

FORGED STOCK IS DISCOVERED IN NEW YORK

NEW YORK, Dec. 27. (AP)—A warning that forged temporary certificates for Fox Film class A stock had been discovered in Chicago has been issued by the Better Business bureau, an organization of merchants.

Since the permanent certificates have been listed on the New York stock exchange, the temporary ones no longer are negotiable, the statement said, but financial houses were cautioned against receiving them.

The bureau and the Bankers Trust company are conducting an investigation to determine whether the forgery was widespread.

CHICAGO, Dec. 27. (AP)—The Chicago stock exchange and the association of stock exchange members have warned all their members firms to send in certificates for inspection, following the New York exchange's order to stop trading in temporary Fox Film class A certificates.

Arthur Wood, president of the Chicago exchange, said he had discovered the existence of other forged stocks since Louis Lissman was arrested Wednesday as he tried to cash a \$25,000 check given him by a brokerage firm in exchange for 900 shares of alleged forged Fox Film stocks.

The brokers, Stein, Alstirn and company, said they verified other Fox certificates with the Bankers Trust company of New York and no other forgeries were disclosed.

However, the Herald and Examiner said today forged certificates representing 2,900 shares of Fox stock valued at \$29,000 had been discovered and that forged stock of at least two other large corporations "has been placed in circulation."

Fifty Thousand See Notre Dame Play All-Stars

COLISEUM, Los Angeles, Dec. 27. (AP)—Clear, cool football weather greeted the all Notre Dame and all-star teams as they took the field here today with 50,000 people in the big bowl.

Football names that spelled magic to the fans, drew the crowd, which centered its attention on Carleton, Eder, Bril and Savoldi, backfield stars of Notre Dame, and Saunders, Welch and Price, who wrote gridiron history at Southern California, Purdue and Utah, respectively. There was a time of disappointment in the absence of Notre Dame's famous coach, Knute Rockne, from the South Bend bench, but this was offset by the appearance of Joe Savoldi, the plunging halfback.

First period: The all Notre Dame combination took the kick off and on eleven plays marched straight down the field for a touchdown. Savoldi scoring for 20 yards and Eder's spectacular end run put the ball on the six yard line from where Savoldi crashed across. Carleton, as usual.

On the first play, Eder slipped through left tackle for 45 yards. Savoldi went the remaining distance on the second play to score. Carleton again kicked goal. Score: All Notre Dame 15; all star 0.

LIFE OF AGED VET NEAR END

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stages of this disease, threatened the marshal's life.

It was the right leg which was amputated, and because of the patient's advanced age—he is nearly 79—and his generally weakened condition, there appeared to be scant hope that he could pull through.

Marshal Joffre, whose full name is Joseph Jacques Cesarre Joffre, will be 79 years old January 12 next. In the course of his extended military career he has successfully led campaigns in Asia, Africa and Europe.

He was born in 1852 at River-sur-Loire, at the edge of the Eastern Pyrenees, of Spanish lineage, and was one of eleven children. The Franco-German war interrupted his studies as a youth, and he took part in the defense of Paris in 1870.

After the loss of his first wife he applied for a transfer to Indochina, and aided in occupation of Formosa in 1885, remaining three years at Hanoi as chief of engineers. In 1893 he was sent to Senegal, and in 1894 led a column on Tumbucutu, entering the town on February 12, 1894, after marching nearly 600 miles.

He became a general of brigade in 1900, and a general of division in 1905, and was called to the superior council in 1910. In 1911 he became chief of staff and vice president of the council. He took up the post of commander in chief of the French army on August 5, 1914. Two days after Germany declared war on France, and thereafter for two years the history of his life was the history of the war in the west itself.

His greatest victory, perhaps, was on September 6, when he threw the Germans back on the Aisne in the memorable battle of the Marne.

With replacement of M. Miller and as minister of war on October 26, 1915, by General Gallieni, military governor of Paris, General Joffre received the supreme command of all French armies. A campaign against his leadership developed, and after the indecisive result of the great allied battle on the Somme he was made technical adviser to the government in matters concerning the direction of the war.

COMMISSIONER OF PRISONS TO VISIT STATES

SOUTHAMPTON, England, Dec. 27. (AP)—Alexander Paterson, a mild-mannered man, sailed today on the Mauretania for a four-months holiday in American penitentiaries.

Paterson is commissioner of prisons in England, and he hopes to learn all the new American trade secrets, witness an electrocution and meet Al Capone.

"America is far ahead of us in prison building and administration in many ways," Paterson said. "I will be the first Englishman to study the American system in 23 years. I think it's about time."

Back of his visit is a contemplated prison building program here.

"Most of our prisons were built in an era when prison ideas were decidedly different," said Paterson.

"I am also interested in prison industries. We have only a little of that here—our prisons are not properly equipped for it—but we hope to make them self-supporting and possibly pay wages."

In Chicago, naturally, he hopes to meet Capone, and he doesn't insist it be in a jail. Capone, incidentally, is mentioned in the English papers more often than in American journals.

"I'd like to see what sort of a man he is," Paterson said. "I also hope to walk some in the streets of Chicago"—this last somewhat seriously.

According to the custom in British hospitals the donor of the blood remains unidentified, even to Lady Alexandra, who has been kept in her bed since the birth of twin daughters November 15.

Lady Metcalfe is the daughter of the late Lord and Lady Curzon, and is a sister of Lady Cynthia Mosley, whose husband is outstanding in British socialist politics.

Fire Loss During Past Year Said To Be Smaller

SALEM, Ore., Dec. 27 (AP)—Notwithstanding a long and hazardous fire season losses in merchantable timber, logs and logging equipment and damage to settler was smaller during the 1930 season than for any other year since 1916, says a statement today by State Forester Lynn F. Cronemiller.

The total loss was only \$79,497 in the 1260 fires fought during the season and the burned area was 52,670 acres.

During the 1929 season 1472 fires burned over 295,235 acres and caused a total loss of over \$1,500,000.

The main loss of the 1930 season was caused by the fire east of Bend. Most of the fires were caused by lightning.
