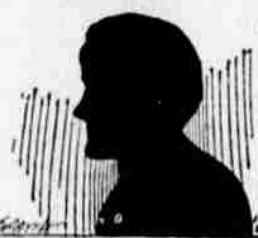

World's Largest City Seen From World's Tallest Building



If you were looking down from the tallest building in the world, this is how mid-town New York's vast panorama of stone and steel would appear to you. This unusual picture was taken from the uppermost girders of ex-Governor Alfred E. Smith's Empire State Building as the steel work on the mammoth new structure was completed. Note the sharp, sky-piercing spire of the Chrysler Building, which now has been relegated to second place in the race to new building heights. In the background is the East River spanned by famous Queensborough Bridge. Beneath the bridge, Welfare Island can be seen. In the far distance sprawls the Borough of Queens, with its multitude of small communities, whose population was set at more than a million in the recent census.

Will Begin Suit To Test Title to Oregon Lake Beds

WASHINGTON, Dec. 1, (AP)—The government today was granted permission by the supreme court to file a suit against Oregon to test the ownership of the beds of Malheur, Harney and Mud Lakes in the Lake Malheur reservation created by President Roosevelt in 1903 as a permanent bird preserve. The suit was made returnable on February 24, 1931. The government asserted irreparable damage would result to the proper development of the preserve unless it had title to the land.

ELECTION IS OPPOSED BY GOV. NORBLAD

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 1, (AP)—Governor Norblad announced today that he will not call a special election to fill the vacancy in the Marion county state senatorship caused by the death of Senator Lloyd T. Reynolds.

Instead, the governor said he would recommend to the 1931 legislature that on the first day of the session it enact emergency legislation to fill the office during that session, recommending also that they confer the office on the candidate who received the third highest vote for the republican nomination in the primaries of last May. This would give the place to Frank Settlemier of Woodburn. The governor will recommend that later in the session the legislature pass a permanent act under authority granted it by a constitutional amendment adopted by the people in the election of November 4.

The governor reached his decision after a conference with Senator Willard L. Marks of Albany. Marks, who has enough pledges to assure him the office of president of the 1931 senate, told the governor that he would leave vacancies in all committee places that he intended to give to Senator Reynolds, and would appoint the new senator to fill those vacancies.
