

COLLECTION OF NEW BOOKS AT CITY LIBRARY

The collection of new books, beautifully bound and illustrated, which are on display at the city library in observance of Children's Book Week, includes a number of newly published books for adults as well as juveniles.

Among some of the outstanding adult books are: "St. Augustine," by Papius; "Roosevelt, Owen Wister," by Mary Baker Eddy; "Power," by Capt. Roosevelt; "Archibute," by Best; "The God of the Pill Bottle," by S. A. Jettmore; "The Nightingale," by Robinson; "The Fe Trail," by Duff; "The Lone Cowboy," by James; "What is Christian Education," by C. E. The Human Mind, by Meninger; and three additions of Smoky, the Cow Horse, by James.

There are also new books by Akley, Morley, Leacock, Bonchey and other well-known authors. The collection includes stories on travel, adventure, and books on astrology, art, pioneer life, South America, North America, the Antarctic and other countries.

Miss Enola Hawkins, the librarian, states that there have been many calls recently for books on India in both fiction and non-fiction has been greatly in demand.

Among the juvenile volumes is the book which received the Newberry prize, awarded each year for the best book written for children. The book selected this year is "Hitty," by Fields. The library now has on its shelves the eight books which have been awarded this prize, including: "The Story of Man," by Van Loon; "The Voyage of Dr. Doolittle," by Loring; "The Dark Frigate," by Shaw; "The Sea, the Sea," by C. S. Lewis; "The Cow Horse," by James; "Garner," by M. J. Kelly; and "The Story of the Boy," by Kelly.

There is also a new book on display of the Twin series, "The Indian Twins," by Perkins, and another volume, "The Rootabaga Country," by Sandburg, which is expected to be in great demand.

Other well-known authors of children's stories represented are: Grisham, Fingers, and O'cott. Some excellent books on stamps, flags, aviation, animals, adventure, fairy tales, children's poetry, and "just stories" are included in the exhibit.

The books will be on display throughout today and Sunday from 2 o'clock in the afternoon until 9 in the evening. Miss Hawkins announced. She urged that parents, as well as children, visit the library and inspect the exhibit, which is the most complete that the city library has had.

How far is Halfway?

WHEAT PRICES REPORTED UP AGAIN TODAY

CHICAGO, Nov. 22, (AP)—Frost reports from Argentina received during late dealings here bolstered the Chicago wheat market today to the highest point reached on a rapid bulge in prices. Traders showed much more disposition than heretofore to pay attention also to recent Argentine official estimates of severe crop damage by rust. Besides, notwithstanding flat denials, talk of revolts in Russia continued to stimulate buying, and it was asserted that Winnipeg has disposed of 4,000,000 bushels of wheat this week for shipment overseas. Wheat closed firm at virtually the day's topmost level, 1 1/2 to 2 1/2¢ higher than yesterday's finish. Corn closed 1 1/2¢ to 3¢ up; oats, 1 1/2¢ to 1 1/4¢ up, and provisions unchanged to a rise of 1/2¢.

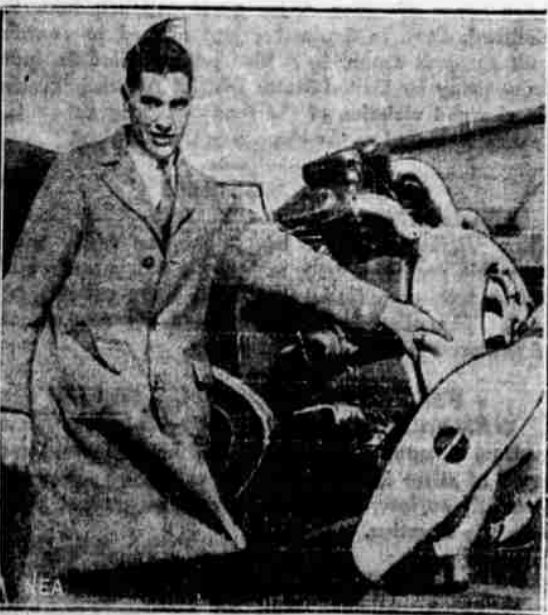
