Petrolle Gives Jimmy McLarnin Sound Drubbing

NEW YORK, Nov. 22, (AP)—Author of the most stunning upset of a top-heavy flistic season, Billy Petrolle pointed today to a year's vacation from the ring as chiefly responsible for his return to the form that made him a formidable lightweight contender two years ago. Petrolle, who does his fighting out of Duluth these days, exploded the myth of Jimmy McLarnin's invincibility in Madison Square Garden last night, giving the Vancouver Irishman what probably was the worst beating of his career. A crowd of 12,500 looked on in amazement as Petrolle tore into McLarnin at the opening bell, battered him badly in the first three rounds, floored him twice for counts of nine in the fourth round, and then coasted in to an easy decision victory.

80,000 People to See Stanford and California Game

BERKELEY, Calif., Nov. 22, (AP)—An inconsistent Stanford football team and a badly battered University of California squad come to grips today in Berkeley's Memorial stadium for the 36th time in the history of the institutions, with nothing at stake save traditional honor. Eighty thousand tickets for the game were sold out more than a week ago.

Teacher Is Slain By Jealous Youth

BATH, N. Y., Nov. 21, (AP)—Miss Elizabeth Refinot, 24, French teacher in the Bath school, was shot and killed early today. Lawrence Guilme, 23, was taken to a hospital with a bullet wound under the heart which police said was self-inflicted. His condition was critical. Sheriff Frank Bartlett said he believed jealousy caused the shootings.

TRUTH IN MEAT LAW URGED TO AID STOCKMEN

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 22 (AP)—Range cattle men in Oregon favor proposed legislation that will permit the grading and marking of meats according to the "truth in meats" plan sponsored by O. M. Plummer, secretary of the Pacific International Livestock exposition and member of the National Meat board, says Dr. W. H. Lytle, state veterinarian.

"There is a complaint by many of the range breeders who raise only well-bred beef animals that they do not realize the true worth of their product because they are forced to compete with cheap beef that is sold in many shops," Lytle said.

He said that Oregon State College has conducted the educational campaign for the instruction of housewives in the selection of meats. While this has done something toward insuring a more just return to the producer, Dr. Lytle said, the fact that most meats are ordered by telephone causes much dairy cow meat to reach the consumer's table unless top prices are paid.

"It is planned to enact legislation," he said, "that will optionally permit those slaughterers of meat who choose to employ a board-approved veterinarian to health inspect the meat and stamp it, and also grade and stamp it so that the quality will be shown."

Farmers of Wasco Would Tax Cities For County Roads

THE DALLES, Ore., Nov. 22, (AP)—A case that will be watched with interest by many municipalities of Oregon has been initiated in circuit court here, with farm organizations of Wasco county bringing mandamus proceedings against the county court to force that body to levy assessments against city property for county road building purposes.

An answer filed by the city denies the county court has such authority because of charter provisions of the municipality.

The case will be expedited and sent to the supreme court as soon as possible in order that a decision on the point of constitutional law may be obtained. All parties by stipulation have agreed the decision will not affect 1930 budgets.
