

# Another War Is Predicted by Dr. Jesse Kellems

### Widely Travelled Evangelist Who Crossed Atlantic 27 Times, Says Forces Are Forming for Another Conflict.

"What do you think of conditions in Europe, Doctor, especially as regards the dangers of a new war?" The man to whom this question was addressed, Dr. Jesse Randolph Kellems of New York City and Seattle, who is now leading in the great evangelistic campaign at the First Christian Church, smiled sadly. "That is a big question," he replied, "and I suppose one could write a book on the subject. But I am quite sure that a new war is coming and I am afraid it is not far away."

And the doctor does not speak as a casual observer. He has crossed the Atlantic 27 times. He has studied in Germany, France and England. He lived last year in Rome. He has studied the workings of the British empire in South Africa, Australia, New Zealand and the islands of the sea. He is not only a distinguished authority in philosophy and religion, he is a keen student of world affairs. A big, blond, vital young man, still in his thirties, the title of "doctor" seems to fit lightly upon him. But once set him to talking, and the vast experience of the man soon manifests itself in the most convincing manner to which he comes to his conclusions.

**War Around the Corner**  
"Yes, I am afraid that the next war is just around the corner," he continued. "It will start either in the Balkans or along the Franco-Italian frontier. Italy is dreaming of empire, and there is no empire for her unless she takes it from someone else."  
"Trouble has long been brewing between the French and Italians in Northern Africa. Italy has colonies, but they are poor, and offer no real inducements to her rapidly growing population. On the other hand, France has made the North African desert blossom as the rose. Thousands of Italians have moved into these prosperous new colonies. They are intensely nationalistic. Everyone in the New Italy is of this breed. Under the dashing leader whose energy and enthusiasm has astonished the world, Italy has had a new birth, and she is dreaming of both countries preparing."

"Across the borders is a country whose troops in times past have ruled Naples, whose power has wrenched from her the proud and beautiful province of Savoy. France, with her thousands of soldiers, Italy with her troops everywhere, and new and powerful forts being built along the Franco-Italian border."  
"Growing hatreds everywhere. Can war long be averted? And the worst part of the picture is the fact that Italy will not fight France alone. Germany will see this as her chance for revenge and for relief from the great burdens of the Young plan. Poland, the ally of France, will spring upon her from the east. Yes, the picture is black. There are more men under arms now in Europe than in 1913."

**Will U. S. Enter War?**  
"What about our own country, Doctor? Do you think we will be in it?"  
Dr. Kellems thought for a moment, and then replied: "Who knows? None thought we would be in the last one. We have far greater numbers of people in foreign lands now than we had in 1914. Our trade is greater and our ships are to be found in all the seas. If we can keep out of it—if the British empire can stay out, the leadership of the Anglo-Saxon will be supreme. I only hope that in some manner we can exert such powerful influence upon the warlike nations that, fearing that we may intervene, they will hesitate before entering into the conflict."  
"You have mentioned the British empire, Doctor, and it is rather widely known that you are very much a friend of the British people. What do you think of the possibility of the empire cracking? With trouble in India and with the growing independence of the great dominions, it appears that things are not well with our British cousins."

**Briton Is Safe**  
"No, I do not think the empire will crack. In the case of the English-speaking nations there is no danger. These dominions are bound to the mother country and to each other by spiritual bonds, and, after all, they are the strongest bonds in the world. In the case of India, it would be nothing short of a world tragedy for England to leave her to her own devices. Not only would it result in indescribable chaos for India herself, but it would have repercussions for every one of the great powers, including ourselves."  
"France would have trouble in Syria and North Africa; Italy in Samolliand, and the United States in the Philippines. Whether we like it or not, the fact remains that the advanced nations owe a debt to those who are just struggling toward nationhood. There will be a change in India, but the British will not leave the country. They dare not do so."

**"Why did you come to Klamath Falls, Doctor?"**  
"Well, there were two reasons. The first one was the desire to renew an old friendship with Dr. Arthur Eaton of the First Christian church. We met out in Australia a long time ago, and have been very close friends ever since. In the second place, I believe in the future of Klamath Falls. This is to be one of the first towns in the state, and, of course, the live town in the one in which to build the church. I am sick of these holy cities, where there are about 4,000 people and twenty half-starved churches. Klamath Falls is the move, and I like it."

## LONDON BESET BY DENSE FOG

LONDON, Jan. 6, (AP)—A large part of England today lay under a thick mantle of fog, accompanied by frost, which in some places was most severe. The fog was particularly dense in the north, where Lancashire and Cheshire experienced one of the worst mists of recent years. There were more than 100 accidents on the roads of these two counties alone, with a number of injuries reported among automobile drivers and passengers. The roads were slippery, and collisions were frequent. The Mersey was fogbound and few ferries were able to operate. Steamers on the Belfast, Isle of Man and Dublin Service were entirely stopped, with similar conditions prevailing in North Ireland, where steamers for Liverpool and Glasgow were held up. The fog was thick over the English channel, where the lowest temperatures of the winter were reported. Shipping in the Thames estuary was thrown into confusion during the night by the fog.

## DATE SET FOR DRY TEST CASE

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6, (AP)—The appeal of the United States to test the recent decision of District Judge Clark holding the prohibition amendment invalid was today advanced by the supreme court for hearing on Wednesday, Jan. 21. Chief Justice Hughes made this announcement today and said it would be heard ahead of all cases awaiting hearing on that date. Counsel upholding the Clark decision yesterday requested the hearing be deferred until the middle of April on the plea previous engagements would prevent their being ready at an earlier date.

