Tramp Novelist Meets His Last Great Adventure

LONDON, Dec. 10. (AP)—Life's long adventure is over for Bart Kennedy, "tramp novelist," who fought Indians in the American southwest and joined the Alaskan goldrush, meanwhile writing 20 books.

Kennedy, who was 69, died Saturday after a long period of illness but his death did not become generally known for several days. In his life time he shipped before the mast, worked as a cotton mill hand, was Indian fighter and Klondike prospector, and later opera singer and actor.

Among his books were "A Tramp's Philosophy", "A Man Adrift", and "The Hunger Line". He frequently gave his recreation as "doing nothing".

LIGHTNING CAUSES FIRES—Lightning caused more forest fires than any other factor in Great Britain during the season of 1930, the official report shows. Fifty-nine of the total of 190 fires were due to lightning storms. Seventeen blazes were traced to careless smokers and 14 to camp fires.

Fire control this season cost only \$13,479.50, approximately \$6600 less than in 1929.
