

# AL REYNOLDS DELIVERS TALK TO ROTARIANS

With District Governor Al Reynolds, of Portland, hitting on all eight cylinders in his speech to Rotarians, the popular luncheon club Friday noon enjoyed one of its best meetings at the Pelican Grille.

Governor Al talked in a most understandable manner explaining to club members that nothing takes the place of service in this world. He illustrated his remarks by calling attention to the service which is now given us compared with older days when "one took it or left it". He stressed the point, that what a man sells today is the service his commodity renders humanity rather than the mere commodity.

When attending International Rotary at Chicago where governors from sixty-four countries were present, Governor Al said the direct question was asked the foreign members regarding the feeling of European and

South American nations toward Uncle Sam. He stated that the answer from every country represented was that it is the high tariff now in force against foreign made goods and commodities that causes bitter feeling.

Other nations, the foreign Rotarians claimed, want to buy American made goods but such is impossible unless America buys goods from them and that is largely prevented because of the tariff wall.

The Governor then brought in International Rotary as the great agency to give a better understanding between nations of the earth so that problems might be adjusted, such as the tariff and other issues.

One of the exquisite features of the luncheon program was the appearance of Mrs. Naomi Holmstead, vocalist, who rendered three beautiful numbers with Mrs. Don J. Zumwalt at the piano.

Hod D. Eller was made a Rotarian filling the classification of "Life Insurance". W. E. Lamm was appointed by President Cliff Dunn to "chastise" members of the club who had been absent, and the way he did it might have caused some to think that Lamm in his early youth wielded the birch in a rural school. Rotary's attendance was almost 100 per cent Friday and many guests from over the state were present.
