

KLAMATH DAIRY ASSOCIATION ISSUES STOCK

Announcement by U. E. Reeder, president of the Klamath County Dairymen's Association, of the issuance of \$10,000 of additional stock in that organization bringing the total capitalization up to \$25,000, has brought forth again the rumor of the consolidation of the Dairy-mens Cheese and Produce Association and the Langell Valley Co-operative Creamery Association.

Coupled with this expected amalgamation it is considered likely that the Klamath County Poultry Producers' Co-operative Association will join.

Business Grows
The forming of such an organization is the outcome of the growth and success of the Challenge products as distributed by the Klamath County Dairymen's Association, which one year ago had but three men and one truck, with a capitalization of \$7,000 and 50 stockholders.

At the present time the organization has 150 stockholders, employs 12 people and maintains eight trucks. According to Carl Stone, manager of the company, 1,500 quarts of Challenge milk are consumed in Klamath Falls daily, with a monthly volume of business over \$15,000.

Formed Year Ago
When the association was organized, U. E. Reeder was named president; R. C. Short, vice-president; Hans Nylander, secretary-treasurer, and Emil Mochetaz and Charles E. Drew, directors.

The Challenge association recently merged with the United Dairymen's association of Washington and the Interstate Dairymen's association of Oregon to form a coast-wide selling and promoting organization that will handle in excess of \$40,000,000 of dairy products annually.

Most of the nation felt the sting of cold today, and in many places there was heavy snow. The cold wave which brought sub-zero temperatures to points in the Middle West extended throughout the South, with freezing weather as far down as the Gulf and unquoted low temperatures in North Florida. At Atlanta the mercury went to 22. Readings ranging from one to six degrees below zero were recorded in Ohio, North Dakota, Minnesota and Illinois.

Hundreds of motorists were marooned in Northwestern New York by a blizzard which piled drifts ten feet high in places in the vicinity of Dunkirk. A snow storm paralyzed traffic in Cleveland, where the mercury fell to 8 above. Along the Atlantic coast sub-freezing weather prevailed. New York city experienced the coldest day of the season, with temperatures well below freezing. Similar temperatures were felt along the New Jersey coast. California and the Rocky Mountain region apparently were the only sections where the temperature was near normal. At Los Angeles the minimum was 58.

NEW TYPE PLANE
BREMEN, Germany—What is said to be a non-stallable and non-capable plane has been demonstrated here by Heinrich Focke, its inventor. The plane has no stabilizer nor tail, but has three wheels and a small wing and elevator placed in front, giving the front wing a greater angle of attack. The plane will make 90 miles an hour.
