

INSANE FATHER
SLAYS FAMILY
AND KILLS SELF

UNIONTOWN, Pa., Nov. 12. (AP)—Three children were shot and killed today by their father, R. W. Playford, 55, a prominent Uniontown lawyer and banker, who then killed himself, apparently while suffering under the delusion the family was facing poverty. Playford's wife was wounded probably fatally.

The dead, besides the father, are Nancy, 13, Margaret, 10, and Pauline, 8. Mrs. Playford, 45, before her marriage was Nancy Stirling, member of a prominent Baltimore, Md., family.

A maid in the Playford home was first to discover the victims. The girl, Viola White, said that she heard shots about 7 a. m., but believed the reports were caused by heating of radiators in the house. A short time later, she said, she saw Playford leave the children's room and enter his own. She heard another shot, and upon investigating, found her employer's body on the floor.

All of the bodies except that of the man were in their beds. The children and Mrs. Playford apparently were sleeping when the shots were fired.

Playford was a director of the Fayette Title and Trust company which merged recently with the National Bank of Fayette county. He also was a director of the merged bank. Police said they believed his business worries had caused temporary insanity.

The condition of Mrs. Playford was such physicians said she could not live. She was not taken to hospital, so critical was her wound. The two oldest children and Playford apparently were killed instantly. The youngest child lived for a short time.

San Francisco Trip
Named by S. P. Co.

Announcement of a special \$10 round-trip excursion rate to San Francisco, November 21, was made Wednesday by C. M. Biggs, Southern Pacific district freight and passenger agent.

The round trip fare from Chiloquin will be \$10.50; from Lakeview, \$12; from Alturas, \$12, and from Dorris, \$9.50, with proportionate rates as far south as Red Bluff, Cal.

This is the first excursion to the bay region conducted by the Southern Pacific since July. The tickets will have a 10-day return limit, and will be good on all trains leaving Klamath Falls November 21. The tickets will also be honored on the Cascade with an extra fare of \$1.50.

Coming at this time, the excursion will not only give Klamath residents a chance to visit the bay region, but will also enable them to attend the Stanford-California game November 22.

Special sleepers will be attached to the Klamath, leaving this city at 7:05 p. m. and arriving in San Francisco at 5:50 a. m., Saturday, November 22. Reservations for these special sleepers are now being taken at the Main street ticket office of the depot ticket office, it was stated.

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 12. (AP)—State Treasurer Kay today received from Chase National Bank of New York, fiscal agent for the state of Oregon, nine bags containing paid coupons detached from Oregon state high-way bonds. The shipments practically represents the peak of payment of state bonds and coupons through the fiscal agency. It weighed 77.5 pounds and cost \$11.25 in express charges, and represents about \$2,000,000 in cancelled bonds and interest on bonded obligations.

To Ian MacLaren belongs the credit for being the first actor announced for the very carefully selected cast to enact R. C. Sheriff's famous war play "Journey's End," before the camera and microphone. After a test he was at once selected by James Whale, director of the Tiffany-Gainsborough production showing until Thursday at the Vox theater, for the role of Lieutenant Osborne.

Ian MacLaren had played the role of the Christ for three successive summers in the Pilgrimage play that is a yearly event in Hollywood and comparable to the Passion play at Oberammergau, and for that he was famous in the film colony. In New York he was noted as a tremendously versatile and gifted actor. He did many splendid things with the Neighborhood Players in Grand street, such as "The Little Clay Cart," "The Romantic Young Lady," "The Mob," and "The Dybbuk." He also played Antonio in David Belasco's all-star production of "The Merchant of Venice" and the lead in Bernard Shaw's "Saint Joan." In pictures he has been seen in "Yolanda," "Under the Red Robe," and Valentino's "Monseigneur Beaucaire." MacLaren was born in Lynmouth, North Devon, Eng., and was educated in Queen Mary's school at Dalsing Stoke, Hampshire. He was quite an athlete in his school days, excelling at cricket and football. It was this ability that brought him to the attention of Sir Frank Benson, famous Shakespearean actor in England, who was also a great lover of sports. Benson offered the young graduate a part in his current play, "Othello," which he had eagerly accepted. He has followed the vocation of an actor ever since.

Germans Capture
Trophies at Horse
Show in New York

NEW YORK, Nov. 12. (AP)—The international military trophies again are bound for Germany, but the honor of leading the stables at the National Horse Show, which closed last night, remains with Mr. and Mrs. Paul Moore's Seaton Hackney farm of Morristown, N. J.

The Seaton Silks, exhibiting one of the largest strings of thoroughbreds shown at the show, carried off sixteen firsts, including two championships. Second to the New Jersey Hackney farm was P. J. Lawler of Cynwyd, Pa., with two championships, and twelve firsts.

The sensation of the show, however, was the brilliant showing made by Mrs. W. P. Roth, Redwood City, Calif., with her small stable of fourteen thoroughbreds. Whereas most of the other exhibitors limited activities to one division, Mrs. Roth showed both in the saddle and harness classes, winning two championships, and ten firsts.

Baker Man Pleads
Guilty To Charge
Of Slaying Wife

BAKER, Ore., Nov. 12. (AP)—Sentence will be passed Saturday on George K. McGlennen who yesterday pleaded guilty to a charge of second degree murder. He shot his wife to death last August 1. The penalty for second degree murder is life imprisonment.

McGlennen was indicted early this month on a first degree count which carries the death penalty, but several days ago offered to plead guilty on a lesser charge.

He shot his wife to death and seriously wounded Harold Gikison, a roomer in their lodging house, then turned the pistol on himself, inflicting a superficial wound on his head.

His name recently was suggested as head of the Zionist movement but he has so far given no indication he will retire from the bench to direct it.

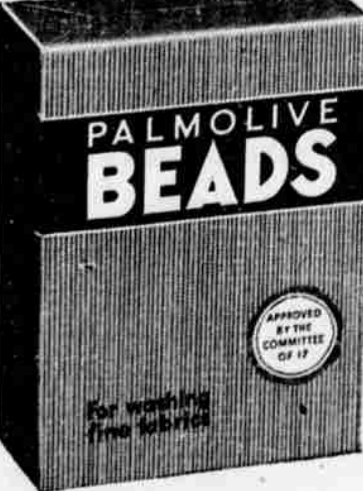
