

IMPROVEMENT PREDICTED IN LUMBER MART

PORTLAND, Ore., Dec. 12, (A.P.)—Hundreds of business men from all parts of the northwest were in Portland today to attend the fifth annual meeting of the Pacific Northwest Lumber Association.

The business leaders were here to hear forecasts of industrial activity that may be expected during the first and second quarters in 1931.

An indication of what may be expected in the various commodity reports was given last night by Colonel W. B. Greeley, chairman of the Pacific Northwest Lumber Association, and other committee members.

Greeley said, after the meeting, his committee would forecast increased activity for the Pacific northwest lumber industry by the second quarter of the coming year. He said the report would say the lumber industry is not enjoying great activity now and probably will not for several months. By late March, however, the demand should be on the upgrade, the report will say.

"We look for an increase in consumption in the second quarter of the year," he said. "We believe lumber and other building materials will share in the first blush of recovery from the depression. There is quite a bit of construction on the boards, and lumber stocks in retail yards are very low, although the mills have good supplies on hand."

Agricultural and other commodities that met yesterday did not make public the nature of their reports.

Local Army Is In Need Of Blankets

"Night blankets for 75 men." That statement, given out yesterday by Ensign Clarence Ford of the Salvation Army, tells a story in itself. It has been necessary to ask aid from Governor Norblad to secure more blankets. Ensign Ford stated that he received word from the governor that he had wired General Craig at the Presidio in San Francisco in an effort to secure 35 blankets and 75 coats for the Klamath Falls Salvation Army.

We hope to get a satisfactory reply from General Craig. It has been necessary for us to get along with only eight blankets every night. An average of 75 men sleep in the Army headquarters every night. They lie on the floor and get what warmth they can from their meagre clothing," Ensign Ford stated.

"Sometimes as many as 125 men are cared for every day at the Salvation Army hall," he stated, "and an average of 75 of them remain during the night."

The family relief work is also growing with the advance of winter. The unemployment situation is beginning to tell," his report stated.

Over \$200 worth of wood has been sold from the Salvation Army's wood yard since October 25. Approximately \$150 of that amount has been clear profit and has been directed into the relief work fund.
