## BOTH MEN ARE READY FOR BIG FIGHT FRIDAY

Fans are urged to be at the arena at 8:30 sharp, at which hour the curtain raiser will start.

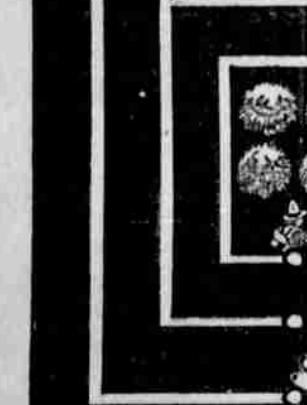
**Irish Has Best Of "Battle" With Swede Opponent**  
PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 13. (AP)—It was Irish against Swede in last night's heavyweight wrestling match and Ireland came out on top when Pat McGil, Irish champion, dumped John Freberg, Barefoot Swede from Minneapolis, two out of three falls. They are two of the biggest men in the business, Freberg weighing 231 pounds, McGil 220.

McGil took the first fall in 20 minutes with a series of reverse flying headlocks. Freberg won the second with a perfect body slam in 9 minutes, 10 seconds. The third fall went to McGil in less than one minute when he jumped in the air, wrapped his legs around Freberg's head and brought him down with a flying scissor.

## Truce Made In Football War At California

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 13. (AP)—The verbal football warfare at the University of California was in a state of official truce today. But indications were the truce would be renewed with the firing of the final gun in the annual "big game" with Stanford November 22.

Confidence in the football team was unanimously expressed by the executive committee of the associated students in a resolution adopted last night.

A. M. Arlett, editor of the Daily Californian, student publication, whose editorials demanded an immediate and sweeping investigation of California athletics, changed his tactics in an editorial today he urged students to "pull in the frayed edges of our enthusiasm." Intimating the edges could fray again after the Stanford game.

While William W. Monahan, athletic manager, said the resolution was no mere gesture, student members of the executive committee indicated it was adopted to stave off dissension for the remainder of California's football season.

My old friend Jimmy Stalman of Nashville once told me about one of the toughest "Holes in One" in golf history. In fact, the tragedy of it was nobody ever knew who made the ace although two men claimed it.

"George Livingstone, the pro at the Bellemeade C. C. and Bradley Walker, the city champ of Nashville, were playing a round at the Ingwood C. C. On a blind par three 170 yard hole that lay over a hole just beyond their vision, both got away good balls, that sailed directly over the direction flag. Both players knew they had hit good balls, but just how good they did not know until they had reached the green. One ball was in the cup and the other not four inches away.

And here is the tragedy of it all. They found upon examining the balls, that both were shooting, new, unblemished balls of the same make and color.

Both players probably carry a secret conviction to this day, that it was his ball that trickled in the can.

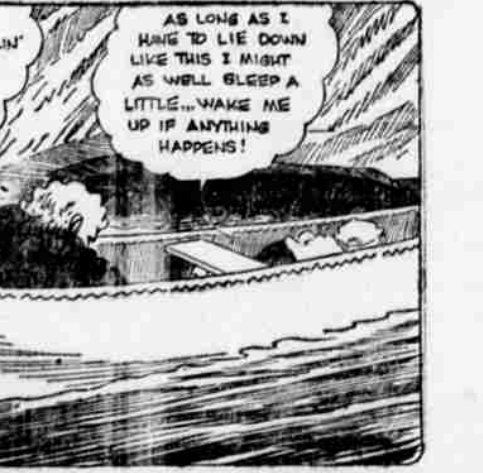
