NOMINEES FILE EXPENDITURES IN CAMPAIGN

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 15. (AP)—Items totaling \$70,190.04 showing campaign expenditures in behalf of the candidate of Julius L. Meier, successful independent candidate for governor, were filed today with the secretary of state. The items were:

Meier-for-Governor committee, \$64,144.61; Meier-for-Governor committee \$13,141.01; United Veterans political league, by A. Towler, secretary and treasurer, in behalf of the Meier candidacy, \$1500; by Julius L. Meier personally, \$150; by William Davis, \$1187.12; by Rufus C. Holman, \$1187.12; by Estelle Mayer, \$507.18 and by others making small contributions to make the total of \$70,190.04.

C. J. Hayes reports an expenditure of \$747.94 in opposition to the Meier candidacy.

Other expense statements filed were:

Portland General Electric company in opposition to Utility District bill, \$15,133.35; Mountain States Power company, in opposition to District Utility bill, \$15,133.35; Eastern Oregon Light & Power company, in opposition to Utility District bill, \$149.50; Oregon State Grange in support of income tax, Lieutenant Governor amendment and Utility District bill, \$3265.98; Oscar T. Olsen, in opposition to anti-cigarette bill, \$5300.74; Lerewell A. Banks of Medford as an independent candidate for United States senator spent \$9511.53, according to his statement. L. F. Stanley spent \$499.47 in support of the Elton Watkins candidacy for United States senator. Ronald C. Glover reports an expenditure of \$1320.78 for a committee for the candidacy of W. C. Hawley for congress. Elizabeth Bell spent \$2119.04 for the candidacy of Franklin P. Korell for congress and Korell a personal expenditure of \$2500.

Plan Change In State Recall Law

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 13 (AP)—A constitutional amendment that would place some restrictions on the operation of the Oregon recall law is provided in a proposed initiative bill left with the secretary of state today by George Bylander of Portland.

It would require that recall petitions be filed with the same officer with whom petitions for nomination are filed. This official, who in state matters would be the secretary of state, would be required to have the petitions returned to him within 150 days, fully signed, and would be further required to require a certification of the names by the county clerk. This would prevent the holding of recall petitions in "cold storage," it is said.

only waters of Upper Klamath lake to which the power company is entitled is a right of 203 second feet which it owns on Link river.

Right is Limited.

"I am unable to say," the opinion says, "that there is any water in excess of 203 second feet flowing in the Klamath river at the Grant power site, subject to appropriation at this time, without release by the federal government; and based upon the statute as interpreted by the supreme court. . . . It is my opinion that the waters of Klamath river, at the point under consideration, are not now subject to appropriation other than said 203 feet."

Relative to a letter from the United States reclamation commissioner recently stating that he "would be willing to release such an amount of water as is not contemplated to be used (by the government) within the definite time period, but would be made for releasing it only such time as it may be needed by the government," Van Winkle says: "There is no provision in the statute authorizing or providing for such a conditional or limited release by the government."

The ruling of the attorney general is of vital importance to residents of Klamath Falls, at it means that delay in the construction of the proposed new \$4,000,000 plant will be indefinite. Those who favored the immediate issuance of the permit saw in the construction of it a means of affording relief to unemployed during winter months.

The California Oregon Power Co. has planned to begin construction on the plant immediately upon the issuance of the permit and work would have continued throughout the present winter.

Although some opposition existed here to the issuance of the permit, those who favored the Chamber of Commerce, various other organizations and business interests generally had urged that it be granted.

MAN WHO ONCE LIVED HERE IS SHOT TO DEATH

MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 15. (AP)—An inquest into the death of Everett Dahack, 34, of Eagle Point, who was found shot to death near a still in the Reese creek district, has been ordered for tonight.

Dahack's body was found yesterday by a raiding party of state and local enforcement officers. The officers said a bullet has been fired through his head.

W. A. Goetjen, one of three men arrested near the still, alleged he saw Dahack fall when Joe Cave, deputy sheriff, fired at Raleigh Matthews who attempted to escape after firing at the officers. Matthews was not hit but was captured by Deputy Sheriff Louis Jennings. H. H. Hogan, state prohibition agent who found the slain man, said, however, Dahack had been dead about four hours.

The officers said they found a rifle on the premises but it did not reveal what evidence it contained.

The raiding party located the still several days ago. While they were lying in wait Friday morning, they said, they heard Dahack and Matthews quarreling.

Theodore Smith was the third man arrested. The officers came upon the three in the act of moving the still. They seized the still and a large quantity of mash.

Matthews was tried for the murder of Wig Jacks, alleged bootlegger in 1921. He was acquitted.

Suit Is Filed Against State Board of Control

PORTLAND, Nov. 14. (AP)—Governor A. W. Norblad, Hal Ross, secretary of state, and Thomas B. Kay, state treasurer, as members of the state land board, were named defendants in a suit filed in federal district court today by the Massachusetts Bonding and Insurance company. The insurance company asks payment of \$5000 from the state land board, growing out of the disappearance of William Worrall, heir to part of the estate of Philip J. Worrall, who died in 1923. The plaintiff alleges the money was assigned to the insurance company by another heir.
