

Churches Offer Good Programs for Christmas

Special Music Will Feature Services at The Catholic and Episcopal Churches and At the Klamath Temple

Church observance of the Christmas season will begin Wednesday night with midnight masses in the Sacred Heart church in Klamath Falls and in the Catholic churches at Merrill and Chiloquin. Midnight choral and religious services at the Episcopal church will usher in Christmas day. Swedish Service

Early Swedish Christmas service, or the famous, time-honored Swedish "Julotta," will be celebrated Christmas day morning at 5:30 in Scandia hall on Ninth and Washington. Rev. A. G. Sporrang, district superintendent of the North Pacific Missionary conference of Seattle, Wash., will conduct this service. There will be music and singing of the old Swedish carols.

Rev. Sporrang will preach on the theme, "The Birth of the Savior of the World." A Christmas missionary offering will be taken. There will also be Scandinavian services on Sunday, December 28th, at the same place, morning and evening. At that Sunday night service a Swedish "Julotta" will be given. All Scandinavian people are cordially invited to attend these services.

Church at Langell Valley Dedicated Sunday Afternoon

St. Barnabas church in Langell Valley was opened Sunday, when 120 rural citizens attended services under the direction of Archdeacon J. Henry Thomas. On Friday the men of Langell Valley will work on the interior of the church in preparation for the Christmas service which will be held the following Sunday.

Storm Center Federal Board Resigns Post

WASHINGTON, Dec. 23. (AP) Solicitor Charles A. Russell and Chief Accountant Frank V. King, of the Federal Power commission today were removed from office in the first executive order of Chairman Smith.

The action was taken under the terms of the water power act providing for reorganization of the commission, which granted the incoming commissioners power to appoint or reappoint officials of the commission.

The notification followed a recent opinion of the attorney general that the new commission could refuse to reappoint officials.

Shortly before the chairman acted, Frank E. Bonner, executive secretary of the commission and a storm center for some months, resigned.

Governor Norblad Would Represent U. S. in Holland

SALEM, Dec. 23. (AP)—Governor Norblad, who will retire from office January 12, is a candidate for minister to Holland to succeed the late Gerritt Dickema. Letters and telegrams signed by several prominent Oregon men, including State Labor Commissioner C. H. Gram and Secretary of State Hoss, have been sent President Hoover urging Norblad's appointment to the post. Oregon now has one citizen filling a major diplomatic office. He is E. E. Brodie of Oregon City who is minister to Finland.

1702 MEN REGISTER FOR ROAD EMPLOYMENT

SALEM, Dec. 23. (AP)—The latest report received by the state employment commission shows that in 13 counties 1702 men have registered in the emergency employment movement. Of these 427 are single and 1275 married. They have a total of 4975 dependents.
