SLAYER OF JAKE LINGLE IS ARRESTED

WITNESSES IDENTIFY MURDERER

Leo Brothers, Gangster
Of St. Louis, Said
To Be the Man

ADMITS SLAYING OF
ST. LOUIS DRIVER

Police Trained Killer To
Twelve Cities Before
Arrest Was Made

CHICAGO, Jan. 8, (AP)—A solution of the mystery of the murder of Alfred E. Lingle, Chicago Tribune reporter, has been reached, authorities claimed today, with the arrest of Leo Brothers, a St. Louis gangster, who was identified by several witnesses, they said, as the man who shot and killed Lingle last June 9. The identification, they said, was positive.

Brothers, it was revealed by Patrick Roche, chief investigator for the state attorney's office, was arrested by three detectives last December 21, in a Chicago apartment, after he had been trailed to twelve different cities. He was known in Chicago as Louis "Bugs" Baker. He denied he killed Lingle, but admitted, Roche said, that he was wanted in St. Louis for the slaying of John DeBlasi, a service car driver.

"This man will sit in the electric chair for the murder of Alfred E. Lingle," Roche told newspapermen. "I'll stake my official reputation on that. If he is not the killer, then Lingle is still alive."

Neither Roche or State's Attorney John A. Swanson, however, would reveal if they had uncovered the all-absorbing question in Chicago, crime in recent years, namely, "Is Lingle killed?" There was an unofficial report that the Tribune reporter was put to death because he had incurred the enmity of gamblers, whom he had harassed. Nor would the officials give out a list of the names of the persons who made the reported identification.

This information, Roche indicated, would be withheld until the facts of the mystery are more definitely determined. Roche was asked by a reporter if "any high" (Continued on Page Two)

Woman Has Masqueraded As Man For 17 Years

CHICAGO, Jan. 8, (AP)—A woman who masqueraded for 17 years as a man because, she said, she was unable to find work as a woman, appeared before Judge John H. Lyle on a charge of passing worthless checks.

"I could get no work as a woman, so I put on men's clothes and went to work years ago," she said. "I have worked at men's jobs ever since and hold a steamfitter's union card."

Judge Lyle accepted her story that she had been given the checks while out of work by a man who promised to give her the proceeds of every fourth one she cashed, and released her on probation. She promised to make restitution.

M'NARY FAVORS
NIGHT SESSION

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8, (AP)—Concerned over failure of legislation to get through the senate, Senator McNary, the assistant republican leader, prepared today to ask for night sessions of the senate, beginning next Monday, and extending through the month, for three days a week.

Republican leaders, determined to avoid an extra session, intend to seek the night sessions in a drive to get through the vital appropriation bills. The proposal also will be put forward with a view to determining what forces, if any, are seeking to force an extra session.

The McNary proposal calls for sessions until 10 p. m., on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, and for meetings until 6 o'clock on other days for the remainder of January.

GIRL FLYERS
REMAIN ALOFT

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 8, (AP)—Choosing a battle with inclement weather rather than risk the loss of a record, Bobbie Trout and Edna May Cooper flew their monoplane, Lady Rolph, back to its home port here today, after spending the night over Imperial Valley.

The endurance ship and its refueling plane arrived over the municipal airport unexpectedly at 10:30 a. m., when the young women had been aloft 92 hours, 50 hours beyond the women's endurance record, set by Miss Trout and Edna May Cooper of New York, some months ago.

Hope that the flyers might be able to break the world sustained flight record of 645 hours was dispelled by pilots. They pointed out that the Lady Rolph was not equipped with cat walks to enable the women to replace spark plugs and there was no possibility that they could remain aloft more than 100 hours.

DEFERRED OF PROTOCOL PREDICTED

Frank Kellogg Told That
Senate Will Defeat
Ratification

FORMER SECRETARY
IS SENATE VISITOR

Denies His Visit Has Any
Connection With
Ratification

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8, (AP)—Senate world court foes have told Frank H. Kellogg, a justice of the court, enough votes were in prospect to defeat ratification of American adherence.

