

FRANCE TAKES LAST VIEW OF DEAD JOFFRE

PARIS, Jan. 6. (AP)—The Frenchmen today gazed for the last time on the famous, beloved features of the "Papa" Joffre, marshal of France, hero of the Marne, and commander of the French armies in the first two years of the World War.

Sixty five thousand persons were estimated to have filed by the catafalque in the chapel of the Ecole Militaire from nine a. m. yesterday to 11 p. m. last night.

There can be no extension of the time for doing homage at the dead Marshal's bier beyond nine o'clock tonight, for at that time the body will be removed to the Cathedral of Notre Dame for the last requiem of the church.

Tomorrow at dawn it will be taken from the Cathedral and in an impressive cortege as elaborate as that of Marshal Foch, generalissimo of the Allied armies, nearly two years ago, carried to the Arc de Triomphe, and to the Invalides for the last funeral. The funeral in the Invalides will be temporary until a permanent tomb can be arranged at the family home at Louveciennes.

OLD MAC'S PLAN GETS AL'S GOAT

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 7. (AP)—To head off a precedent which he says has been set by Judge L. H. McMahon of the circuit court for Marion and Linn counties, in sentencing men to the state prison for only a few months time, Governor Norblad will recommend to the legislature the enactment of a law prohibiting sentences of less than one year to the state prison.

Because of the rapidly increasing prison population the governor fears that sentences of only a few months will result in an overcrowding of inmates.

The governor cites one instance in which Judge McMahon sentenced a man for four months and another in which the sentence was only for 60 days. Upon the release of prisoners the state gives each a suit of clothes valued at \$12.50 and \$5 in cash. Since a prisoner is eligible for parole at the expiration of his minimum time, which is about one-third of the time of sentence, the governor says the result is almost the payment of wages to a man for serving in the penitentiary.

In the penitentiary, in the case of the man sentenced for 60 days, the governor says, he would be paroled at the end of 20 days and the state would present him with the equivalent of \$17.50 upon his release.

10 PLANES MAKE 6000 MILE HOP

ROME, Jan. 6. (AP)—The newspaper Lavoro Fascista, announced this afternoon that at 2 o'clock (9:00 A. M. E. S. T.) Air Minister Italo Balbo who is leading a flight of 12 Italian seaplanes across the south Atlantic witnessed that the flight was proceeding regularly.

BOLAMA, Portuguese Guinea, Africa, Jan. 6. (AP)—Twelve Italian seaplanes struck southward across the equatorial Atlantic today toward Natal, Brazil, in one of the most ambitious flight projects in the history of aviation.

Undertaken by bad weather the planes took off one by one at 2 A. M. G. M. T. (9 P. M. E. S. T. Monday), and in murky darkness began the trip of more than 1,600 miles to the northeastern tip of South America.

With a cruising speed of 100 miles per hour, their commander, General Italo Balbo, Italian air minister, hoped to reach Natal in between 16 and 20 hours, or between 3 P. M. and 7 P. M. Natal time (5 P. M. and 9 P. M. E. S. T.) today.

The flight is the longest and most difficult lap of a nearly 6,000-mile air journey begun with departure of 14 Savoia seaplanes from Orbetello, Italy, for Rio de Janeiro. The flight may be continued to Buenos Aires, which would make the total trip around 7,000 miles.

Stationed between Bolama and Natal were 12 Italian cruisers and other vessels, ready to race to the assistance of any of the squadron which might find it necessary to come down in mid-Atlantic.

As the planes took off the first of the cruisers was notified by radio of the departure and the word flashed along the course to the other ships, each of which sought to sight the squadron and flash the word back to Rome.

Nine Widows Left Of Vets of War of 1812

WASHINGTON, Jan. 6. (AP)—Nine widows of soldiers of the war of 1812, three 90 or more years old, and one 97, still draw pensions for their husbands' valor, 115 years after the war ended.

These nine and one daughter of a veteran form the last group actively linked with America's second struggle for independence. The last veteran of that war, Hiram Cronk, of Eva, New York, died May 13, 1905. He was 105 years old.

NEW YORK BANS GERMAN CHAMP.

NEW YORK, Jan. 6. (AP)—The New York state athletic commission today decided to withdraw heavyweight championship recognition from Max Schmeling of Germany. The commission also announced it will consider a match between Jack Sharkey and an outstanding opponent, preferably Young Stribling, as for the heavyweight title.

The commission announced the indefinite suspension in New York of Schmeling as well as his manager, Joe Jacobs. Jacobs attended today's meeting, together with William F. Carey, president of Madison Square Garden, in an effort to straighten out the tangled heavyweight program.

SAYS CHARGES OF SIMPSON ARE ABSURD

SPOKANE, Wash., Jan. 6. (A. P.)—Charges of J. A. Simpson, president of the National Farmers' Union, that the federal farm board deliberately depressed wheat and cotton prices are described as "absurdities" by C. E. Huff, Chicago, of the Farmers' National Grain Corporation.

In a letter to the Washington Farmer, to be published Thursday, Mr. Huff said "Simpson's statements seem to have only personal and political motives back of them."

President Simpson, Huff said, based his attack on a letter from Senator Thomas A. Oklahoma, which said "Alexander Leach, chairman of the federal farm board, admitted to the senate agriculture committee 'that the board has virtual control of a monopoly of the American wheat situation.'"

Mr. Huff said that he attended committee hearings, after which he wrote, "Senator Thomas made a lengthy report to President Simpson purporting to present statements developed by the conference."

"This report is the basis for President Simpson's charges," he advised the Washington Farmer.

"In every important particular, the report distorts or misrepresents statements made. The charges which President Simpson makes against the farm board are absurd and have no basis either from statements made in the senate committee conference or the facts themselves."

"Farmers' union organizations in 11 states have publicly declared that President Simpson is not their spokesman. This group met January 2 in St. Paul and created a committee which will proceed at once to Washington to investigate the entire matter at first hand."

The relation between agriculture prices in the United States and the world prices "shows the absurdity of the charge that the farm board depresses our markets," Huff concluded.

He said that plans called for the construction of stations in Mills addition in 1932 and in North Klamath Falls in 1933.

When the boys left here it was evident that they were both improved. The Newhouse boy's feet were still in a serious condition, and physicians thought they might have to amputate his little toe.

Contrary to general opinion, the boys were not in any way connected with the local council of Boy Scouts, who originally intended to go to Lake O. Woods, but abandoned the idea when the weather grew more severe, and went to the Big Lakes camp.

NORBLAD FOR DIVISION OF LIQUOR FINES

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 6. (AP)—One-half of all funds received by the counties through enforcement of prohibition laws should be turned over to the state, in the opinion of Governor A. W. Norblad, and not merely that portion of the funds until such time when the state receives \$50,000 for its prohibition fund.

The governor will recommend a change in the law accordingly, in his message to the legislature.

The half of the county funds, in excess of \$50,000 should continue to be paid to the state, and placed in the general fund, the governor believes. This source of revenue would add up to \$200,000 to the state a year.

The present law provides that after the sum of \$50,000 has been collected through prohibition enforcement, the balance shall be returned to the respective counties submitting the money. Complaint has reached the governor that some of the counties wait until the \$50,000 sum has been reached by remittances from other counties and then hold out all of its funds for use within their own counties.

The governor holds that the state is at great expense in paying salaries of circuit court judges and district attorneys in the counties, and that it should be entitled to half of all county funds.
