NEW PIEDMONT CLUB BUILDING IS COMPLETED

The new \$12,000 home of the Piedmont Golf club will be opened next Tuesday night for the members of the club and their wives, when a dancing party, refreshments and entertainment program will be given.

The attractive clubhouse will be completed in time for the party as a large crew is working steadily to get the work done in time.

Wednesday night will be the official opening of the clubhouse to visitors when a dance will be held. A cover charge will be made for each couple and sandwiches and coffee will be served. The clubhouse will be open every evening after the opening date for visitors and club members and Jack Bowring will be in charge and will furnish the music for dancing.

The building was designed and built under the supervision of A. B. Cummins, Klamath Falls contractor. It is 44 by 59 in size and of frame construction.

The outside finish of the building is of hewed lumber, finished with a torch which gives it a rustic appearance. The south end of the reception and main club room is featured by a natural rock fireplace.

A dining hall adjoins the club room which will be used for dancing and 100 persons can be seated in the two rooms at a banquet table. The club will be available, it is stated, for organizations and individuals wishing to hold banquets. The kitchen is fully equipped.

A ladies lounge and rest room and a men's smoking room and rest room, furnished with showers, are on the first floor.

The wide veranda on two sides of the clubhouse offer a view of the valley to the south of the golf course. The interior finish is in colors with "jazz" walls and harmonizing trim. Attractive furniture will be placed in the building.

Conference Will Consider Welfare Of the Children

On November 19 to November 22 the White House Conference for Child Health Protection will convene in Washington, D. C.

President Hoover has called this conference for the purpose of studying the present status of the health and well-being of the children of the United States; recommending what ought to be done and how to do it. Mrs. R. P. Ellingson, educational chairman of the Klamath County Health association, announced today.

More than 1200 experts in the field of child life are now actively engaged in its studies, and a large proportion of this number will gather in Washington for the conference.

Oregon will be represented by Dr. Frederick Stricker, state health officer; Dr. Norman F. Coleman, president of Reed college, and Mrs. Harry L. Corbett of the Child Welfare commission.

President Hoover will address the whole group on November 19, and his talk will be broadcasted over a national net work from 6 until 6:30 o'clock on that evening.

Oregon residents may tune in on the talk over KGW or KOIN in Portland, or KFO or KGO, San Francisco.

Eleven Vagrants Freed From Jail

Eleven vagrants were dismissed from the city jail this morning.

A supply of veritable poison which they had been imbibing when arrested, was confiscated by the police. These men, a motley crew of negroes, foreigners and Americans, were found in the "jungle" on South Sixth street Tuesday evening, when the police

made their regular check of the territory.

This hang-out of "bums and vags" is visited at least once, and sometimes several times a day by police. Every man is questioned, and any suspicious characters, or any carrying weapons are arrested and held for investigation.

The police arrest docket this morning showed a total of 14 arrests since Tuesday noon.

Date of Klamath High School Band Concert Delayed

Because of conflicting dates the Klamath Union high school band concert, which was to be held in the school auditorium Friday evening, November 21, has been postponed until after Christmas, according to a statement issued by Paul T. Jackson, principal.

The band, in full uniform, will play at the regular lodge meeting of the Elks Thursday night. Mr. Jackson stated, and will play for the Elks again on December 7, in addition to that the band has a number of other engagements to fill in the near future. Further announcements of the concert, which is to be given to raise money for new uniforms, will be made at a later date.

(AP)—Mystery surrounding the disappearance of Albert Duffy, 23, six years ago from his home at Mill City was cleared yesterday when a skeleton found near Mehama Sunday was identified as that of Duffy. The identification was made by Dr. B. E. Silvis, dentist, who recognized work he had done on Duffy's teeth.

Bill Lee Tells Them All About Klamath Falls

W. T. "Bill" Lee, recently re-elected county assessor of Klamath county, is another good booster for Klamath Falls. He was interviewed by the Portland Oregonian while in Portland and his statements appeared in the "Those Who Come And Go" column this morning. The article follows:

"From what I have been able to gather, Klamath Falls is in better shape than most other places in these days of depression," said W. T. Lee, assessor of Klamath county, who is registered at the Imperial from Klamath Falls.

"We've got four or five mills running steady. They are not making any money, but they haven't shut down, and that is a great help in a town dependent on payroll. And about 50 percent of our people in Klamath Falls, I should judge, are 'floaters.' I mean that a great percentage of the population is not permanent. I am satisfied that the lumber industry do not settle down in a town, but by the nature of their calling they go from one mill town to another, depending on work conditions. When I see how other towns are getting along, I am satisfied that Klamath Falls is doing pretty well. And it is a fine thing for the mills to operate, even without profit, and afford employment to an army of men."

Mr. Lee who was re-elected this month, has been attending the annual conference of assessors at Salem. He phoned home yesterday and was informed that there were 10 inches of snow in Klamath Falls.
