

BOY RETURNED TO HOME AFTER TWENTY HOURS

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 2. (AP)—Charles Y. Abernathy, 28-year-old negro and son of Pearl Abernathy, negro real estate dealer here, was the kidnaper of Adolphus Busch Orthwein, 18-year-old grandson of August A. Busch, president of Anheuser-Busch, Inc., Harry Troll, attorney for the family, disclosed today.

While Troll would not make a definite statement, this was learned from him after police and special investigators said they had determined Charles Abernathy was the abductor. The senior Abernathy brought about the restoration of the boy to his parents yesterday afternoon after he had been kidnapped from the family chauffeur New Year's Eve and held for 20 hours.

Troll said that yesterday afternoon Pearl Abernathy telephoned Percy J. Orthwein, the boy's father, told him the boy was safe and said "as father to father, I want to return your boy."

The attorney said no ransom money was paid for the return of young Orthwein and let it be understood the price for the release of the boy was a promise not to prosecute Charles Abernathy. The son of the negro real estate dealer today was reported in hiding.

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 2. (AP)—Details of how the release of 13-year Adolphus Busch Orthwein was effected late yesterday, 20 hours after he had been kidnapped by an armed negro, remained undivulged today.

The boy, grandson of August A. Busch, president of Anheuser-Busch, Inc., and great-grandson of Adolphus Busch, late multi-millionaire brewer, was found on a road in St. Louis county after the Orthwein family had received a telephone call saying he was safe.

Harry Troll, attorney for the boy's father, Percy J. Orthwein, executive of an advertising agency, said "not a cent changed hands," but added the Busch family would stand by an agreement made by Orthwein shortly after the abduction to reward generously any informant who furnished information leading to the return of Adolphus "and that absolutely no questions would be asked."

Last night Adolphus was allowed to talk with newspapermen in the presence of his father, Attorney Troll and his brother, Jimmy, 5. He said he was not afraid, but complained that the abductor gave him "very dirty" food for breakfast and dinner yesterday.

St. Louis police officials said today their investigation would "continue unabated."

Matson Steamer Is Hit By Fire At Seattle Dock

SEATTLE, Jan. 2. (AP)—Fire of unknown origin in the hold of the steamer Maliko of the Matson Navigation company, here early today, caused damage estimated at \$100,000.

Approximately 200 firemen, 16 pieces of apparatus and two fire boats, the Alki and Snoqualmie, fought the blaze which started in No. 3 shelter deck amidships and quickly spread aft, for three hours before the flames were controlled.

The Maliko of 6347 gross tons, 423 feet over all, was scheduled to leave here late today for the Hawaiian Islands. She was loaded with grain and general cargo. The loss was completely covered by insurance.

Sleet Storm Makes Travel Hazardous On River Highway

PORTLAND, Jan. 2. (AP)—Crews from the state highway department were fighting a sleet storm on the Columbia River highway today and while they expected to keep the route open, driving is extremely hazardous.

Crown Point is very slippery, with the sleet covering the sand spread by the workers. At Bonneville the sleet was turning to snow at 9 a. m. while at Cascade Locks the road was also white. Two and a half inches of snow is reported at The Dalles. Chains are advisable.

Motorists enroute to eastern Oregon are advised to take the Wapinitia cut-off, where additional highway crews are at work.

LOGAN & BRYAN BOND HOUSE IS GIVEN PERMIT

SALEM, Jan. 2. (AP)—Logan & Bryan, New York stockbrokers who formerly operated in Oregon through the Portland firm of Overbeck & Cooke, which crashed with losses to patrons, were today granted a license by State Corporation Commissioner McCallister to operate a branch office in Oregon. McCallister spent New Year's Day completing a check on his investigation of the New York firm's Oregon application, which was denied several months ago because of the nature of its connections with Overbeck & Cooke.

McCallister did not cancel the Logan & Bryan permit in Oregon following the Overbeck & Cooke crash, but the firm withdrew from operation in this state and its permit was cancelled automatically.

In the course of his investigation McCallister says he found that Logan & Bryan paid \$250,000 towards repaying persons entitled to returns from the insolvent Portland firm, though there was no certainty that it was legally responsible for that amount.

McCallister's denial, several months ago, of the Logan & Bryan application to re-enter Oregon was based on the fact, McCallister said, that \$21,000 was due to persons who had bought stock through the two concerns and had been sold out. This amount was later paid by Logan & Bryan when the firm withdrew a mandamus suit it had filed in the Marion county circuit court to compel McCallister to issue the license.

FLYING SCHOLARSHIPS.

PARIS, Jan. 2.—In order to promote the popularity of aviation, the French government has announced that it will provide scholarships to flying schools to entrants passing examinations. The scholarships provide for preliminary flying instructions at a private school, and an eleven-month course at the military school at Istres. All expenses are to be paid.
