Exercise and dieting both figure importantly in keeping fit, but according to Ann Harding, the most important thing of all in attaining and retaining the fashionable slender form is keeping regular hours both as to eating and sleeping.

Miss Harding, who is playing at the Pelican Theatre in the new First National and Vitaphone production, "The Girl of the Golden West," says she has experienced the inconveniences of being both too fat and too thin. She has tried both dieting and exercise for taking off and putting on pounds and found them slow means of producing or taking off weight. Then she tried regulating her hours.

"Up every morning at six-thirty, a brisk walk whether the day is dark or fair, a cold shower followed by a breakfast of raw fruit, cereal, toast and soft-boiled eggs. Then I am ready for work or play. If I have a call for that day I go immediately to the studio, or if I am not working, I go out to take care of whatever business I have. Promptly at 12 o'clock I have a light luncheon, preferably a salad, a cup of tea, toast and stewed fruit, or if I want to put on weight I have milk instead of tea. A glass of milk again at 4 o'clock if I want to gain and lose or without lemon if I want to remain as I am. At 7 o'clock dinner and 10:30 to bed. Keep to this regular mode of living for thirty days and you will be astonished at the results."

According to Miss Harding, exercising plays a strange trick. "Even though you want to take off weight by exercising strenuously you may become so muscular that you put on instead. Muscular weight is such permanent weight that it is almost hopeless to expect to lose it. Strenuous dieting works havoc with the digestive organs and puts people in such a state of mind that they are not pleasant neighbors. So after all it is not as effective as it should be.

"If you are too fat or too thin, try the regulation method, and see if it is not the most pleasing and effective of all," says Miss Harding.

AT THE PINE TREE
