

WHEAT IS BOUGHT TO AID PRICE

Farm Board Purchases 10,000,000 Bushels to Stabilize Market

U. S. ENTIRELY OUT OF EXPORT MARKET

Local Prices Are 12 to 15 Cents Higher Than Canadians Get

WASHINGTON, Nov. 17. (AP)—Chairman Legge of the farm board said today the grain stabilization corporation was buying wheat both in the cash and future markets in its stabilization operations.

The operations of the stabilization corporation extend to practically all markets. Purchases are being made at the current price.

Act to Protect Price

"There is no peg price in the picture at all," Legge said. Asked if the corporation had bought as much as 10,000,000 bushels of wheat in its stabilization efforts so far, the chairman replied "I think so."

He said the corporation was not trying to raise the price of wheat but to prevent unwarranted price decline.

Quit Export Market

Regarding the length of time the corporation has engaged in stabilization operations on the 1930 crop, Legge said it had been buying "a little wheat in the soft spots for some little time." Without looking up the records, he could give no exact information.

Legge said the United States had been out of the export wheat market for more than a month and probably would be for many more. Europe is able to buy wheat of competing countries at a lower price than that at which United States is willing to sell. He said the decline in United States exports did not indicate, however, that this country's wheat supply was down to a domestic consumption basis.

"We still have plenty of wheat," he said, "and don't forget that."

Canadian Prices Lower

George S. Milner, wheat member of the board, said the Winnipeg wheat price since Saturday had advanced three cents a bushel influenced no doubt by the stabilization buying here.

He pointed out wheat prices in Canada have been 12 to 15 cents a bushel below United States prices this season, whereas they were equaling that much higher last year, adding:

"That should give critics of the grain stabilization corporation something to think about."

Report of Sale Denied

Milner said there was no attempt or desire on the part of the grain stabilization corporation to corner the wheat market. No limit has been set on the price to be paid nor on the amount to be purchased.

The 60,000,000 bushels already held by the corporation is not being sold, Legge said, but sales are being made from the corporation's new acquisitions. He denied the corporation had sold 50,000,000 bushels of wheat to Italy.

Fire Chief Will Present Plans of New Fire Station

Plans for the Klamath Falls Fire Station No. 2, recently authorized by the voters of the city, will be presented to the mayor and city council by Fire Chief Ambrose this evening, and will be taken under advisement by the council.

Several sites for the new station are being considered by Fire Chief Ambrose but it is understood that they will not be presented at tonight's meeting.

The plans which are to be presented may be used as a basis on which an architect may draw further plans or may be used as they are. The plans were furnished free of charge to the city through the co-operation of other fire officials and organizations with Chief Ambrose.

They were drawn by Charles Taylor, deputy state fire marshal for Oregon after consulting with Lee Holden, ex-chief of the Portland fire department who is now retired, Ed Grenfell, present chief of the Portland department; Tom Graham, chief of the Corvallis fire department which has just completed the most modern fire station on the Pacific coast and the state fire marshal's office.
