MANY CHANGES ARE PLANNED IN GAME LAWS

PORTLAND, Dec. 31. (AP)—A bill requiring each licensed fisherman or hunter to report to the game commission the number of game animals, birds or fish taken during the season, was being considered by the State Game Commission here today. A penalty would be imposed for refusal or neglect to make such a report. The law would apply to both resident and non-resident sportsmen.

The Game Commission will submit its revised code to the legislature. A law making it unlawful to carry a loaded firearm in an automobile will be supported. Prohibition of fishing from a boat or other floating device in the McKenzie river above the mouth of the Blue river, and in the Deschutes river would be prohibited.

Steelhead would be classified as trout all over the state under terms of another regulation. Change in the deer season would allow a season for forked horn deer from Sept. 20 and Oct. 20. The bag limit would be two black-tail deer or one mule deer or one white-tail deer. Shotguns not larger than .10 gauge, and shot no larger than double 11 will be prohibited in hunting migratory birds.

Shleucers from arms will be prohibited, but a cutts compensator may be used. The Game Commission will be authorized to levy a tax of 10 cents to 25 cents a fish for game fish brought into the state for sale.

Parties hunting on their own land or elsewhere will be required to take out a license when hunting for deer. A year-around closed season for beaver will be established.

Ex-Convict Is Said To Have Slain Sisters

BLACKWELL, Okla., Dec. 31. (AP)—Earl Quinn, ex-convict, was sought by officers from Norman, Okla., to Chicago today in connection with the slaying of Jessie and Jessie Griffith, sisters, on a highway near Tonkawa Sunday.

Quinn, said to have police records at Kansas City and Chicago, has served two terms in the Missouri State penitentiary. He was named last night by Bruce Potter, Kay county attorney, as the man sought in connection with the slaying of the sisters, one of whom was criminally attacked. Potter also announced a woman under arrest at Tonkawa was Quinn's wife. Mrs. Quinn, Potter said, purchased a gun and shells in Tonkawa the night before the killings.

Potter said he had information "very damaging" to Quinn, who, he said, his investigation revealed was in Tonkawa the night before the women were slain.

Mr. and Mrs. W. D. Cofer have returned from a brief visit to Grants Pass.

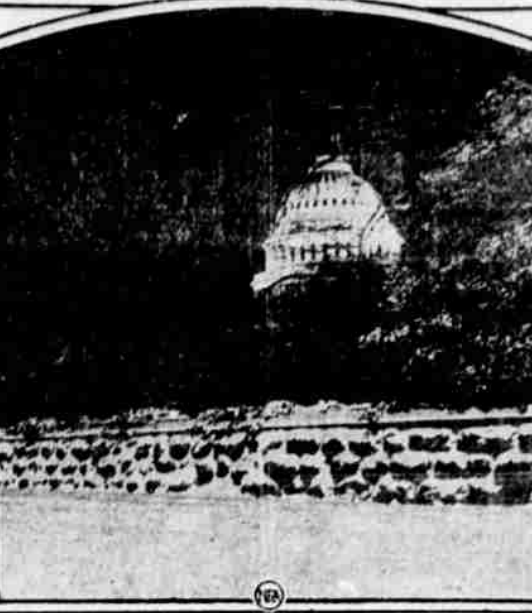
Fort Klamath Visitor—

CANADA WHEAT GROWERS HEAR RELIEF PLANS

REGINA, Sask., Dec. 31. (AP)—Creation of a private corporation that will use its capital of \$5,000,000 as a revolving fund to make loans to farmers has been announced by Premier R. B. Bennett.

The shareholders will be banks, transportation companies, industrial firms, insurance organizations and mortgage companies. It was not in the public interest, Bennett said, to discuss details of the plan, adding that the important thing was to effect its immediate application to tide Canadian farmers over the present emergency.

He said the Dominion government would make no effort to fix wheat prices as that was within the jurisdiction of the provinces. A price fixed in excess of the world price would be unwise, he pointed out, because Canada could not hope to absorb her surplus wheat by domestic consumption.

Word has been received, he added, that France would guarantee to buy between 7,000,000 and 9,500,000 bushels of the 1930 Canadian wheat crop. H. H. Maller, Canadian minister to Japan, now on his way to China to negotiate the purchase of millions of bushels of Canadian wheat by the Chinese government, Mr. Bennett said, adding that the Canadian government is prepared to provide credit facilities to China to obtain the market.

WINNIPEG, Dec. 31. (AP)—Some disappointment was expressed today at plans outlined by Premier Bennett for the relief of western farmers, in an address at Regina, Sask. George H. Williams, president of the Saskatchewan section of the United Farmers of Canada, declared he could find little of promise to the farmer except the guarantee of equitable Hudson Bay railway rates and an implication the Dominion government would assist in finding seed for next year.

Premier John Bracken of Manitoba declared the address would be "very heartening to many distressed farmers," but expressed his personal disappointment that Premier Bennett had not seen fit to fix a minimum price on wheat.

He said he considered the Premier's plan to create an agricultural corporation as "sound." The offer to cooperate with provincial governments in providing free food, clothing and seed grain for needy farmers, he said, would be "readily accepted and appreciated."

SOUNDS LIKE MILK
LONDON.—Brittishers are to drink the purest of beer now as a result of a pasteurizing system which is being employed by breweries. The pasteurizing is done much in the same manner as milk purification. The beer is brought to a temperature of 140 degrees Fahrenheit, a heat sufficient to kill harmful germs. This aids in "keeping" the beer.
