WILL ASK FOR MODIFICATION

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. (AP)—A showdown in congress at this session on prohibition modification measures was demanded today by Senator Bingham, republican, Connecticut.

He will sponsor a bill to permit manufacture of four per cent beer.

"In view of the interest manifested in the country in prohibition," said Bingham, "the leaders ought to give us a chance to vote on this legislation, at least."

The senator will introduce legislation to allow physicians to prescribe malt as well as spirituous liquor. "I believe these bills would promote temperance," he explained. "I believe they would promote the use and sale of grain and I believe they would aid employment. To say that one half of one per cent of alcohol is intoxicating is ridiculous."

The eleven members of the president's law enforcement commission hoped today they were on the last lap of an arduous and perhaps thankless task.

The group gathered after a ten-day recess for what may become the final drive in writing its prohibition report. To the conference table was brought a stack of written briefs, prepared by the members themselves during the adjournment or before.

Duck Shooting Is Good at Tule Lake Say Local Hunters

Hunters returning from Tule Lake during the past few days report better luck than ever, according to information given out at the various local sporting goods stores. It is still maintained that the best duck shooting can be secured on the southeast side of the lake where ducks are as plentiful as they were last year.

"Hunters are rare but there are a few of them brought in by hunters who possess more than ordinary patience. There is a vast majority of snow geese on the east side of the lake and it is no trouble at all to get the limit," stated Rex Lawson of the Klamath Sporting Goods store this morning.

Seventy Apply at Post Office For Work During Rush

Seventy applications for work have been received at the local post office during the past few days, according to Postmaster McCall. Forty three of them have been married men with families and from that number about 22 will be selected to assist with the holiday mail work. Additional clerks will be put to work on December 15th and carriers on the 18th.

A number of other applications from men outside the age limit were not taken. As near as possible only married men with families will be given employment during the holiday period, McCall stated.

Construction on New Federal Bldg. Is Going Forward

Work on the United States federal building, being constructed at Oak and Seventh streets, has continued daily despite the inclement weather, according to construction engineer A. Earl Patterson's report.

The walls of the first floor are now being constructed and almost complete. It is possible that the work will be halted later in the year by the cold weather but workmen will continue the construction as long as possible and will resume work as early as the weather will permit in the spring.

"Shop Early, Mail Early" Colored Posters Are Out

Red and white posters bearing the message "Shop and Mail Now for Christmas" were distributed to local merchants today by Postmaster John A. McCall. Further requests urging the public to wrap parcels securely, to address all mail plainly, to print return name and address on all mail and other details are printed on the posters which will be tacked up in conspicuous places in various stores today and tomorrow.

"Merchants and others are responding better than ever to the annual call for shopping and mailing early. A great many parcels to foreign countries have already been sent out," Postmaster McCall stated.

Those who have parcels which must be mailed to distant countries should call at the postoffice as soon as possible and get information on mailing dates.

Hoover Explains Regulation Not For Russia Alone

WASHINGTON, Nov. 25. (AP)—President Hoover said today the announcement of recent treasury regulations with regard to the barring of goods made by convict labor was not directed against Russia.

The treasury regulations were asserted by the chief executive to be in compliance with general laws directed against goods manufactured by convicts. He said the government did not intend trade conflicts with the Soviet. On the other hand, he expressed hope that economic relations would be carried on with Russia as with other countries.

COMPANY WILL OPERATE UNIT OF NEW PLANT

PORTLAND, Nov. 25. (AP)—Operation of the 35,000 horsepower generating unit of the Oak Grove project on the Clackamas river by the Portland General Electric company will begin Dec. 15, engineers said today. Ultimate capacity of the Oak Grove project will be 105,000 horsepower in three units of 35,000 each.

The Wood ranch is shipping most of their cattle out this week.

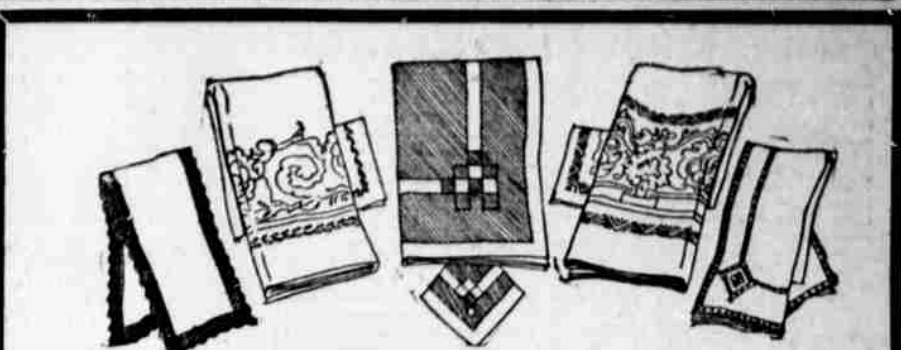
