REDUCE TIME ON G. N. LINE

Another reduction in the running time of the Great Northern's Empire Builder and Oriental Limited went into effect Sunday, according to C. N. Christopherson, general agent here.

The Empire Builder will clip 45 minutes from its eastbound and 30 minutes from its westbound running time. The changes affect the arrival and departure hours at only the eastern terminals, the eastbound train arriving in Chicago at 8:45 a. m. instead of 9:30 a. m. at present, and the westbound train leaving Chicago at 10:45 o'clock at present, 30 minutes later than at present.

Eastbound Speeded—The eastbound Oriental Limited will be speeded up, arriving at St. Paul an hour and a half earlier at night, at 8:30, instead of 10 o'clock.

This is the sixth cut in running time made since the Empire Builder was placed in service, a year and a half ago. More than 12 hours have been cut from the transcontinental schedule by the Great Northern since that time.

Mr. Christopherson emphasized the fact that the Great Northern is not participating in a "speed war" and said that the purpose in making the initial drastic reduction was to save a business day for travelers at both the east and west terminals, by providing evening departure and morning arrival hours. The first cut was approximately five hours. The ease with which the Great Northern was able to maintain the new fast schedule, on account of its short routes and easy grades, encouraged the railroad's officials gradually to make the morning arrival hours still earlier in the day and the evening departure hours still later at night.

Shortened Schedule

This policy resulted in numerous schedule shortenings, in the way of "refinements" for the convenience of the traveling public, and the new schedules, Mr. Christopherson said, are probably as ideal as can be achieved by the west-bound Empire Builder leaving Chicago at 10:45 at night, St. Paul at 8:50 next morning, arriving at Spokane at 9:30 p. m., the following night, and in Portland at 7:35 the next morning.

Eastbound the Empire Builder

leaves Portland and Seattle at 9:30 p. m., Spokane at 7:45 the following morning, arriving in St. Paul at 10:30 the next night, and in Chicago at 8:45 the following morning.

Russian Suspect

Is Arrested By Portland Police

PORTLAND, Jan. 3 (AP)—An arrested for the immigration department, Luka Shako, 44, believed by federal officers to be a member of the Soviet secret police, was being held here today for investigation. He had more than \$3,000 in currency in his pockets when arrested. Officials believe he came to Portland for the purpose of passing out several Communists in jail here.

Shako was arrested a few hours after he arrived here. In addition to the money, he had seven bank books showing various funds credited to him in other cities. One book showed \$5,000 in his account at Pittsburgh.

Shako said the money represented his life's savings.

Millinery Model Shot By Husband

NEW YORK, Jan. 3 (AP)—An attractive millinery model was found fatally shot on a Brooklyn porch shortly after midnight and her dying statement led to the arrest of her grocery clerk husband on a homicide charge.

L. A. Yvonne Cassieri, 19, and the mother of an 8-year-old daughter, was discovered on the porch in the Flatbush section with three bullet wounds in her body. Her automobile stood a block down the street with a revolver and five cartridges on the floor.

Just before she died police asked her who shot her.

"My husband," she was quoted as saying. Pressed for a motive she declared, "because he loved me and I loved him."

TWO KILLED IN POWDER BLAST

SHELTON, Neb., Jan. 3 (AP)—Two boys died today from injuries received when one of them dropped a lighted candle into a 20-pound can of blasting powder. They were James McMullen, 12, son of Andrew McMullen, farmer living near here, and Wayne Hogg, 10, son of F. C. Hogg, also a farmer. Late yesterday afternoon the two boys took the candle and started to explore the storeroom on the second floor of the McMullen home. They found the can of blasting powder and opened it to see what it contained before continuing their exploration.

In some unknown manner the boy who held the candle lost his grip on it and it fell into the powder container.

The terrific blast blew James through a window and 20 feet beyond the house. Wayne was burned when the house caught fire. The boys were taken to a Kearney, Neb., hospital where death occurred.