## Would Create Inspector Of Aeronautics

PORTLAND, Jan. 6, (AP)—Recommendation that Oregon provide a full-time salaried inspector of aeronautics was made to Governor-elect Meier today by a joint committee composed of the Oregon State Board of Aeronautics, the Portland chapter of the National Aeronautics Association and persons in the industry. The State Board of Aviation would be supported by funds derived from the 1 cent gasoline tax now paid by the aviation industry. The committee proposed that the present law be amended permitting the State Board to appoint an inspector who shall devote all his time to such duties as the board should assign. He must hold a transport license. Salary would not exceed \$4,200 a year. Expenses would be provided.

## Bowles And Miss Loucks Will Enter Not Guilty Pleas

PORTLAND, Jan. 6, (AP)—Plea of not guilty will be entered by Nelson C. Bowles and Irma Loucks, charged with murder, when they appear in circuit court here Friday, their attorneys have announced. While attorneys for the two accused of murdering Bowles' wife have declined to state whether or not a change of venue will be sought, those following the case have persisted in the belief such a step will be taken as soon as pleas are entered.

## New York Girl Is Found Dead With A Crushed Skull

NEW YORK, Jan. 6, (AP)—The body of a 19-year-old girl was found today in the rear of a bakery on the upper west side where she was employed, her head crushed with a blunt instrument. The girl, Doris Reiling, had opened the store a short time before she was found dead. A driver for the bakery firm entered the store to deliver some bread and cakes. When the girl failed to appear behind the counter he searched the store. Miss Reiling's body lay on an overturned chair. Police said the chair may have been the weapon that crushed her skull.

THAT THE THUMB AND FINGER HOLES ARE THE RIGHT SIZE AND PROPER DISTANCE APART IS ESPECIALLY IMPORTANT TO WOMEN BOWLERS

It is even more vitally important that a woman bowler have her own particular ball, that is perfectly suited for the size of her fingers and the span of her grip. But the average woman bowler has so many unusual stances and varied methods of delivering the ball, that she must have a ball that is correctly fitted to her hands, to get any kind of results. I have seen women who complained that a 12-pound ball was too heavy for them to handle, and then claim that a 16-pound ball that was correctly fitted to their hands, felt lighter and was easier to control. Many women bowlers stand flat-footed at the foul line and deliver the ball with no step whatever. A ball with too narrow a grip or too wide a grip or with holes too large is fatal under these circumstances.

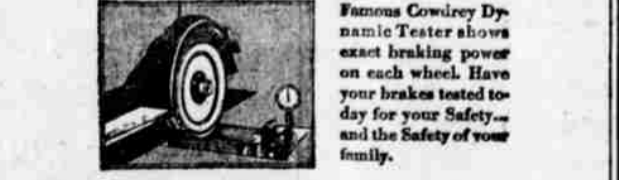

## Kidnapper Busch Heir Is Arrested

ST. LOUIS, Jan. 6, (AP)—St. Louis county officers announced Sheriff Alfred Lill today arrested Charles Y. Abernathy, kidnapper of Adolphus Busch Orthwein, 13, in Kansas City. Abernathy, a negro, was turned over to the sheriff by a St. Louis newspaper reporter who previously had interviewed him. No details of the arrest were available at the sheriff's office. Meanwhile Harry Troll, attorney for Percy J. Orthwein, father of the boy announced the Busch and Orthwein families would assist county authorities in prosecution of the kidnapper. The lad was taken from the Orthwein family chauffeur New Year's eve while enroute to visit his grandfather August A. Busch president of Anheuser-Busch, Inc., and was returned the next day.

## Marberry Goes On Trial Wednesday

The case of the state of Oregon vs. Henry Marberry, indicted on a charge of assault with intent to kill, is scheduled to begin Wednesday morning in circuit court. ## ALMA REUBENS DRUG ADDICT GOES TO JAIL

SAN DIEGO, Calif., Jan. 6, (AP)—Alma Reubens, former screen favorite, released from the state asylum at Patten a year ago as cured of drug addiction, is in jail today awaiting a hearing on a federal charge of possession of narcotics. Miss Reubens was arrested at her hotel here yesterday after her companion on a trip to Augua Caliente, Ruth Palmer, complained to police the actress had beaten her. Police said they found 40 cubes of a drug sawn into one of Miss Reubens' gowns when they searched her room. "It's a frameup," the actress cried hysterically upon reaching the jail. "I have been robbed of \$9,000 worth of jewelry. I have made a comeback after my terrible experience, and now this happens. It just can't be true." Eddie Tholman, Miss Reubens' chauffeur, was questioned concerning the jewelry but was released.

## DESIGN LAW TO PROTECT GRAIN MARKET

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6, (AP)—Legislation to curb speculation on the grain futures market was introduced today by Senator Capper, of Kansas, and Representative Dickinson, of Iowa, administration Republicans. The companion bills would prohibit activities in these markets in behalf of foreign governments without the consent of the secretary of agriculture. Secretary Hyde complained last fall of selling operations by Soviet Russia in the wheat market. The measures also would place a limit of 2,000,000 bushels to the amount of grain futures which may be traded in for purely speculative purposes in any one day by an individual or firm. The secretary of agriculture would be given power to approve board of trade rules governing future trading, and to require the adoption of rules which may be necessary to safeguard public interest. Licenses also would be required of all commission merchants, brokers and correspondents handling or executing orders for future delivery.
