

550 HALF GLAD PEOPLE TAKEN OFF STEAMSHIP

LISBON, Portugal, Nov. 19 (A P)—Riding through thick barriers of fog, lifeboats carried to safety 550 passengers and crew of the British steamship Highland Hope which ran on the black cliffs of Benerias off the coast of Portugal today.

LISBON, Portugal, Nov. 19 (A P)—The British steamship Highland Hope, abandoned by her passengers and crew after striking a reef off the Portuguese coast, was given up as a complete loss late today.

Her holds were full of water and she was sinking rapidly. The British consul has left for Peniche where the ship's passengers, numbering between 200 and 300, were being landed.

Scores of fishing boats from Peniche clustered around the Highland Hope as soon as its mishap became known and helped the passengers off, taking their boats in tow. Peniche, the Highland Hope is believed to have suffered considerable damage.

At 5 a. m. the Highland Hope radioed notice of its grounding and at 6:17 a. m. sent out an SOS, stating its boat had got away. The German tug Max Berend and the steamer Mandalay came to her aid.

Six of the ship's lifeboats were used to vacate the passengers and crew, many of those taking to the boats were in pitiful condition, many half dressed, and others in night attire.

The strike killed, brought all of them to the Oklahoma City hospital.

Finds Father Dead
An ambulance driver, Yates Hoover, accustomed to carrying on without a show of emotion, found the body of his father in the debris of their home.

Unable to find his mother, Young Hoover rushed the body of his father to a hospital and then sped back in search of her.

The escape of Mrs. W. L. Burton and her baby, whose home was destroyed, was told by her husband.

Burton ran to his home after the storm to find his wife and child shivering in the heavy rain. When the wind struck, Mrs. Burton caught the baby in her arms. She sheltered it as the house collapsed.

The baby sustained only minor scratches while the mother escaped with lacerations.

Many Buildings Wrecked
John Hutchinson, who brought several of the injured to Oklahoma City, said at least 400 buildings had been destroyed in and near Bethany. A steady rain fell as rescue squads worked in the storm area.

Telephone lines into the storm area were down, but reporters were rushed to the scene.

Bethany is populated largely by members of the Nazarene church and a denominational school, Bethany Peniel college, is located there. The town is about seven miles west of here. The surrounding area is thickly settled.

Believed Many Buried
Emergency relief quarters were established at the broadcasting plant of radio station WKY, a short distance east of Bethany.

The entire eastern half of Bethany was razed by the wind. Hutchinson said. He believed many persons had been buried in the wreckage, as roofs and sides of houses collapsed.

More than a foot of water was standing in the stricken town. Governor W. J. Holloway issued orders for all available space at the university hospital here to be converted into emergency operating rooms, and employees of the state health department were sent there to help render first aid.

Vandals Are Busy
One of the problems of officers was the activity of vandals who began operating before relief work was well under way. City policemen, firemen, deputies, sheriffs and national guardsmen, with drawn guns, were posted on the streets in an effort to protect property.

A truck load of pocketbooks, loose currency, silver and other valuable possessions were taken to a bank by officers.

A special feature will be musical numbers by the Klamath high school band. At the close of the meeting refreshments will be served.

PLANES FEED GAME
HARRISBURG, Pa.—Wild game and birds of Pennsylvania will not want for food this winter when snow and cold weather makes it hard to get. The state game commission plans to distribute food by scattering it from planes flying over forest and game reservations. Experiments along this line were made last winter and found satisfactory.

arteries of traffic, were blocked with wreckage. Many houses were washed from foundations, one building blocking Kine street.

Colonel James P. Barney of Schofield Barracks, and his sister, Mrs. Julia McCoy, were confined to the Army hospital, suffering from exposure. Their automobile was washed from the road and they held to a tree in the flood until rescued.

Three inches of rain fell yesterday. The flood rushed through northern Honolulu, did it damage quickly and was gone into the ocean.

