll Call show that the Red Cross, in the past year, gave emergency relief to nearly 90,000 persons and rehabilitation aid to more than 8,000 families. The Red Cross is supported largely by the dollar membership of each individual. Fifty cents of every dollar is sent to the National Red Cross and fifty cents is added to the local Red Cross fund.

The Annual Roll Call began Armistice Day, November 11, and extended Thanksgiving. During the week of November 11, an enthusiastic group of workers will visit every home in Klamath Falls to extend a personal invitation to participate in this work for humanity through membership.

PORTLAND, Nov. 12, (AP)—The public hearing before the Child Welfare commission on charges of cruelty at the Oregon state training school for boys, was opened in the auditorium today.

Estes Snedecor, acting chairman of the hearing, announced the public would be evicted if any demonstrations were made. The auditorium was packed.

Felix Digregorio, 19, Portland, a former inmate of the school, was the first to take the stand.

Searchers Were Armed.

Digregorio told the commission of being sent with other boys to hunt six lads who had escaped the school. He was not armed, he said, but his companions carried loaded guns. Mrs. Nina Bateman, Portland, who worked two years at the school, told of alleged unsanitary conditions in the kitchen at the school, of limiting rations, and she corroborated the story that boys were made to wear the Oregon boot.

Reports of the use of the "Oregon boot," and other alleged tortures, were to be read at the hearing. A transcript of testimony taken at the hearing before the state board of control in Salem recently, was placed in the hands of the commission, headed by Dr. Phillip Parsons, Eugene.

Design of New Bank Is Here to Attend Opening

chemists daily unlock new possibilities in the manufacture and processing of food products. These same sources are finding new possibilities in food substitution and imitation.

"More important than either mechanical or scientific changes affecting agriculture is the remarkable development in merchandising and distribution. Mass production, mass purchasing and mass distribution are dislocating farm methods and threatening many rural communities with disaster if not almost destruction."

Conservation Urged.

One of Taber's outstanding declarations was for establishment of a bureau of conservation in the department of agriculture to protect the natural resources of the nation. He further urged immediate transfer of the bureau of reclamation and irrigation to the department of agriculture from the department of the interior, that present conflicting policies, as between a surplus in agricultural products and the opening up of new farm lands, may be checked.

Gives Five Major Ideas.

The national grange master presented his ideas of steps necessary to accomplish the economic readjustment he said was needed at the present time, stating them as follows:

- 1—Stabilization of values.
- 2—A higher price level for farm commodities.
- 3—More fairly distributed burden of taxation.
- 4—Extension of the federal farm loan system.
- 5—Readjustment of the nation's freight rate structure.

Taber characterized the eighteenth amendment "as the greatest moral reform of the century" and said it must be sustained. Declaring its supporters must awaken or they would lose the fruits of their great victory, the grange leader said.
