Charles Levine Offers Defense In Vienna Court

VIENNA, Nov. 18. (AP)—Charles A. Levine, being held here on suspicion of intention of forgery, vigorously defended himself before the Vienna police court today.

The police president had said Levine had given orders to a Vienna engraver for metal dies and matrices to enable him to coin certain French franc pieces as issued by the French chamber of commerce.

Levine protested that he was badly understood by the engravers, that what he really wanted were dies from which he could cast medals for distinguished almen.

The engraver maintained he understood Levine very well and that his meaning was unmistakable. Levine also asserted he only wanted the dies for his and his wife's portraits.

Meanwhile, the Austrian po-

lice have wired the French police to send a commission to Vienna to study the evidence and to investigate further.
