E. A. TAYLOR NAMED CHIEF FIRE DEPT.

E. A. Taylor, appointed chief of the fire department last night by Mayor F. H. Cofer, announced immediately after succeeding to the position that no changes had been made in the personnel of the department, and added that none were contemplated.

Taylor comes to the city well recommended for the position which he assumes. He was a member of the Corvallis department from 1914 to 1927, during which time he worked up from the position of hoseman to first assistant chief. His training, or the greater part of it, was obtained under Chief Graham, who is recognized as one of the most capable fire departments heads in Oregon.

Since February, 1927, Taylor has been connected with the office of state fire marshal, being employed in the fire prevention and inspection departments.

Taylor has a wife and three children living in Corvallis who will move to this city as soon as suitable living quarters are obtained.

Chief Taylor said last night he had no announcement to make but that in the near future he hoped to promote a campaign for the prevention of fires, believing that as essential as the work of combating fires after they are started. In this connection, he warned against the habit of many leaving Christmas trees around their premises after the foliage had dried, saying that it is a dangerous practice, and advised that all trees be immediately removed from the premises.

In connection with the announcement of the new chief that no changes would be made in the personnel of the department, he gave the following list of members and the positions to which they had been appointed: First assistant, Arthur W. Latourette Is Named to Bench By Gov. Norblad

OREGON CITY, Jan. 6. (AP)—Earle C. Latourette, prominent Oregon City attorney, has been appointed by Governor Norblad to the circuit judgeship of Clackamas county, succeeding James U. Campbell who resigned to become justice of the supreme court.

Latourette left for Salem today to be sworn in by Justice Campbell. He was born in Oregon City in 1889, attended schools, was graduated from a Portland high school, and attended University of Oregon. He was admitted to the bar in 1913. The same year he married Ruth Stewler, sister of Senator Frederick L. Stewler.

SHIPPING IS PARALYZED BY FOG IN N. Y.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6. (AP)—A Long Island Sound steamship struck a car float, a freighter sent out a distress call, and maritime traffic from liners to ferries in New York harbor inched its way along today in a heavy fog which followed a January drizzle.

The passenger ship George Washington, bound in from Boston, struck the car float in the East river, pitching three box cars into the water, making the float helpless, and punching a hole in the steamer's bow. Tugs took the float in tow, and the George Washington crept on toward her pier. Several other New England steamers anchored just below Hellgate until the weather cleared.

The William N. Page, bound from Norfolk to Boston with coal, sent out an SOS saying she was aground off Southampton, Long Island, with 25 men aboard. Coast guards went to help her.

Ferries were far behind schedule, several ships postponed their departures, and even land traffic in the metropolitan area felt its way over wet pavements in the dark. A street car hit a city truck in Brooklyn in the mist and 11 trolley passengers needed medical attention.

The freighter City of New York, which picked up the crew of a shipping smack off Scotland last night, went on toward Philadelphia. The smack was sinking fast when abandoned.

Department Will Proceed Against Ind. Congressmen

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. (AP)—The department of justice prepared today to institute criminal action against the Indiana members of congress charged by the postoffice department with accepting money from four postmasters to obtain their appointments.

Justice officials declined to name the representative. The postmasters concerned were all in the district of Indiana now represented by Harry E. Rowbottom, who was defeated for re-election in November. No formal action has yet been instituted.

MORE SKELETONS FOUND

KENTON, O.—The recent discovery of five skeletons in a gravel bank makes a total of 22 skeletons found on the Arthur Zimmerman farm near here. The bones were believed taken from an Indian burial ground, since all were found in sitting posture.

Aliens Lose Pleas; Will Be Deported

PORTLAND, Jan. 6. (AP)—In what their attorney declared was "a direct blow at foreign-born labor," eight Portland Communists lost their pleas in federal district court here yesterday for writs of habeas corpus to free them from deportation to Europe. Federal Judge Bean handed down the decision.

Irvin Goodman, attorney for the Communists, declared he will appeal the case "immediately" to the circuit court of appeals.

Hospital For Insane Has Money Left

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 6. (AP)—The Eastern Oregon State Hospital for the insane at Pendleton on January 1 had a balance of \$37,577.23 unexpended from its appropriation by the 1929 legislature, the largest unexpended balance of all of the state institutions. The money reverts to the state general fund.

Records of the state board of control show that the total of all unexpended balances of the institutions was \$119,852.75. Others had the following amounts left:

State hospital at Salem, \$28,354.43; school for the deaf, \$14,055; institution for the feeble-minded, \$4700; tuberculosis hospital at Salem, \$1901; girls' school, \$1315; institution for the adult blind in Portland, supported by millage tax, \$10,414 from 1919 tax and \$13,357 from the 1920 tax.

DESPONDENCY CAUSE OF SUICIDAL DEATH

PORTLAND, Jan. 6. (AP)—The body of B. F. Sewell, 67, was found in a woodyard here today. Police said he had shot himself to death. A note found in his room said "I am going to end it all," and told where the body would be found. Relatives said Sewell had been despondent because he had been out of work for three months.

HAIL, WIND AND SNOW HIT OVER PACIFIC COAST

SAN FRANCISCO, Jan. 6. (AP)—Rain, wind and snow which swept over Pacific Coast states yesterday left in their wake today a flooded Indian village in southwestern Washington and reports that five men were snow-bound in the High Sierra in Tuolumne county, Calif.

The wind also demolished two hangars in the Vancouver, Wash. airport.

Conditions varying from local showers to fair were forecast by federal weather observers for today and tonight. Rains in western Oregon and Washington were predicted for tomorrow with unsettled conditions in most other sections of the Pacific coast.

The prognosticators warned shipping men of a storm over the Pacific ocean which they said was of "extraordinary severity and will probably affect the far western states toward the latter part of the week."

Streets of the little village of Tahola in the Quinault Indian reservation in Washington were flooded by what residents described as the highest tide in the town's history. Mail was brought into the town by boat.

Logs from the Bulwark which had protected the town were strewn about the streets. As the timbers were dashed against the foundations of houses, residents prepared to flee from their homes.

Three youths, members of a party of nine San Mateo high school students, were believed to be snowbound somewhere between Cow Creek, 35 miles above Sonoma, Calif., and Sonoma. Searching parties were sent out to find them. Two mechanics were also reported caught in the deep snow when their automobile was stranded, but little fear was felt for their safety.

The other six boys in the party which had gone into the hills last Tuesday to enjoy winter sports, fought their way out.

The two mechanics are James Jose, 23, and L. A. Booth, 35. They were caught in a blizzard while trying to pull out one of the two automobiles the youths had taken into the hills.

Typhoon Leaves Death Trail In Cebu And Leyte

MANILA, Jan. 6. (AP)—The typhoon which raged in the central Philippines Saturday caused at least 150 deaths and \$1,250,000 damage said further reports tonight from the islands of Cebu and Leyte. The Red Cross began relief with the dispatch of a party to Cebu. The steamship Losano foundered, drowning twenty-seven persons aboard. Thirty others died in the sinking of fifty fishing boats. Sugar, hemp, bananas and rice crops were badly damaged.
