Today in Klamath's Theatres

With Sahara sands transmuting to the crisp, flapping, finer and whiter stretches of the Arctic Circle, there is something of the vivid love-power of "The Sheikh" in "The Spoilers," rated by many the peer of Rex Beach stories, and being offered this week at the Pelican Theatre for the first time as a sound and all-talking feature picture.

Something of the epic dimensions of "Wings," too, there is in the new version of the gold-rush adventures about Nome; something of the rugged sincerity of "The Virginian," something of the fascination of "Beau Geste."

Not that "The Spoilers" in talking form is any kind of a crazy quilt; Director Edwin Carow has accomplished a balancing act of the big response-alive chords which movie fans have come to expect in a variety of entertainment aristocrats—yet the whole is as individual as a hand-stamped seal.

To those who have seen the play, to those who have seen the silent form, the talking edition will bring still greater thrills. The stage at best was only a foreboding of the expansive outdoor setting requisite to the action. The silent screen did not compare the resonant timbre that comes with hearing living voices, crunching action, punning battle.

The big fight scene is as impressive as ever, with Gary Cooper and William Boyd, co of stageland's "Quint" renown, tearing, lunging and clawing at each other; as the critical shadows of Farnum, Santucci and Ellis stand space. Other emotion-punching moods, too, has the narrative and romance, feminine charm, comedy and willful roving.

Kay Johnson and Betty Compson, each fighting for the same man, each with the sinking and alert fascination of a panther, slither claws loosed from the velvet veneer of convention, ready for the vital "strike" which spells exultation or hunger to the passion-starved lady heart, "click."

Harry Green and "Slim" Summerville, making riotous heaven of the characterful "sourdough" mimes; James Kirkwood, a strapping prospector pal to Cooper, Lloyd Ingraham, Oscar Apfel and Jack Holmes, all knowing the power of tempo and restraint in paroxysms more important than subordinate, are "there."

The story, classic and perhaps immortal, likely is familiar to all. Under the prestige of the law which they betray, administrators of civil statutes in nervous Alaska, engage in a wholesale "legitimate" despoiling of claims. As is the case when ever man-beasts anywhere permit selfish motives to sully statutes, mob revolt follows. Implements from dainty polished feminine nails and hardly less polished and searing feminine wits, to the bone-crushing power of man-brute hands and the reverberating blast of bulk-charge dynamite, are brought into play before gold-craved men and their women—of one kind or another—relax to the less choppy harbors of a sane conclusion.

Stirring action, vivid backgrounds and thrills vie for supremacy in "Princess of Diamonds," Columbia's all-talking attraction, now playing at the Vox Theatre.

The trouble all started when Rupert Endon, impoverished English aristocrat, won the affection of Robert Crayle's fiancée, Eve Marley. Crayle, a wealthy diamond merchant refused to relinquish his claims, and conspired with Adrian Marley, Eve's rascally brother, to put Endon in prison on a false charge. Crayle made Eve's love the price of Endon's release. After Eve had agreed to marry Crayle, Endon upset everything by escaping from the detectives and departing for the Orient.

Van Buren stage director who co-operated with Brown, are evident in the talking sequences. Colorful settings add their quota to the pictorial value of the production, which is far above the average.
