

# BLOODY TOWEL FOUND IN HOME OF MRS. PARIS

PORTLAND, Ore., Nov. 21. (A.P.)—Detectives investigating the alleged murder of Mrs. Leone Howles, 33, Portland society matron, who died from a knife wound ten days ago, today turned their attention to a soiled towel, apparently bloodstained.

The towel was found yesterday in the apartment of Mrs. Irma Jucka Paris, 25, in whose apartment Mrs. Howles died. Mrs. Paris and Nelson C. Howles, 34, widower of the dead woman, have been charged with the murder. They told police Mrs. Howles stabbed herself.

District Attorney Stanley Myers said he attached little importance to the towel but others were of the opinion it might prove to be an important clue. Detectives said the towel bore two large stains with an unstained portion between them such as could have been made by wiping the death knife with the cloth.

Police said they believed W. H. Cutler, who has been arrested as a material witness in the case, knew more of the alleged murder than he had admitted. Cutler is a business associate of Howles. Dr. Paul D. Cooper, a relative of Howles by marriage, was arrested yesterday after he had admitted to police his original statements to them were false. Police said Dr. Cooper admitted he and Mrs. Paris and Howles had "rehearsed" the story they told police.

Dr. Cooper and Cutler were released under \$2500 bail each.

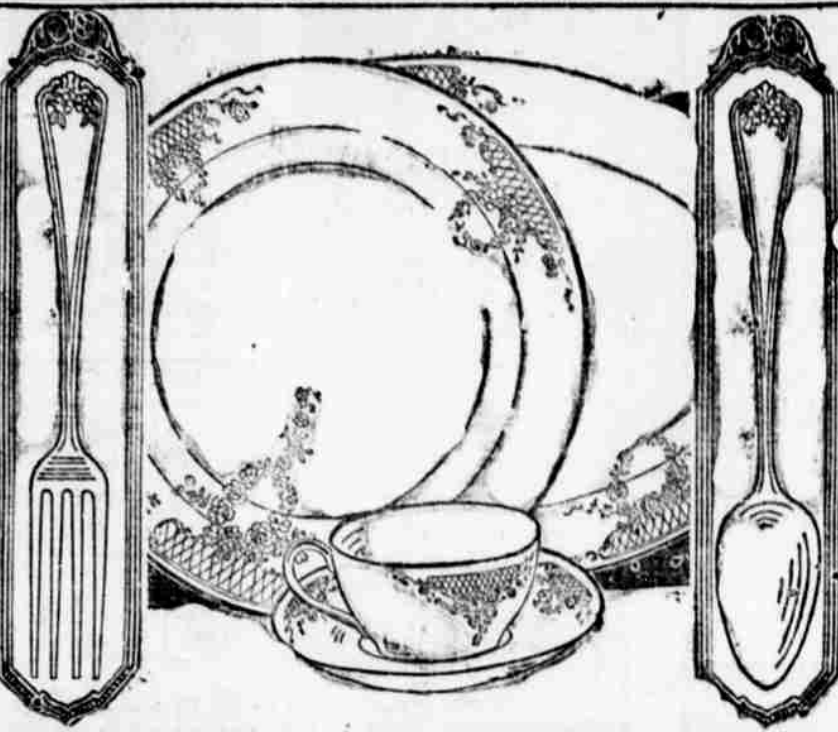
