Trainloads of Cattle And Sheep Are Shipped To California

HEAVY LOSS BARELY AVERTED IN STORM

Ft. Klamath Owners Have Difficulty Rescuing Herds from Snow

An unusual emergency presented by the sudden and severe storm which began Saturday, occurred when thousands of head of cattle and sheep in the Fort Klamath country were snowed in without feed, and had to be shipped at once to California points to prevent starvation. Work of shipping began Sunday, and livestock owners hope to finish tonight. All shipments are going out of Chiloquin over the Southern Pacific railroad.

Owing to the fact that all grass was covered by snow, and there was a scarcity of hay, cattle had begun to fall off, and sheep ranging on the Fort Klamath meadows were starving and almost buried by snow. Had not livestock men banded together, and acted in the emergency, thousands of head of cattle and sheep would have perished, according to Joe Kimsey, deputy state livestock inspector and commissioner.

Kimsey was called to Fort Klamath Saturday morning to inspect all livestock being shipped out, as each animal must be in good condition and have a health certificate before it can leave the state.

Mr. Kimsey stated that trails had to be broken in to fields where cattle had been grazing, and since the snow was 20 inches on the level, and drifting constantly the work was difficult.

One band of sheep, 1700 in all, belonging to Murphy & Collins, literally had to be dug out of the snow one by one.

"It is surprising that there was not more of a loss, during the storm," McKimsey stated, "as this was the earliest and most severe storm in the history of the country."

Fort Klamath Meadows company shipped out 2,300 head of cattle to King City, Calif.; Jack McAniff shipped 1,600 head; B. M. Woodworth 323 head; Art Nichols 207, and W. D. Duke of Brooks, 329 head of purebred Hereford cattle.

The Murphy & Collins sheep, 700 in all, which were seven miles west of Fort Klamath, are now en route to Tule lake for winter pasture, and Lee Denton is on the way out with 1200. Mr. Kimsey said today.

Most of this livestock will be brought back to Fort Klamath in the spring.

to date are over \$2,000,000. The estimate in the 1930 tax levy of receipts from the intangibles and excise tax was \$900,000, yet the receipts were over \$1,500,000. A comparison of the estimated receipts with actual receipts in many other instances, such as the corporation department, insurance department, etc., shows a considerable increase over the estimates.

"There are many other figures which I could quote, but it is unnecessary to do so. Suffice it to say that such study of figures convinces me that the tax commission can reduce the general property tax by a substantial amount for next year without additional legislation, and under existing laws.

Income Tax an Aid
"The recently enacted income tax can reasonably be expected, to produce sufficient revenue to offset the loss of the intangibles tax. The receipts from the latter tax have been excluded from my calculations. The law was declared to be invalid, and I have believed from the first that the honor of the state and keeping faith with the taxpayers, demands that this money be returned unless a valid law be passed wherein and whereby, with proper exemptions, the money received under this law could legally be applied to the burden of government. My study convinces me that only a special session could legally appropriate to state purposes the money actually collected under the intangibles tax law and now in the hands of the state treasurer. However, as I sense the opinion of the people, they are opposed to a special session, and therefore the intangibles tax money should be immediately returned as one of the first acts of the next regular session of the legislature beginning in January.

Referendum Feared
"I might say that, in addition to the reasons I have given, the following are objections to the special session itself:
"The question would arise as to the membership legally constituting a special session.
"In addition there too arises the danger of a referendum as to any such special session legislation, leaving the possibility of nothing being accomplished.

Timber Company Inaugurates Plans For Reforesting

growth timber sustained in this region through attacks of bark beetles, some apprehension was felt that young trees left for a second growth would receive attention from these destructive pests.

Studies conducted by the United States bureau of entomology are, however, encouraging, and warrant the assumption that beetle loss on cutover lands will be light. In planning cutting operations, however, it was necessary for salvage purposes to take into account the severity of beetle attacks in old stands, and this will doubtless continue to somewhat interfere with the orderly progress of exploitation.

Fire Control Major Problem
One of the first and major considerations of any forestry plans must, of necessity, be the guarding of the material left for a new crop against destruction through fire. In working out this problem no considerable amount of experience is available.

The usual Federal Forest service practice of piling debris for burning and clearing areas of inflammable material is not only an expensive practice, but presents other drawbacks which may well, if possible, be avoided in this region.

Dead Timber Removed
After a careful study of such practices as have been tried by various companies, the Weyerhaeuser Timber company adopted a plan which, though expensive, gives promise of satisfactory results. First of all the logged over areas are cleared of all snags and dead trees, which, as every fire fighter knows, are the most serious handicaps to fire control on logged off lands. These are felled or burned down during winter months, the latter being by far the cheapest and best method of disposal.

Fire trails are then constructed throughout the areas logged over, these trails or breaks cutting the areas into blocks of not over 100 acres each. Should a fire start in any one of the blocks the theory is, that being surrounded by a wide fire trail, the fire may be confined to the particular block, and not become a general conflagration.

