

Chicago Is in Line for Championship Bout

NEW YORK'S COMMISSION PULLS BONER

NEW YORK, Jan. 7, (AP)—Chicago, it appears, owes the New York state athletic commission a rising vote of thanks. The commission, by stripping the heavyweight title from Max Schmeling, virtually has assured a title match between Schmeling and W. L. (Young) Stribling in Chicago next June.

Not is that all the commission's action accomplished. It left, or so it would appear, Jack Sharkey in the role of "outstanding contender" in New York state but with no one in sight for him to fight.

Although other boxing centers, Detroit, Jersey City and Philadelphia, for instance, have plunked in with offers for the serious consideration of Joe Jacobs, manager of Schmeling, it was understood Chicago held the inside track for the title bout and would get it.

Nate Lewis, Chicago promoter, several days ago offered Schmeling \$500,000 to meet Stribling with the title at stake and, at the moment at least, there seems no reason why the teuton slugger should not accept. As for Stribling, he already has come to terms with Lewis.

As the situation stood today, it would take a complete about-face of the part of the state commission to save the bout for New York and there appears no prospect of that.

The boxing commission declared the heavyweight title vacant when Jacobs, on Schmeling's behalf, declined to sign immediately for a return bout with Sharkey. Jacobs offered to sign Schmeling to a contract calling upon him to meet the winner of a Sharkey-Stribling match or against Sharkey if Stribling declined to meet the Boston sailor.

The commission has insisted that Sharkey, having beaten Stribling once, should not be called upon to meet him again, yet after declaring the title vacant, the solemn announced they would accept as champion the winner of a match between Stribling and Sharkey.

Thus the commission stuck to its guns in support of Sharkey's eligibility as the title contender but the net result seems to leave Sharkey holding the bag. Stribling, with a Schmeling bout virtually assured him, in all probability will decline to meet Sharkey and there's no one else for the Boston sailor to meet.

Play Narrows For Billiard Title of Pacific Northwest

SEATTLE, Jan. 7, (AP)—Four players—Wallace Lindley of Bellingham, Al King of Tacoma and Lynn Doolittle and Paul Link of Seattle—remained in the running today for the Pacific Northwest sectional amateur three-cushion billiard championship.

Harry Prevette, Bellingham, Al Weller, Portland, and Ross Sharpless, Everett, were virtually eliminated from the title race. The first two have lost three games and Sharpless two.

Lindley, Doolittle and Link were victorious yesterday to score their second successive wins and tie for first place. None of the four has met defeat. Lindley had a narrow escape with Weller but managed to win out 50 to 42 after trailing part of the way.

Former Knox Star Reenters College To Obtain Degree

GALESBURG, Ill., Jan. 7, (AP)—Bill Senn, one of the immortals of Knox college football and a star on the professional gridiron, is going back to college.

Senn, who quit in his senior year to play professional football, enrolled again at Knox yesterday to finish his final year's work and to receive his degree. One of Senn's greatest football feats at Knox came during the game with Coe college in 1924 when he intercepted a forward pass behind his own goal line and sprinted 104 yards to a touchdown.

NOTRE DAME IS GIVEN TROPHY

NEW YORK, Jan. 7, (AP)—Notre Dame has received the Albert Russell Erskine trophy, emblematic of the National football championship, and Knute Rockne, for one, doesn't think the award "constitutes over-emphasis of football."

The trophy, awarded annually, was presented by Mayor James J. Walker to quarterback Frank Carideo yesterday. At the same time, Rockne, as coach of the team, received an automobile and a scroll which said that he had set up the "Noble ideal of victory with honor."

In acknowledging the award, Rockne said "some people may say this award constitutes over-emphasis of football, but it does not seem to me that because a man is keen, intelligent and able on the football field that he must be dull in the classroom any more than because a man is keen in the classroom he will be dull on the football field."

The trophy was awarded for the first time last year when Notre Dame was the winner. A jury of award, composed of 275 sports writers, selects the winning team.

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COMMISSION WILL SEEK MATCHMAKER

Members of the new municipal boxing commission appointed Monday night by Fred Cofer, Klamath Falls, new mayor, held a meeting Tuesday evening and elected Rex Lawson, chairman, Dr. O. J. Johnson was named secretary-treasurer.

The commission is composed of Rex Lawson, Dr. O. J. Johnson, Grant Hess, Dr. R. W. Oldenburg and Frank Niles.

Immediately after perfecting an organization, members of the commission proceeded to the business of electing a matchmaker to succeed Joe Bickstaff, but failed to agree on a man for the place. Each of the members of the commission refused to consider the job, except that after once refusing, Frank Niles indicated a disposition to assume the responsibility, but later the commissioners, realizing that Niles was a member of a string of boxers, concluded that it would be inadvisable. The result was the meeting ended without the selection of a matchmaker. A decision was made, however, to receive applications from fight promoters of various cities along the coast and make a final selection at a later date.

The writer of this column has no desire to interfere in the affairs of the commission, other than to call attention to the fact that a good, square matchmaker is about as scarce as a dodo, and unless the greatest care is exercised in the selection of a man for this post, the fight game will soon be put on the skids in Klamath Falls. The same has been made popular here and can be maintained on this basis only through the selection of a man who will shoot square with the fans.

BASKETBALL PLAYS PLAYERS

During the last few years there has been considerable agitation among coaches for certain rule reforms. Two departments of play to be affected would be stalling and the center jump play. The rules committee has suggested that coaches experiment with different proposed changes to find out if they merit a trial. This no doubt is the wisest method to follow, for if the changes are not satisfactory no rescinding will be necessary.

The proposed change on the jump ball at center is to omit it except at the beginning of each half. After goals of the team scored upon would put the ball in play under its own basket. Coach Sam Barry, former Iowa coach now at Southern California, has been the main advocate of this change. Dr. Maxwell of Wisconsin also has been quoted as favoring this proposal.

One reason advanced for doing away with the center jump is to eliminate congestion and contact around the center ring. Another is to rid the game of the undue advantage of the usually tall center. Tall men in basketball who have brought about this proposal are Murphy of Purdue, Shoun of Firestone Rubber company, Chadwick of Wabash, and others.

Many coaches are still working on the limitation of the dribble. The argument in favor of the plan is to discourage stalling tactics and to speed up the game. It has been suggested that the dribble be limited to one bounce.

This would make a good style of game but would rob it of the most spectacular offensive weapon.

PANAMA CITY, Jan. 7, (AP)—Hartwell F. Ayers, American newspaper man of Anniston, Ala., who was wounded in the course of Panama's government upheaval last Friday, died today at the Gorgas hospital.

Death came at 5 a. m. He was resting easier at midnight, after having spent a troubled day, during which he was visited by Dr. Harmodio Arias, provisional president.

Earlier in the evening he had become restless, and called for "my pal," Peter Brennan, who was summoned through the United States legation. Hospital physicians are still puzzled at Ayers' remarkable vitality in the face of serious abdominal and neck wounds.