This much became known of the conversation induced in by Mr. Kellogg during his call today in the senate, where he served formerly as a member from Minnesota. The white-haired jurist and former secretary of state asserted, however, his call was purely a personal one. He denied he had any purpose of discussing the world court issue.

Mr. Kellogg called first upon Chairman Borah of the foreign relations committee—upon which he himself formerly served. He went to the senate floor to converse with others, including Senator Morris of New Jersey and Gillett of Massachusetts, advocates of the world court.

Borah is a court foe.

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FOUR PERSONS ARE DEAD OF POISON LIQUOR

SALINAS, Cal., Jan. 8, (AP)—While officers hunted today for bootleggers who furnished liquor and wine for two fatal "parties", chemists analyzed the contents of the stomachs of the four victims.

Coroner J. J. Cornett said he had little doubt Mrs. Hazel Peters, 28, Salinas, and her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Frank Angle, Porterville, died of poison contained in wine served at a dinner here Monday night in honor of the Angles. However, he could not explain the mystery of a poisonous wine. The wine was purchased from a bootlegger.

No such puzzling factor confronted authorities in investigating the death of John Nihill, 27, San Francisco road worker, who died in a road camp in Anderson canyon. He spent the previous night drinking moonshine heavily, the foreman said.

The Angles died at Seaside where they were visiting another daughter, Mrs. Bert Swayze, Mrs. Peters died in her bed.

Fred S. Peters, Salinas mechanic, fourth member of the fatal dinner party, was taken violently ill shortly after he discovered his wife's death. He was in a critical condition at the home of a friend in Gilroy.

While chemists puzzled over the supposed poison wine in a country once famous for its wineries, San Francisco authorities continued their investigations of two deaths which followed a New Year's eve liquor party.

Hungry Coyote Raids Flock Of Decoys

Coyotes of Klamath county are confronted with poor foraging conditions, so poor, in fact, that one of the gaunt and hungry varmints recently staged a raid on a flock of decoy geese with the hope of satisfying his ravishing appetite.

The story is told by Dick Miller, Coyote employee, who while hunting in a field in the Lower Klamath lake district, saw a coyote rush suddenly upon his flock of decoys. Miller had secreted himself in a blind, and was awaiting the arrival of a band of live geese when he saw the coyote rush the decoys. He opened fire at a distance of 40 yards and killed the coyote.

The decoys escaped undamaged.

JONES DRY LAW IS MODIFIED

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8, (AP)—The Jones bill to modify the Jones dry law was passed finally today when the house agreed to minor senate amendments. It goes to the president.

The measure has the approval of the Wickersham commission and Attorney General Mitchell. It sets up a category of minor offenses involving less than one gallon of liquor.

It fixes a maximum penalty of \$500 fine and six months imprisonment for first offenders.

The measure was an outgrowth of the Wickersham proposals to relieve court congestion, and permits juryless trials of minor liquor offenders.

No record vote was taken.

A Clean City Jail Await New Patrons

The city jail of Klamath Falls is undergoing a thorough housecleaning and renovation, according to an announcement made today by Leigh Ackerman, day desk sergeant at police headquarters.

Walls of the cells are being kalsomined with a strong creosote solution, and the whole establishment will be thoroughly fumigated. There is at present only one prisoner in the city jail, and the cleaning operations are being rushed to completion before any more evil-doers force their way into the bastille.

Burglar Ransacks C. C. Long Home

Between the hours of 12:40 and 5:10 o'clock Wednesday afternoon, the C. C. Long residence at 2321 Wantland avenue was entered and ransacked. Currency amounting to \$55.00, \$3.50 in silver, a Winchester shotgun and various smaller items were taken. Entrance was effected by cutting the screen at the bathroom window and pulling the latch.

No tracks were found in the snow, nor were there any other clues that might aid officers in their search for the thieves.