System Is Proved
The system, with some modifications, is similar to that in successful use the past five years on operations of the Fruit Growers Supply company at Susanville, California. The debris left after logging is left on the ground except in the fire trails, where it is lopped and pulled away from the small trees and the area within the fire trails burned. Railroad grades are converted into roads so that men and equipment may quickly be gotten to any fire which starts, and the whole area is under the eye of a lookout located on a nearby high point.

Fire protection, snag felling, and fire line construction are in charge of a thoroughly experienced man who with a crew of about a dozen men and necessary equipment is continuously employed in the various phases of protection within the operating area. After a period of six or seven years it is believed the logged areas will have returned to a state of normal hazard, and all secondary fire trails may be abandoned.

Continuous Operations Planned
The Weyerhaeuser Timber company had for a long time contemplated a continuous operation in the Klamath region. County officials have wisely indicated their willingness to investigate the need for equitable adjustment of valuations on cut over lands, and the passage two years ago by the Oregon legislature of a modern reforestation law insures a system of timber taxation for the future which gives encouragement to the growing of continuous crops. Without such assurance a reforestation project is a highly problematical financial venture. Plans of the Weyerhaeuser Timber company will doubtless be modified as experience shows those under way faulty or capable of improvement. A definite start has, however, been made, which it is believed will insure fairly satisfactory results and guarantee to the region continuous and increasing returns in the form of payrolls and taxes.

Grand Jury Quiz Ordered in Death Of Everett Dahack

MEDFORD, Ore., Nov. 18, (AP)—The grand jury has been called into session Thursday to investigate the death of Everett Dahack, Eagle Point, found dead last Friday during a raid on a moonshine hideout in the Reese district. Dahack was hit on the top of the head with a bullet. The raid was conducted by state and county prohibition enforcement officers.

Ray Vinson, Welmer district resident, entered a plea of guilty to possession of a still, and was sentenced to two years in the state penitentiary.

Appeal Filed by "Oregon Wildcat"

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 18, (AP)—An appeal in the case of Robert Gordon Duncan, "Oregon Wildcat," was today on its way to the United States circuit court of appeals in San Francisco. Duncan yesterday was sentenced to six months in jail and fined \$500 following conviction on a charge of using "obscene, profane and indecent" language over a radio station here in which he attacked chain store operations and prominent Oregon men, he is free under \$2500 bail.

Duncan's attorney said the appeal was based on the contention the federal radio act is unconstitutional in its application to language used over the air.

terminated to fulfill his work and make his official report of weather conditions, so, despite the heavy snowfall, went to Fort Klamath to attempt the trip from that side. He left Fort Klamath at 9 p. m. Saturday night after promising that if his car stalled he would not attempt to get to the trip to Anna Springs. At 8:30 a. m. Monday, Godfrey talked to the telephone operator at Fort Klamath from the park boundary. She advised him not to go on.

Searching Party Formed
When he was unreported at the Government camp, or Anna Springs, a searching party set out from Fort Klamath and Luck left the Government camp on foot, traveling through two and a half miles of deep snow drifts before he reached Godfrey.

Gus Page, proprietor of the Rainbow garage, Oscar Bunch, Fort Klamath pioneer, Millard Bircoe, resident of that district, E. H. McDaniels of Portland and Tony Castel were the members of the Fort Klamath party. They traveled as far as the 11 mile post to the lake and discovered Godfrey's car at the park boundary. He had drained the radiator and hung his overcoat over the front of the car.

Trail Is Followed
Following his trail mile after mile through the deep snow, they saw signs that he had been

fatigued by the cold of the night spent in his car and by the fact that he had had no breakfast. He had traveled approximately eight miles through the snow before he fell and succumbed to exhaustion. Those who knew Godfrey stated that his heart was weak and the supposition was voiced that the exposure was too much for him and that he did not possess the reserve to stand the strain.

Widow Survives
A party of park officials from the headquarters at Medford left that city this morning with the Jackson county coroner to get Godfrey's body. They were expected to arrive back in Medford about noon today and plans for the funeral were to be made there. Godfrey is survived only by his wife, who resides in the valley city. He was a man of about 45 years of age.

Godfrey had been chief park ranger at Crater Lake for the past two years. Previous to that time he was in the park service at Yosemite national park. He had spent many years in the United States park service before going to Yosemite.

Soviet Hits France
Litvinoff today uttered an outburst of indignation at France's holding a portion of the Russian fleet interned at Bizerta, Algeria. These ships were seized by the French and White Russians in Crimean waters in 1920 and the French have retained them pending a judicial settlement.

"Though there has been ten years of peace," said Litvinoff, "part of the Soviet fleet is still held in captivity by one of the great powers. By what right?" "They have no right except the right of force."
