AMENDED BILL WOULD ASSIST OREGON DIST.

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 18. (AP)—Irrigation districts all over Oregon will be benefitted if an amendment is made to the so-called Smith bill, now pending in congress whereby irrigation as well as drainage districts are extended federal financial aid. Governor Norblad and State Engineer Stricklin both favor the amendment, and the governor yesterday telegraphed the Oregon delegation asking its support. A reply from Representative Hawley today said he believed the amendment would be made by the irrigation committee meeting today.

The plan provides that bonds issued by districts may be purchased by the federal government on a 4 per cent basis, which would be a 2 per cent saving in interest to the districts. Agencies of the government would investigate to satisfy the secretary of the interior that the district could be operated successfully from engineering, economic and legal points of view before loans were accorded, also the secretary would have to be satisfied that the loan could be paid at maturity.

The bill provides for an appropriation of \$150,000 for the purpose of making loans to districts, to be appropriated in any one year.

Loans would be for periods of not over 40 years, repayment of principal to begin not over five years after date of loan, and would be made in annual installments.

It is said that solvent districts rather than insolvent districts should be reorganized would mainly benefit. Solvent districts having bonds outstanding could come under the plan. Southern Oregon districts have shown much interest in the measure and called it to the attention of state officials.

Pacific Greyhound Has Holiday Rates

Holiday rates over the Pacific Greyhound Lines went into effect today, according to Kent Walker, local agent, and will be good for return trips until midnight January 6.

The round trip fares are based on one and one-third times the regular one way fare, giving the following public fares from Klamath Falls to Ashland \$4.30; Medford \$4.50; Grants Pass \$6.35; Roseburg \$8.95; Eugene \$9.15; Corvallis \$10.50; Salem \$11.70; Portland \$13.40; Seattle \$19.40; and Spokane via Portland \$25.40. Tickets will be honored on any schedule and stopovers will be permitted if requested.

Third Member of Robber Gang Dies

DANVILLE, Ill., Dec. 8. (AP)—E. H. Hunter, of Terra Haute, member of a robber gang which Tuesday held up the Clinton, Ind., bank, died at a hospital early today. Hunter was the third of five bandits to die as a result of a gun battle with officers who pursued them. He declined to give authorities any information. The other two were under arrest and the loot was recovered.

Running Time Reduced On G. N. Trains

Additional speeding up in the running time of the Empire Builder and the Oriental Limited was announced today by A. J. Dickinson, passenger traffic manager of the Great Northern. The changes, effective December 28, are an adjustment of present schedules. The Empire Builder will reduce its eastbound running time between Spokane and the Twin Cities, 45 minutes and its westbound schedule about 30 minutes. The Oriental Limited will arrive in the Twin Cities an hour and a half earlier than at present to make better connections with southbound trains. The reduced time will be made between Spokane and the Twin Cities not affecting the leaving time at Seattle, Portland or Spokane. Mr. Dickinson said.
