Several thousand visitors were conducted through Klamath's finest bakery Saturday, when Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Landis opened their new plant, the Better Baking company, on North Seventh street. The guests were taken through the entire plant from the sales room to the baking chambers, and each detail of the baking business carefully explained to them.

The sales room of the new store was filled with scores of baskets and bouquets of flowers sent as compliments from their friends and business associates. The display cases were filled with tempting breads and pastries, especially arranged as an opening day feature.

Scores of salesmen visited Klamath Falls on that day to attend

the opening, and bakery owners from coast cities were also in attendance. Each visitor was lauded in his praise of the new plant, and many of these stated that it was, without exception, the finest bakery shop on the entire coast.

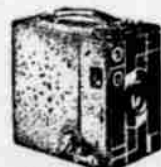
