

REED SAYS SMALL HOPE FOR TAX CUT

Also Deplores Proposal
For Special Session
Of Congress
PRESIDENT CONFERS
WITH SEN. ROBINSON

Carter Glass Hits G. O. P.
And Chides The
Democrats

WASHINGTON, Nov. 12, (AP)—Senator Reed, republican, Pennsylvania, said today he saw no prospects of continuing the one per cent income tax cut and favored, as one remedy for the business depression, repeal of the capital gains tax.

The Pennsylvania is a member of the important finance committee, which would have to pass on any continuance of the cut to one-half per cent of the tax on incomes last year.

Special Session Opposed
He advocated a speeding up of the federal building and naval construction programs.

"It would be a great calamity to business and industry to have a special session of congress and we are to do everything in our power to prevent it," Reed said. "That's true if it is democratic, republican, or any other kind of congress."

Pledge Is Praised
Senator Reed characterized the pledge of democratic leaders to cooperate with the administration in any measures looking to economic recovery as a "fine patriotic attitude."

Believing democrats to be opposed to an extra session, Senator Glass, democrat, Virginia, suggested today President Hoover sound out members of his party on their attitude before trying to bind up the democrats against a special session.

Glass Makes Statement
President Hoover has written to Senator Robinson of Arkansas, the democratic leader, to determine his views and those of the minority party on a program which will assure completion of the necessary legislation at the approaching short session of congress.

"I do not know of a democrat who wants an extra session," commented Glass today. "But I certainly have heard some republicans talking about the extra session. I think Senator Robinson would be justified in replying to Mr. Hoover with a suggestion that the president fix up his own party first."

Chides Democrats
Senator Glass yesterday took to task the seven democratic leaders who issued the pronouncement of cooperation, chiding them for their "apology for a democratic victory" in the last election.

The Virginian made it clear today, however, he did not intend to support any obstruction moves. He emphasized he was speaking of the time when the newly elected congress steps into office.

The Virginia senator said he had received notice today from many democrats in congress of support for his statement of yesterday.

MEDFORD SHIPS TWO CARLOADS TURKEYS

MEDFORD, Nov. 12, (AP)—Two carloads of southern Oregon turkeys, about 50,000 pounds, representing one-third of the valley crop, have been shipped to New York markets for the Thanksgiving trade. Local turkey growers are guaranteed 29 cents a pound with a return of all over that price for top birds. Many of the valley growers are holding their birds for later shipment in hope of better prices.

Coroner's Jury to Investigate Fatal Portland Triangle

PORTLAND, Nov. 12, (AP)—An investigation which Dr. Earl Smith, coroner, said "will blast the case to the bottom," was under way today into the death of Mrs. Leone Bowles, 33, prominent socially, who died yesterday with a knife in her heart. The tragedy occurred in the apartment of Mrs. Irma Loucks Paris, 25, former secretary to Nelson C. Bowles, husband of the dead woman.

Mrs. Paris and Bowles were present when Mrs. Bowles died. They declare she stabbed herself. She had gone to the apartment to discuss the relationship of Bowles and his former secretary.

Officials yesterday were inclined to the suicide theory. Today they appeared considerably confused and uncertain.

An inquest into the case, originally set for tomorrow, was postponed until next Tuesday in order to give time for the complete investigation demanded by the coroner and by friends and relatives of the dead woman.

Mr. and Mrs. Cronkhite, parents of the dead woman, said they considered it "strange" that Bowles had not notified them of the tragedy since. They said the first news they had was from Associated Press dispatches in Yakima.

"We do not believe our daughter would leave her two children voluntarily," Mrs. Cronkhite said. "We have known of Mr. Bowles' infatuation for Mrs. Paris for the past two years."

Mrs. Bowles left two daughters, Patsy, 6, and Sally, 7, years old.

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 12, (AP)—Representatives of the district attorney's office and Portland police today were gathering information to present to a coroner's jury which will be called to determine how Mrs. Leone Bowles, 33, Portland society matron, came to her death.

Mrs. Bowles, wife of Nelson C. Bowles, died from a stab wound yesterday in the apartment of Mrs. Irma Paris, 25, former secretary to Bowles. Bowles and Mrs. Paris, police said, both declared Mrs. Bowles stabbed herself. Dr. Earl Smith, coroner, said all evidence pointed to suicide but Stanley Myers, district attorney ordered an inquest.