Today, in bright sunshine, workmen began removing wreckage from streets and recovery of many automobiles swept from the road leading to the Pearl Harbor naval station. Seven hundred machines were stalled on the road last night.

What Ails Our Youth? Subject Jackson's Talk

"What Ails Our Youth?" was the subject chosen by Paul T. Jackson, principal of Klamath Union High, for one of the most interesting talks presented Wednesday before the chamber of commerce forum for some time. Jackson offered no specific panacea or cure for the ailments of youth, but set forth some of the causes of the present unrest prevalent in contemporary society.

In an analysis of the ailments of youth, Mr. Jackson set forth some of the charges against young people: that they are not serious, rebel against restraint, think only of the pleasure of the present, and are frivolous and disrespectful to tradition.

"The stage-setting of the present day, I believe responsible for these conditions," Mr. Jackson stated. "I believe that it is the fault of the industrial, educational and the religious conditions of modern times. Young people must have a chance to develop their own resources and gain experiences in making important judgments."

At the present time, Mr. Jackson gave 10 essentials for the well-educated person, and ended his talk with a plea for cooperation between youth and age.

Miss Ruth Cofer, accompanied by her mother, Mrs. Fred Cofer, presented a group of songs in a charming manner. Arthur R. Wilson acted as chairman.

RANGER'S WIFE HEARS TRAGEDY

The body of William C. Godfrey, chief ranger at Crater Lake National Park, who perished from fatigue and cold in the deep snow two and a half miles this side of Anna Springs camp Monday night, arrived in Medford Tuesday afternoon, having been taken out of the park by the Crater Lake forest crew and Medford ambulance service under the supervision of E. C. Solinsky, superintendent. Funeral arrangements have not yet been made.

Mrs. Godfrey, widow of the ranger, is prostrate with grief at her home in Medford. The news was reported to her Tuesday morning by Mrs. E. C. Solinsky, wife of the superintendent, her daughter, Donna, Mrs. Will G. Steele, wife of the U. S. commissioner of the park, and Mrs. Ray Edwin, wife of the chief clerk.

William Godfrey, according to the latest information received here, was 41 years of age and had been chief ranger of Crater Lake National Park since April 1929, having been transferred there from two years' ranger service in Yosemite national park, prior to which he had been in the United States forestry service for six or more years. He had also been in service with the Fremont national forest service, headquarters of which are at Lakeview, Oregon. He was an experienced timber man and lumber scaler.

Godfrey was a member of the Medford post of the American Legion.

Death, as finally determined, was due to exhaustion and exposure, aided probably by a slight leakage of the heart after a struggle through deep snow for hours without sleep, overcoat or gloves in an attempt to get to Anna Springs to make an official report of the weather and snow conditions.

NEW JERSEY BOY IS STAR FARMER

KANSAS CITY, Nov. 18. (A P)—David Ridgeway Johnson, 17-year-old Rutgers freshman of Lambertville, N. J., has been designated the outstanding student among the 30,000 American youths pursuing courses in vocational agriculture.

In the presence of 2,000 fellow members of the future farmers association of America and 10,000 cheering spectators, the slender, serious-faced New Jersey youth arose last night at the American Royal Livestock show to receive the accolade.

The honor, bestowed by a distinguished committee of experts, brought with it a check of \$1,000 presented by Gov. Henry S. Canfield of Missouri as an award from the weekly Kansas City Star.

The outstanding agriculture feats of the husky six foot "Star American Farmer" were achieved upon the 93 acres surrounding the Colonial stone house, built in 1788 where Davis was born.

He represents the fifth generation of his family on the farm

which his Swedish great-grandfather purchased in 1814 from English owners.

Upon the death of his father seven years ago, David became the head of the family which included his mother, Mrs. Evelyn Johnson, and his older sister Dorothy, a school teacher at Stockton, N. J.

He is the second winner of the title "Star American Farmer" The first, in 1929, was Carleton Patton of Wooster, Ark.
