Recommending that no potatoes grade U. S. No. 1 be offered for sale in Klamath county for less than \$1.05 and bags, per cwt. from the present date until January 15, 1931; also, that no U. S. No. 2 potatoes be offered for sale for less than 50 cents and bags, per cwt. from present date to January 15, 1931, was the report of a committee selected to investigate the marketing situation, given at a meeting of the Klamath County Potato Growers' association, Saturday night, at Henley. Cooperation of all potato growers whether members of the association or not is necessary in handling this situation now so vital to all of the potato growers in Klamath county.

Clyde Griffith was elected president of the growers' association and Lawrence Kirk, vice president, when it became necessary to fill the offices due to the resignation of D. W. Ferguson, president, and Chet Barton, vice president.

Council Held Short Meeting Monday Eve

The weekly session of the city council lasted only about half an hour last night and no matters of outstanding importance were presented for consideration.

An ordinance was passed to second reading authorizing the mayor and police judge to enter into a contract with Robinson, Nowell and Company for an audit of the books and records of the city, covering the year 1930. Upon recommendation of the police committee the following permits to operate restaurants were granted: C. R. Fitch for beach Tamal parlor on Spring street near the Southern Pacific depot; A. H. Hale for a lunch counter at 194 South Fourth street, and Mr. and Mrs. George Gerbino for a lunch counter at 209 East Main to be known as The Cascade.

Seven building permits totaling \$5,350, were allowed.

Extra Window Used At Postoffice For Mailing Packages

An extra window for the mailing of packages during the Christmas rush has been established in a vacant room in the rear of the postoffice, 124 South Ninth street, it was announced last night by Postmaster John McCall.
