The remainder of the itinerary includes Kenitra, Morocco; Villa Cisneros, Spanish Gold Coast; Bolama, Portuguese West Africa; across the South Atlantic to Porto Natal, Brazil, 1860 miles; Bahia, and on to Rio de Janeiro.

Meier Names Miss Walton As Secretary

PORTLAND, Jan. 5. (AP)—Julius L. Meier, governor-elect, today announced Miss Beatrice Walton has been appointed his private secretary. Miss Walton was private secretary to the late Governor I. L. Patterson.

Miss Walton became secretary to Governor Patterson after Hal E. Horn resigned the post to take up the duties of secretary of state.

Prior to that time Miss Walton was secretary of the state department of education which she held for three years, until she entered the governor's office as assistant secretary, in which capacity she served until Horn's resignation.

Several months following the incumbency of Governor Norblad Miss Walton resigned and has since been traveling in Europe.

She will assume her new post as secretary to Governor Meier January 12.

Miss Walton was born in Salem, Ore., and after completing her education at Mills College, California, she was a teacher in English in Oregon high schools.

GIRL FLYERS MAKE ATTEMPT TO BEAT MARK

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 5. (AP)—Robbie Trout and Edna May Cooper, girl pilots circled their small monoplane through lowering clouds today, undaunted in their effort to set a new endurance flight record by a near-disaster late yesterday.

The girls took off at 2:30 p. m. yesterday in an effort to break the 42 hour, 16 minutes women's endurance record now held by Miss Trout and Elinor Smith and in the hope of remaining aloft to threaten the men's international record of 645 hours, 25 minutes, 30 seconds, held by Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, of St. Louis.

They went aloft with a light load and made three refueling contacts before dark. During the second contact a rope used to lower the girls' dinner basket from the refueling plane blew back and fouled the controls on the tail of the "Lady Rolph," the endurance ship.

Displaying iron nerve, Miss Trout, at the controls of the "Lady Rolph," and Edna May Cooper, at the controls of the refueling ship, flew onward, close together in order to keep the rope slack, while Miss Cooper, a former film actress, made a daring trip along the cat-walk and untangled the rope.

Throughout the night at intervals of an hour the lights of the "Lady Rolph" blinked twice, signals that all was well aboard. The girls were forced down quickly New Year's day after their take-off for the flight. The refueling plane would not function, and their gasoline supply gave out.
