Following this impressive rite the Klamath Union high school band presented a selection "Golden Sentimental Overture." Invocation followed, delivered by Ray Shelton, chaplain. An intermission of music followed, during which the Elks quartet composed of John Houston, Jack Francy, R. E. Patterson and Merland Stroud, presented several numbers.

"Our Absent Brothers" was given by Secretary Floyd McMillan and was followed by other musical number by the band and quartet. Altar memorial services were conducted by the exalted ruler and officers of the lodge.

S. P. WILL ADD LOUNGE CARS TO TRAINS 7 AND 8

According to announcement made today by C. M. Biggs, district freight and passenger agent, effective December 28th the "Klamath" trains 7 and 8, named in honor of the City of Klamath Falls, operating on the Cascade line between Portland and Oakland, will take its place with the foremost trains of the west and will carry equipment comparable to that operating on the best trains running between Portland, Seattle and Chicago.

The "Klamath" has always been a popular train with travelers, and in keeping with Southern Pacific's policy of maintaining the highest standard of travel service possible, conclusion was reached to add one of the railroad's new pearl grey lounge cars to the equipment of this train. The "Klamath" just recently was equipped with standard type, and with new roller bearing dining cars. New chair cars were placed in service some time ago, so with the addition of a lounge car the equipment of the "Klamath" is practically brand new throughout.

The lounge cars, to be placed in service on this train, are literally "homes on wheels", having all the comforts of home life, with some others. 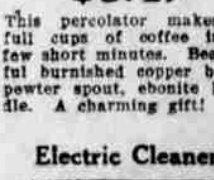
