

INDICTED MEN ARRAIGNED IN COURT TODAY

Seven prisoners, against whom the grand jury brought indictments, were arraigned in circuit court before Judge William M. Duncan this morning. None of the prisoners entered pleas to the charges upon which they were indicted, and the judge set Tuesday morning at 10 o'clock as the time for counsel representing the prisoners to enter their pleas.

Ball for Ray Kades, charged with forgery, was set by Judge Duncan at \$500 after the prisoner's arraignment. In the case of the State of Oregon vs. Steve Smith and Rollin Mounds, indicted of larceny by stealing a steer, bail was set at \$1,500 each. D. E. Fletcher will represent Smith, and Sam Jettmore has been retained by Mounds.

The court appointed W. P. Meyers, attorney, to represent Floyd "Pat" Green, charged with larceny from a person, in the stealing of a watch from one Thomas Mills. Mills was shot on Thanksgiving eve by Hobart Bryant, who has started serving a life term at the state penitentiary.

W. W. Edwards, indicted on a charge of obtaining money by false pretenses, was arraigned before Judge Duncan this morning, and his bond set at \$500. Edwards has not yet retained an attorney, and decided to wait until Tuesday to let him appoint counsel for him.

Ball for Henry Mayberry, colored, was set at \$2,500. Mayberry is charged with a more serious offense than the others arraigned, that of assault with intent to kill. Mayberry will be represented by Ralph W. Horn.

J. C. O'Neill was appointed by the court to represent James Coffey, charged with burglary in a dwelling house in the daytime. Ball for Coffey was set at \$1,500.

After the arraignments, the prisoners were remanded to the custody of two deputy sheriffs, and returned to the county jail. Late this afternoon none of those indicted and arraigned had posted bail.

Canalization Of Columbia Gets Support

PORTLAND, Dec. 20. (AP)—Sixty Portland business men lined up behind the plan for canalization of the Upper Columbia river, at a meeting of the Columbia Valley association last night. A motion that Portlanders back the project and urge every member of the Oregon delegation in congress to strive for immediate passage of the Steiwer bill for that purpose, was adopted.

The Steiwer bill, to be considered at the present session, provides for an appropriation of \$855,000 for deepening and straightening the channel from Cascade Locks to Lewiston. A depth of seven feet in the Columbia and five feet in the Snake river is contemplated.

"More Laws Make More Criminals" Says Judge

PORTLAND, Dec. 20. (AP)—Slapping the business of "making more laws that make more criminals," Hall S. Lusk, recently appointed circuit judge of Multnomah county, criticized legislators of the country at the late session yesterday of the state district attorneys' meeting.

"I want to join the growing chorus," he declared, "and it will continue to grow larger and louder, of those in this country who are criticizing the legislators for enactment of laws that interfere with the liberties of the people."

"There is no greater menace to this country than the new crimes caused by restrictive legislation that is crowding our statute books today."

APPEAL FILED FROM DECISION

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (AP)—The government late today filed in the supreme court its appeal from the decision of Judge Clark in New Jersey holding the 13th amendment invalid.

Attorney General Mitchell hopes to obtain from opposing counsel a waiver of the rules of the supreme court so the appeal may be presented to the court when it reconvenes on Jan. 8. It is expected on that day the department of justice will ask the court to advance the case for an early hearing.

It is thought the court may set the case down for hearing during the week beginning January 19.

Should it not be set for hearing during that week it cannot be taken up by the court before February 24.

preparations for the congressional recess over the holidays were resumed.

Aside from the work being done on the senate and house floors, a good deal of attention at the capitol today went to the senate campaign funds hearing. Robert H. Lucas, executive director for the Republican National committee testified about his having paid more than \$4,000 for campaign literature seeking the defeat for reelection of Senator Norris, republican independent of Nebraska.

WASHINGTON, Dec. 20. (AP)—The senate today passed the emergency \$116,000,000 public works bill.

This completes congressional action on the appropriation, which becomes available immediately upon signature of the bill by the President. The administration intends to put the funds into operation at once on a vast public improvement program, extending through the nation.

Sponsors of the bill said it would give employment to thousands.

Bill Is Criticized
The measure got through the senate finally today after Senators La Follette, republican, Wisconsin, and Walsh, democrat Massachusetts, assailed it as a "drop in the bucket," and demanded additional appropriations to be expended for direct relief.

Passage of the bill was made possible when the senate receded from three amendments in dispute with the house. It abandoned the amendments without record votes when it became an issue of making the money available before the Christmas recess.

Big Sum For Roads
Of the sum \$39,000,000 would be spent in road construction. Island waterway improvements and public buildings construction will get the remainder.

President Hoover is given authority under the bill to allocate the money as he deems necessary if any emergency arises. It is contemplated most of the money will be spent before the first of the new fiscal year—next July 1.

Congress has now passed two emergency relief measures—the bill authorizing \$45,000,000 for drought relief having won final approval last night. Both measures were on their way to the White House today.

Dairying Is
Aid To Farms
Of Northwest

SPOKANE, Wash., Dec. 20. (A. P.)—Agricultural conditions in the four northwest states, as seen through the eyes of the Federal Land bank, have not been greatly affected by the business depression, delegates to the convention of secretaries of national farm loan associations of Montana, meeting here yesterday, were told.

R. E. Shepherd, Jerome, Idaho, chairman of the board for the bank, said wheat prices affect only a relatively small part of the northwest, dairying is being carried on profitably, "hog farms" are not being abandoned and farmers generally are in a "pretty comfortable position."

The meetings will be continued today.

YOUNG RAPPED BY FRIENDS OF THOS. MOONEY

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 20. (A. P.)—An attack on Governor C. Young and his attitude toward pardoning Thos. J. Mooney and Warren K. Billings, serving life terms as the alleged bombers of a Preparedness parade here in 1916, was issued in the form of a lengthy statement here today by the Tom Mooney-Molders' Defense committee. The statement was signed by Anna Mooney, Thomas Mooney's sister.

The statement accused Governor Young of "stalling" and of being afraid to act in the Mooney case for fear of the "people." If he did not pardon Mooney and for fear of the "interests" if he did. The statement also says "Justice is dead in California and Mooney and Billings will have to rot in prison because the people have not the courage to bring that pressure upon Governor Young which he or no other public official will even dare to ignore."

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SAM E. NOTSON ELECTED HEAD OF ATTORNEYS

PORTLAND, Dec. 20. (AP)—Sam E. Notson, of Heppner, prosecutor for Morrow county, was elected head of the State District Attorneys association here today.

Other officers are Edwin Hicks Canyon City, Grant county, vice-president, and John Baker, Hood River, secretary.

The association adopted a resolution that in all criminal cases except those in which the penalty is capital punishment, eleven jurors be permitted to return a verdict.

Another resolution adopted called for appointment of a committee to study various systems and reforms in penal administration, the committee to report its findings to the 1931 legislature.

The resolution said "the penal administration of the state of Oregon, particularly with reference to the state penitentiary, is inadequate and insufficient to accomplish the ends of justice and to bring about the reformation and treatment of the criminal along scientific lines." This resolution recognized the need of separate institutions for youthful or first offenders.

In another resolution the district attorneys confirmed their contention the state should have an equal number of prosecuting challenges with the defense in selection of juries in criminal cases.
