

A. T. JEWETT ISKILLED IN SHOVEL GEARS

His body and legs horribly mangled to the waist by the gears of a gasoline-propelled shovel a few minutes before, Ambrose Jewett, a gasoline-propelled shovel a few minutes before, died at 5 o'clock yesterday evening.

Jewett, employee of the W. D. Miller Construction company, was assisting Kenneth Bayless, shovel operator, in repairing the giant shovel, and slipped in oil which had been spilled near the machine and was caught in the gears of the shovel. Before the gears could be stopped Teel was ground to a pulp up to his waist.

The fatal accident was witnessed only by Bayless and Wm. H. Melhase, foreman of the construction company. They immediately called a doctor, but Jewett died before assistance arrived. His body was immediately removed to the Whitlock funeral home.

At the time Jewett was killed his wife was preparing dinner for him and five children at the Union avenue home. The widow was all but prostrated by grief when informed of the tragic death of her husband.

The five surviving children are by a former marriage of Mrs. Jewett, her first husband having been killed in an accident seven years ago.

Mrs. A. T. Jewett, residing at Chico, Calif., is the mother of the dead man and among the surviving close relatives.

Tentative plans for the Jewett funeral were released through the Earl Whitlock Funeral Home today. It is planned to ship his body to Chico, his former home where his mother now resides.

"MURDER AT BRIDGE" AUTHOR WINS HONORS FOR MYSTERIES

Anne Austin, author of "Murder at Bridge," the thrilling new mystery serial which begins Saturday in The Evening Herald, wrote her first story of this nature about two years ago. Since then she has written three more, and her popularity has increased to the point where she is today regarded by reviewers and critics as one of the outstanding mystery authors.

Miss Austin's first one, "The Black Pigeon," written like her others, for first publication in newspapers and later issued in book form, attracted nationwide attention. This was followed by "The Evening Parrot," the story in which she introduced a new type of detective in the person of Bonnie Dundee.

Next came "Murder Backstairs," another Bonnie Dundee story, and this won even more acclaim. In a recent issue of Scribner's magazine, William Lyon Phelps, the famous literary critic, listed "Murder Backstairs" in his selection of best detective stories. Dr. Phelps listed only seven titles out of the hundreds that were published during the year.

Another tribute from a famous man came from Vilhjalmur Stefansson, the noted explorer, in a letter to the Macmillan company, which published "Murder Backstairs" in book form following its newspaper run.

"When you gave me 'Murder Backstairs' by Anne Austin," he wrote, "I thought I decided to keep it to read en route to England. But last night I told myself that the time of sailing was so near that it would do no harm to read a couple of chapters. I couldn't put the book down until I had finished it."

"Miss Austin has done good work with her characters, making them really lifelike, which few mystery story writers bother to do. Her plot is ingenious and the solution of it is logical—once the motives which have been concealed throughout the book are brought to the surface."

"Murder at Bridge" is Miss Austin's latest, and easily her best—which is saying a great deal. She has contrived a unique setting for the two murders in the story. In both instances the victims are dummies at a bridge game, testifying to the boldness and cleverness of the murderer.

The now famous Bonnie Dundee is confronted with his greatest problem. But he solves it. "Murder at Bridge" is the kind of story that keeps the reader guessing from start to finish.

Anne Austin will be remembered by millions of newspaper readers as the author of a number of love stories before she adopted the art of the mystery novel. Among her most popular serials, all of which were written for NEA Service, which distributed them to hundreds of newspapers were "Saint and Sinner," "Daughters

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EDUCATOR IS CRITICAL OF UNIVERSITIES

NEW YORK, Nov. 20. (AP)—Dr. Abraham Flexner, director of the Institute of Advanced Study, in Newark, N. J., in a new book criticizes American universities for teaching "rubbish."

In "Universities—American, English, and German," published by the Oxford University Press, he declares "the sort of easy rubbish which may be counted toward an A. B. degree passes the limits of credibility."

Institutions, he adds, "have needlessly cheapened, vulgarized and mechanized themselves."

Mentioning clog dancing for men and wrestling among courses that count toward a degree, he says great universities descend to "humbug" in bestowing degrees representing neither a substantial secondary education nor a substantial vocational training.

Dr. Flexner says there have been unworthy efforts to sell education at a profit if possible, citing as flagrant offenders Columbia and the University of Chicago. Criticizing the Harvard school of business administration, he declares it is an irrelevant and unworthy thing for a modern university to undertake to "short-circuit" experience.

English universities, he holds, are seats of higher learning incomparably superior to anything in America "that has the courage to place athletes where everyone knows they properly belong."

Jack Frost Pays Visit to Areas of Sunny South

LOS ANGELES, Nov. 2. (AP)—Old Man Jack Frost sent shivers through the Southland early today, spreading his glistening sheet of white over upland and lowland. He sharply bit the tender foliage of late tomatoes and other succulent vegetables, but failed in his swift attack on the citrus groves.

The mercury crawled down into the twenties in spots, reaching 28 degrees in the Pomona citrus district. Few orchardists resorted to smudging, however, as the dampness of the air, which made possible the widespread coating of hoar frost, protected fruit.
