

DAMAGE CLAIM IS ANSWERED

Answer has been filed in circuit court to the large damage action of Shirley Lou Yung, an infant, by Guy Yung, guardian ad litem, against the Maytag Pacific company, which seeks damages for injury to the two-year-old girl when she caught her fingers in the wringer of one of the washing machines which was running on the street, and received injuries to her arm.

The company answers, admitting that the girl was injured, admitting that the machine was left running in front of the office which was closed at noon, but denying that they controlled or possessed the washing machine.

The case will probably be set for early in the December term of court which opens on December 1. It is stated.

The injury happened some time

ago when the little girl who lived near the company's offices which were then on Seventh street wandered away from her mother. The washing machine with the wringer attachment had been left running in front of the office which had been locked during the noon hour.

The little girl's fingers were caught in the wringer which drew in the arm to the elbow and then ground out the flesh on the forearm to the bone, leaving a horrible scar. She was rescued when her cries attracted a passerby.

Manning, McCulloch and Driscoll and Ralph W. Horan are attorneys for the plaintiff, while Wilbur, Beckert and Oppenheimer of Portland and J. H. Carnahan of Klamath Falls represent the defense.

Southern Pacific Unemployment Aid In

G. M. Biggs, district freight and passenger agent for the Southern Pacific, has been instructed by F. C. Lathrop, postmaster general in California, to offer his services in California's movement to aid the unemployment situation in the state by providing all highway work possible.

The department of industrial relations, in connection with the California highway commission, will soon establish road camps for the construction of highways. Normally this construction work is handled by contractors and much of the work done by machines.

However, in order to remedy the condition of unemployment, all work will be done by men who will receive \$3 per day and work three days a week, but the men will be provided with board and lodging in the camps for the seven-day week.

Co-operating with the commission, the railroads will grant 1

cent a mile for movement of these laborers to the camps. Laborers will be drawn from the different counties of the state, prorated according to the unemployment situation in each county. They will be moved to a concentration point and thence to the road camps. Ordinarily, the concentration point in the north will be San Francisco, and in the south, Los Angeles. Railroad tickets will be delivered through to the destination of the laborers at the 1 cent a mile rate and those from outside points will be moved by local service to the concentration point where they will join the major party, according to word received by Mr. Biggs.
