

MILLERS AND FEEDERS GIVEN HINT BY LEGGE

WASHINGTON, Nov. 26 (AP)—Chairman Legge of the farm board said today that now was a good time for millers and feeders to purchase wheat.

Addressing newspapermen at his press conference, the chairman said:

"If any of you are in the feeding or milling business go over the requirements now."

The chairman added: "I am not making any promises but the staff is worth the money and it's a good time to buy it. Go buy it because it's cheap."

The chairman was of the opinion that the wheat surplus is being reduced daily through feeding operations. He estimated that well over 200,000,000 bushels of wheat would be used for live stock feed this year.

Legge said he had no confidence in estimates of the Russian wheat crop and the amount that country has for export. All available information, he said, was "absolutely unreliable."

He again emphasized that this country, so far as wheat is concerned, should "get on a domestic basis"—domestic production equal to domestic consumption.

He estimated the carry-over would be only 120,000,000 bushels. If 200,000,000 bushels of wheat were used for feeding.

A new farm board bulletin on recent experiments in feeding wheat gives it a value of from \$1.25 to \$1.67 per bushel, as hog feed, equal to or slightly greater than corn. It also shows that cattle and sheep was not quite so good, but with poultry it was equally favorable.

Charge Portland Man With Killing Vancouver Farmer

VANCOUVER, Wash., Nov. 26, (AP)—Charged with first degree murder, W. K. Maki of Portland was in jail here today, accused of killing Andrew Hendrickson, 69, Hockinson district farmer. Hendrickson died Monday night after a fight with Maki who was arrested in Portland yesterday.

Dale McMillen, district attorney, said today he had admitted having a "tussle with Hendrickson. Maki told the prosecutor he remembered nothing more, however, as he was intoxicated.

An autopsy was performed yesterday but surgeons said they found no injuries that would have caused death. There was, however, a small clot of blood on the brain, and the doctors found Hendrickson had an acutely dilated heart.

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STATE TO OPEN BIDS COVERING NEW HIGHWAYS

SALEM, Ore., Nov. 26, (AP)—Approximately 71 miles of highway construction and improvement will be covered by bids to be opened by the state highway commission in Portland December 11. The projects are:

Cook County—Construction of 11.6 miles of broken stone or crushed rock surfacing of the Lakeside-North Bend section of the Roosevelt coast highway.

Deschutes County—Approximately 11.7 miles of gravel surfacing on Hampton-Lake County line section of Central Oregon highway.

Grant County—Regrading of 2.1 miles of Rock Creek-Valades section of John Day highway.

Josephine County—Regrading and resurfacing of 19 miles of Redwood Junction-Caves section of Oregon Caves highway.

Lane County—Construction of 10 miles of broken stone surfacing on Berry Creek-Florence section of Roosevelt coast highway.

Linn County—Grading of three miles of Bryant Hill-Trout Creek section of Santiam highway.

Malheur County—Widening and resurfacing of 11.4 miles of Lancaster-Vale section of John Day highway.

Cook County—Construction of frame addition to highway shop at Coquille.

Hood River County—Construction of frame storage building at Cascade Locks.
