HOLLYWOOD, Cal., Dec. 26. (AP)—In his humbly way, Will Rogers paid tribute to Kin Hubbard, his friend of many years, who died in Indianapolis.

With his shock of iron-grey hair falling as ever over his forehead, the famed comedian and humorist was found in a dressing room on a film lot, preparing for his part in a picture, when word of Hubbard's death was brought to him.

"Hello, guy! What ya want?" he boomed at a friend entering the door.

"You knew Kin Hubbard?" the friend inquired.

"Sure, why?"

"He's dead."

"What?" Rogers' voice was sharp in profound surprise and the entrancing twinkle of his grey eyes faded suddenly to a dazed expression.

"Why, why—" he stammered and lapsed into silence.

Then he told of Kin Hubbard.

"I met him twenty years ago while I was on the stage. Every time I went to Indianapolis, we had long visits. He used to send me every book he published."

"Why Kin Hubbard was at the top for real downright humor. He's forgotten more humor than all the rest of 'em probably ever will know."

"How old was he?"

"Sixty two."

"Sixty two. I didn't think he was that old. Good old Kin—"

he started to say and his voice drifted away into silent memory.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Dec. 26. (AP)—Osway county officers today were investigating the shooting in which Deputy Sheriff John Mosley, Miss Martha Smith and Hint Heard were killed, and Leonard, Lawrence and Andy Smith, brothers of the slain woman, were wounded.

Sheriff G. D. Wilson said his deputy was slain when he entered the Smith home to make an arrest on a robbery charge. The sheriff said a general gun battle then broke out between the deputy's brother, Pierce Mosley, and several occupants of the home, who, he said, evidently set a trap for the officer in an attempt to prevent arrest of their kinsmen.

POISON LIQUOR CAUSES DEATHS

NEW YORK, Dec. 26. (AP)—Five persons were dead today because they drank poison liquor on Christmas.

In their homes, on the streets, in subway stations and on piers they dropped yesterday and were taken to hospitals for treatment that failed. Five more deaths were being investigated in the same connection and 45 persons were being doctoring for acute alcoholism.

Dr. Charles Norris, medical examiner, said it was the lightest Yuletide toll in three years. Last year 53 cases were treated although there were no official fatalities. In 1928, there were two deaths and 53 instances of alcoholism.

The dead were John Cochrane, 52; Patrick A. Breen, 42; Andrew Reichert, 34, and two unidentified men. Among the mortuaries under scrutiny was that of Mrs. Lena Gorman, 55, whose body was found in a vacant lot on west 17th street.

Arms Torn From Body When Bomb Drops From Case

NEW DELHI, India, Dec. 26. (AP)—One person was fatally injured and two others were wounded when a bomb exploded in the Delhi central station today, near the elevator between the station and the restaurant.

The baggage master in the second class waiting room had found an unclaimed suitcase and was taking it to his storeroom on a lower floor. As he was about to enter the elevator an object which looked like a cigarette case fell from the bag and struck the floor with a sharp explosion.

Both the elevator boy's arms were blown off and two baggage handlers were badly injured. Police detained a man found in the waiting room and placed a guard about the station.

Merger Underway By Two Companies

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 26. (AP)—Negotiations for a merger of Fagel Motors corporation of Oakland and Moreland Motor Truck company of Los Angeles have been initiated, officials of the former concern admitted today.

The aim of the move is to build up a strong bus and truck business that will be able to compete in the Pacific territory with eastern producers.

Consolidation plans are in tentative shape and will require considerable investigations, inspections, appraisals, determination of inventories and checking of receivables before a definite proposal can be offered to the directors. It is expected specific action may be taken early in January.

Plans already outlined indicate the prospective company will operate in the 11 far western and Pacific states and in territory readily accessible to water transportation on the shores of the Pacific ocean.
