

WILL MAINTAIN CHECK ON STATE TRAFFIC COPS

State traffic officers stationed in Klamath county are establishing checking stations in all towns in the county. When an officer arrives in town, he reports immediately to the checking station, telling the direction in which he will go after leaving the town, his telephone number and address at his next destination. In this way traffic officers may be reached at all times in case of emergencies and motor accidents.

Checking stations have already been established in Klamath Falls at police headquarters; in Merrill at the local telephone office, and in Chiloquin at the office of the justice of the peace. A station was established in Malin today, the exact location to be announced later.

In the near future similar stations will be established in each town in the county. Traffic officers are anxious to answer calls, they stated today, and with this system in operation, may be reached at all times.

Officers also announced today that bona fide residents of Oregon who are operating motor vehicles with California licenses must secure Oregon licenses at once to avoid prosecution.

G. N. WILL NOT CUT PAYROLLS

The Great Northern payroll in Klamath Falls for the month of December, according to figures released today by C. N. Christopherson, general agent, amounted to \$56,547.38.

"The Great Northern Railway does not expect to make any further reductions in forces here this winter, or, generally speaking, anywhere along its system," Ralph Budd, President stated today, in answer to a query from the Pioneer-Press-Dispatch, which is conducting a survey of local payrolls.

The railway will continue to keep its property in the highest state of maintenance, Mr. Budd said. There are about 25,000 employees at the present time. The policy adopted several years ago of doing car and lo-

comotive work in the railway's shops during the winter to provide maximum employment for shop employees will be continued this winter, Mr. Budd announced.
