CENTENNIAL OF OREGON TRAIL IS OBSERVED

PORTLAND, Dec. 30, (AP)—In Portland and New York last night covered wagons lumbered and groaned in memory. It was the close of the covered wagon centennial observation proclaimed by President Hoover last April 10, the hundredth anniversary of the departure of the first wagon train over the Oregon trail.

In Portland hundreds of persons gathered in the civic auditorium to honor the pioneer spirit of the west. Many of the pioneers were there, among them, Captain Oliver Applegate of Modoc Indian war fame; William H. Newman, one of his scouts in the campaign against the Indians; C. A. Ackerman, George H. Himes, J. L. Carter and L. H. Baker.

In New York the Oregon trail opening ended with 500 guests at a banquet. Many guests wore costumes of pioneer days. The memory of Ezra Meeker, founder of the Oregon Trail association, was commemorated.

Captain O. C. Applegate, Klamath's outstanding pioneer and the last survivor of the Modoc Indian war of 1873, is taking an active part in the celebration commemorating the 100th anniversary of the departure of the first wagon train over the Oregon trail.

The Covered Wagon centennial observance is being sponsored in Portland by the association under the management of Walter Meekham. At an afternoon program held for children Monday, Captain Oliver Applegate, spoke briefly to the young generation.

WILL REQUEST LEGISLATORS FOR RATE QUIZ

PORTLAND, Dec. 30, (AP)—Senator J. E. Bennett of Multnomah county announced today he will introduce a resolution at the coming legislative session asking authorization for an investigation of telephone charges in Oregon. The resolution would authorize a conference with Telephone company officials and a committee named jointly by the president of the senate and speaker of the house, in regard to voluntary reduction of tolls.

The committee would have power under terms of the resolution, to "subpoena witnesses, investigate the books of the Telephone company, and shall have all the powers now vested in the public service commission of Oregon."

The resolution stipulates a report of findings and recommendations be filed within 15 days of the passage of the resolution.

U. S. REFUSES RECOGNITION TO GUATEMALA

WASHINGTON, Dec. 30, (AP)—The American legation at Guatemala City on instructions of the state department has informed the Guatemalan government the United States will not recognize the regime of President Orellana.

Department officials refused to comment. It was said on high authority, however, that the disinclination to extend recognition to Guatemala was based on the terms of the treaty of 1923, which set forth the conditions under which new regimes in Central America may be recognized.

The attitude of the state department was asserted to be that the Orellana regime came to power through a civil coup d'etat, and not under any constitutional provisions allowing recognition under the terms of the treaty.