HANS NYLANDER DIES IN CITY

Hans Nylander, 60, prominent resident of Klamath county for the past 27 years, passed away in this city Wednesday at 11:30 p. m., following an illness of but a few days. His death was the result of pneumonia. Nylander became ill last Thursday but worked on his ranch several days before realizing the seriousness of his condition. He was brought to a local hospital for medical attention.

Hans Nylander was owner of a large dairy farm on the Merrill Hill road, 14 miles south of Klamath Falls, on which he had resided for 22 years.

He had lived in Klamath county for 27 years, since coming here from South Dakota. He was a native of Sweden and came to this country when a very small boy.

He was well and favorably known throughout the county. He had been a candidate for political offices, was a member of the Masonic lodge and a bugler in the Marine corps, as well as a prominent member of the Loyal Order of Moose.

As a member of the county budget committee this year he had worked with the other members until just before his illness. Nylander held the position as secretary-treasurer of the Klamath County Poultry association and was formerly connected with the Indian service at Klamath Agency.

Deceased is survived by his wife, Dora B. Nylander, and three brothers, two of them reside in California and the other in Oregon.

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Age-Old Catholic Doctrine Stressed in New Encyclical

Divorce, Birth Control and Amorous Books
and Shows are Scored. Hints at Too
Much Emancipation of Modern Woman

VATICAN CITY, Jan. 8 (AP)—Age-old Roman Catholic doctrines of marriage and divorce were reaffirmed and emphasized in an encyclical today by Pope Pius XI. Among practices of frustration which he scathingly condemned was birth control.

Referring to birth control, which Bishops of the Anglican conference in London last summer, the Pontiff condemns all such practices as "against the Law of God and Nature."

The encyclical unequivocally calls abortion murder. The practice of sterilization of the physically unfit is proclaimed to be against the law of God. The Pontiff says, should be dissuaded from marriage but he maintains that the body of every man is sacred and that public magistrates can be given no power to harm the body's integrity except where a grave crime is concerned.

A Craven Sin

The encyclical brands all those indulging in contraceptive practices "with the guilt of a craven sin."

In support of his assertions the Pontiff quoted St. Augustine, who in such cases called a woman "a mere mistress of her husband," and a man the paramour of his wife.

Sex Education

The encyclical sets forth lengthily Catholicism's teachings against divorce and as a principle remedy for many existing evils the Pontiff proposes fidelity to religious life on which alone can be built fidelity to the (Continued on Page Two)

MONEY AND JEWELRY ARE TAKEN

Georges Carpentier And
Lita Gray Chaplin
Are Victims

COUPLE IMPRISONED
IN HER LIMOUSINE

\$14,000.00 in Jewels Are
Taken; Automobile
Is Recovered

NEW YORK, Jan. 8, (AP)—The kidnapping of Lita Gray Chaplin, former wife of Charles Chaplin, and Georges Carpentier as they left a theatre puzzled the police today. Mrs. Chaplin said she was robbed of money and jewels. Mrs. Chaplin and the one-time heavyweight champion of Europe told the police they were imprisoned in her limousine by four armed men, driven more than a mile, and dumped out last night. Mrs. Chaplin said she lost \$14,000 in jewelry.

As related by detectives, Carpentier met the actress at a Bronx playhouse at the close of her performance, and they entered the limousine and drove away rapidly. Two men, appearing out of the gloom, pressed revolvers against the chauffeur, Albert Frank, as he stood beside the car, and two more cowed the occupants of the limousine. Frank then was forced inside and one of the hold-up men drove away rapidly.

During the ride Mrs. Chaplin became hysterical, and one of the men quieted her, promising she would not be harmed. Another ordered her to remove her gems, but when she did so, he was not satisfied.

"We want some money, too," he commanded.

Fortwith, she opened her pocketbook and handed him the entire contents, \$15.

The victims were ordered into the street near an unlighted corner, and their assailants sped away in the stolen car. Mrs. Chaplin and Carpentier took a taxicab to their hotels and Frank went to (Continued on Page Two)
