

VALUATION OF PROPERTY IN COUNTY GAINS

Valuation of taxable property in Klamath county increased \$2,599,089.53 in the past year it was revealed yesterday by Assessor W. T. Lee after he had received the valuations placed on utilities in this county by the public service commission of the state.

That the tax load for the taxpayers will be less this year is promised by the fact that despite the two and one-half million dollar increase in valuation the county will raise by taxation \$103,211.25 less than last year. The city levies may, however, raise the total amount to be collected to last year's level.

Valuation is \$40,386,017.06. Total assessed valuations for 1930 upon which the 1931 taxes will be based is \$40,386,017.06 against a total of \$37,786,928.53 a year ago. Assessor Lee stated.

The value of public utilities property in Klamath county this year is \$11,749,704.96 against a total of \$10,713,303.38 last year.

Property in the county exclusive of the public utilities is valued at \$28,636,312.10 this year against \$26,873,625 a year ago. Valuations show an increase of \$1,762,687 on property other than utilities, and \$836,402.58 on public utilities, including railroads, power and phone companies.

To raise \$1,009,761.61 under the budget recently drawn up for the county expenses to be raised by taxation this coming year a total of \$1,009,761.61 is needed. A year ago the total to be raised by taxation under the budget was \$1,512,932.89.

The budget total this year for the current expense fund amounts to \$21,483.30, but estimated balances on hand on December 31, 1930, and probable income from fees and other sources than taxation reduce the amount to be raised for the fund by taxation to \$182,428.45. Added to that amount is a total of \$27,333.16 for the various bond funds, interest and sinking funds, divided as follows:

The county's state tax ratio upon which it will pay its state tax this year is 60 per cent against a ratio of 52 per cent last year.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 2, (AP)—Mrs. Nellie M. Cronise, 72, mother of Ralph Cronise of the publisher of the Albany Democrat-Herald, of the pioneer family of Rufus Riggs, who crossed the plains as a lad in 1845, and settled in the Salt Creek district of Polk county, died in her apartment in the Bush building here late Monday afternoon.

She was the widow of the late Thomas J. Cronise, prominent early day photographer here.