Bowles, police ascertained, told them he and wife had been separated for a month. At Mrs. Bowles' request, he said, he had attempted to call her yesterday but was unsuccessful. He then received a call from Mrs. Paris saying Mrs. Bowles was at her apartment and asking him to come at once.

At the apartment, police said, Bowles and his wife discussed advisability of a divorce. Mrs.

Bowles then went to the kitchen apparently to get a drink. Bowles allegedly told police he could see part of his wife's coat as she stood at the sink and presently he saw her slump to the floor. He rushed to the kitchen and found a broad knife plunged into her breast.

Bowles called a doctor but Mrs. Bowles died shortly after his arrival.

Mrs. Bowles body was removed to a mortuary and the apartment put in order before authorities were notified of the tragedy.

L. V. Jenkins, chief of police, said today he is not "completely satisfied" Mrs. Bowles' death was a case of suicide. He made it plain, however, he had not reached a conclusion. He remarked upon the circumstance that the body of Mrs. Bowles had been removed to a mortuary, the kitchen had been scrubbed, the death knife washed and dried, and the house placed in order before police were called.

Members of Mrs. Bowles' family today told investigators they were not satisfied with the theory Mrs. Bowles killed herself, and they demanded a full investigation of every angle of the tragedy.

Owners Wine Concentrates Rile Capone

FRESNO, Cal., Nov. 12, (AP)—The Fresno Bee today announced Al "Scarface" Capone, Chicago gangland chief, had issued orders not to allow grape vine concentrates, made by the fruit industries Ltd., of California, to be sold in Chicago and the edict has gone out that death will be the price of disobedience.

PENDLETON NEGRO IS GIVEN LIFE TERM

PENDLETON, Nov. 12, (AP)—James Jarnagan, negro, was today sentenced to life imprisonment for the murder of the Rudd. He pleaded guilty to a charge of second degree murder and admitted he backed Rudd to death with an ax last August. Judge Alger Fee pronounced sentence.

CUBAN LADY IS SLAIN IN RIOT

HAVANA, Nov. 12, (AP)—At least one person was killed and several wounded in an exchange of shots last night between police and students near the downtown home of Mariano Gomez, mayor of Havana.

Senorita Mercedes Barbarrosa, sister-in-law of Frau Marsal, editor in chief of Diario de la Marina, Havana daily newspaper, was killed. She was leaning from a balcony at her home and was struck by a stray bullet, dying shortly afterward.

HAVANA, Nov. 12, (AP)—In the face of increasing unrest

throughout the Republic, President Machado this afternoon issued a decree suspending constitutional guarantees throughout Cuba.

Soldiers began replacing the national police as preparations were made to establish a state of martial law throughout the island following publication in the official Gazette this evening, the decree will become law and it is expected martial law will go into effect immediately.

Threatening rumors of revolt which for three days had menaced the peace and order in the Republic were responsible for the drastic step taken by the president.

MANY TELL OF CRUELITIES AT STATE SCHOOL

PORTLAND, Nov. 12, (AP)—The hearing on the charges of cruelty at the Oregon state training school for boys will be resumed at one o'clock today following an all-day session here yesterday in which additional charges were made and denied.

William H. Hallie, superintendent of the school, was on the

stand at the day's close. He flatly contradicted charges of mistreatment made by preceding witnesses. Among the charges made against Mr. Hallie's conduct of the institution were improper feeding of inmates, cruel and excessive use of the "Oregon boot," a heavy leg iron.

The investigation is being conducted by the child welfare commission, which was assigned to the task by the state board of control. Action was precipitated by affidavits sworn out by several former inmates, who alleged cruelties suffered while at the school.

Sensational charges were made by Mrs. Lorene Baltimore of Eugene, former matron, who admitted under cross-examination that she had been discharged from the school. She said that partiality was shown and told of some of

the tortures she witnessed. The father of Vernon Levey, whose leg burning brought about the investigation, testified on the condition he found his son when he visited him at the school October 25. Carl Serrell, 15, ex-inmate, corroborated statements regarding food and punishment made by other witnesses.

Other witnesses, who described punishment dealt out to inmates by "Pa" Darling, disciplinarian of the institution, and regarding food were Felix di Gregorio, 18, who was twice an inmate of the school; Mrs. Nina Batemann, former employee who said she left because of the poor food served, and Miss Mary H. Allen, who related what she saw on a visit to the school.
