came upon Tripary's body and beheaded it, the engineer said. Another American named Kelley was badly beaten, and received a bullet wound in the face, he said. Another man named Morger also believed to be an American, was wounded three times in the legs and chest. He and Kelley were brought to Lima in the refugee train in the care of the American doctor, Crane.

During the riot, the engineer said, twenty foreigners fled from Malpaso with a band of rioting workers at their heels. The train left for Lima before their fate was learned.

HOMES ARE BURIED IN LANDSLIDE

down upon rescuers and victims alike.

To add to the horror of the catastrophe, it came shortly after midnight when the occupants of houses at the foot of the hill upon which stands the Great Cathedral, were asleep.

The first landslide, loosened apparently by heavy rains of the last two days, rushed down and crushed three buildings in the twinkling of an eye. Police and firemen hurried to the scene but hardly had they entered the area than a house collapsed above them burying them in their turn.

Other landslides, some of them smaller, followed and by the time the rumbling earth had subsided, ten houses had been crushed.

LYONS, France, Nov. 13. (AP)—Between 40 and 50 persons were estimated late this afternoon to have been killed in the collapse of ten houses which fell, one after another, during the night, under the rushing whirl of a landslide near the Basilica of Notre Dame de Douvriere.

LYONS, France, Nov. 13. (AP)—Firemen and police labored feverishly today removing debris of ten houses which collapsed during the night, hoping to save some of the scores of persons buried beneath.

A landslide down a steep incline which slopes away from the Basilica of Notre Dame de Douvriere, undermined the foundations of the houses, which fell one after the other. Residents, most of whom were asleep, were caught unaware.

Estimate 100 Perish
Police believed upwards of 100 persons either perished or were gravely injured. In addition the first rescue squad of 29 firemen and seven policemen was buried beneath the falling masonry of one of the last houses to fall as they entered the ruins to answer the screams of the entombed.

It may be days, so dangerous is the further work of removal of the debris, before the total number of dead is known. Some few persons, residing on the edge of the collapsed area, have been taken from the ruins seriously injured, and sent to hospitals.

Rescue Work Proceeds
As morning came hope of finding any of the victims alive grew fainter, but the rescuers, their number constantly augmented by

new volunteers, continued feverish efforts.

Police held a large crowd of anxious people at a safe distance. Mayor Edouard Herriot, former premier of France, personally supervised the work of rescue, despite his being ill with intestinal grippe, which forced him to remain in bed for the past few days.

Slides Due to Rains

One of the scores removed from the debris and sent to hospitals was a woman of 70, who was expected to die. Another was a workman who had lost his power of speech. Both were cared for by military physicians.

The landslide, apparently the result of heavy rains during the last few days, swept down the hillside at the base of the cathedral at 1 a. m.

Ambulance Cut in Two

When the first rescue squad was buried beneath falling masonry the ambulance which had come with them to the site of the disaster, was cut in two by a large falling block of stone.

A few more persons were able to leap from windows and doorways to safety, but most of the inhabitants of the houses were buried as they collapsed. There was an initial landslide at 1 a. m., another shortly after, a third at 3 a. m., and a fourth at 4 a. m. The authorities fear there will be additional movements.

All buildings in the immediate vicinity of the stricken district have been evacuated, including the Charity hospital nearby. Victims were taken to the cathedral for treatment. That building, one of the most noted churches of Europe, stands on the top of a huge rock hill which dominates Lyons, and is said to be in no danger.

Ludendorff Says Fatherland Faces Total Destruction

BERLIN, Nov. 13. (AP)—General Erich Ludendorff, one of the wartime idols of the German people, today emerged as one of those who look with pessimism upon Germany's prospects in the "next war."

In a 95-page pamphlet entitled "World War Threatens on German Soil," he predicts complete annihilation of the fatherland in a war beginning in May, 1932, in which Germany, Austria, Hungary, England and Soviet Russia will be ranked against France, Belgium, Poland, Rumania and Czechoslovakia.

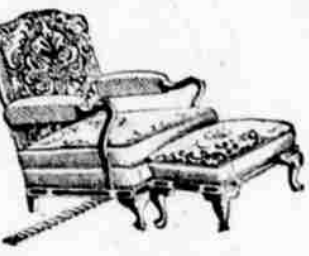

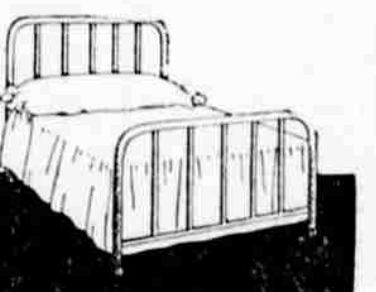
