Contest for Speakership Grows Warm

Portland, Jan. 8, (AP)— The speakership of the Oregon house appeared at stake today, although it is claimed by both Herbert Gordon and Frank Loneragan, Multnomah county representatives.

The latest move in the contest was announced by Earl Hill, representative-elect from Lane county, that he would be here today for a "fact-finding showdown" on the speakership.

Arthur W. Lawrence of Benton county was quoted yesterday as having said he would vote for Gordon, although, like Hill, his name had previously been included in the Loneragan lineup.

Loneragan's original list of supporters included 34 of the 60 members of the house. Gordon was confident of 29 votes, he said, but this left at least three representatives who appeared in both lists.

Death of Dr. W. Carlton Smith of Salem was said by Loneragan's supporters to have cost him one vote. If Lawrence has withdrawn support, as he has been quoted, it reduces Loneragan's forces one more, leaving him 32 of the 60.

Thirty votes are required by the winning candidate. Gordon said he will count his votes on the floor. He has published no list.

Bloodstained Shirt Is Connected With Girl's Disappearance

FORT MORGAN, Colo., Jan. 8, (AP)— A bloodstained nine cotton work shirt, the collar torn away, possibly to conceal latent marks, has been found five miles east of Wiggins, Colo., from where Miss Edie Marriott, 28-year-old school teacher disappeared last November 16.

The shirt was discovered yesterday by Wendell Wacker, 15 years old, near the banks of the Bijon irrigation canal, into which Sheriff Rufus Johnson believes the young woman was thrown after being murdered. No trace of the woman has been found since her disappearance, although several of her personal effects were found near the canal.

Burma Natives and British Police Are Engaged in Battle

RANGOON, Burma, Jan. 8, (AP)— In the Tharawaddy district, where marauding natives have been terrorizing the countryside for weeks, a band of 600 met the mounted police in a battle thru the jungle, which continued until late last night. Reinforcements joined the police today and moved against the Burmese warriors. Reports reaching here said the natives were mowed down by rifle fire, with heavy casualties, but that they appeared ready to renew the attack this morning.

Five Lives Pay the Price for Glory of an Historic Flight

BOLAMA, Portuguese Guinea, Africa, Jan. 8 (AP)— The glory attained by 10 Italian seaplanes Tuesday in their trans-Atlantic flight to Natal, Brazil, had its price—five aviators were left behind dead and three injured. Two of the 14 planes in the squadron were virtually destroyed.

Belatedly, official announcement has been made of the tragedy which attended one of the greatest victories over the elements in the history of aviation, the delay being due to the wish of the Italian government that rejoicing a completion of the "Bosphorus," or second Christmas, not be marred.

As 12 of the planes, in formation of three, took off, one of the red group, piloted by Captain Reccagno, crashed from a height of 100 feet. The sergeant mechanic, Luigi Dots, who was riding alone the right pontoon, was killed and the two pilots and the radio operator were injured.

Ten minutes after the takeoff, the second plane of the white group was forced to alight on the sea at full speed. It was riding alone the right pontoon, and the four crew members perished. They were Captain Luigi Bero and Lieutenant Danilo Barbicanti, pilots; Sergeant Meccanico Felice Nensi, and radio operator Ercolo Imbustari.

After these two accidents word was flashed to the two remaining planes to take off for Natal. Both came down after crossing the equator, between St. Paul's rock and Fernando Do Noronha, Brazilian Penal colony about 125 miles from Natal.

Italian naval vessels stationed along the route took the planes in tow and brought them to Fernando Do Noronha. The two will continue the flight. No one aboard was injured. One of the planes, commanded by Captain Donadelli, was forced down by a leaky radiator connection, and the other, piloted by Captain Balotrochi, broke its magneto shaft.

All the dead and injured aviators were among the most renowned of Italy's airmen. The two planes which reached Natal took a few minutes more than 17 hours to traverse almost 1,700 miles.

SAYS HOOVER TO STAND BY NOMINATIONS

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8, (AP)— Friends of President Hoover expressed certainty today that he would not return the nominations of the three members of the power commission even should the senate vote for their recall on the motion now before it.

A vote was in prospect by nightfall on the motion of Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, on the nominations of Chairman Smith and Commissioner Garand and Draper, approved just before the Christmas recess.

The evident determination of Mr. Hoover not to give back the nominations was taken at the capitol to foreshadow another disagreement between the chief executive and the senate. Enough votes to adopt the Walsh motion are claimed by its sponsors.

Senator Goff, republican, West Virginia, who has led the administration fight in the senate, has contended that the senate is without authority in asking for the recall and reconsideration of the power commission nominations.

A proposal today by Senator McNary, of Oregon, the assistant republican leader, to limit debate on the Walsh motion to vote on it by 6 p. m., was blocked by Walsh.

Attacks of recall continued their attack in the senate on the commissioners for dismissal of solicitor Charles A. Russell, and chief accountant William V. King.

Three Killed As Result Of Plane Crash
WRECKAGE of an airplane which bore three men to death was scattered today about a clearing in a densely wooded area eight miles west of this city, tortuous roads hampering an investigation.

The plane crashed in a fog yesterday, the second fatal air accident in a week in the forests of east Texas.

Arthur C. Brown, New Orleans pilot; Errett Williams, of New Orleans, co-pilot; and Robert Wilson, 16-year-old New Orleans student who was returning from his home in Fort Worth, were the victims. The bodies thrown clear of the wreckage, were brought here.

Three men were killed Sunday in a similar accident near Overton when their plane, lost in a fog, crashed into a tall pine. Reports received last night from Fort Worth said the boy's mother, Mrs. E. H. Carlton, was in a serious condition from shock.

WHAT'LL WE DO NOW?
LONDON—If you've been contemplating a monkey gland operation for rejuvenating that tired body of yours you'll have to wait a while. There's a shortage of monkey glands just now, due, according to surgeons, to the wholesale slaughter of the animals in their native lands. It is hoped that regulations will be placed on the killing of monkeys in the future.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 8, (AP)— One reason why inmates of the "bull pen" at the state penitentiary receive little rather than thick slices of bread on their plates at meal time was demonstrated yesterday when the suspicious eyes of a prison official fell upon a portion several times the regular size that had been carried into the cell of Hank Silsby, Lane county prisoner.

Prodding his fingers into the loaf, the officer uncovered a small but evil-looking blade that needed only attachment to a handle to make it a formidable weapon.

In a search of the cells occupied by Silsby and another prisoner named Donald Collins, officers found an assortment of metal contrivances, as well as a quantity of cigarettes and tobacco that are contraband in the bull pen. Prison authorities are attempting to locate the source of the smuggled articles.

Silsby was sent up from Lane county to do two years for larceny and was received May 28, 1930. Collins was convicted in Multnomah county of assault with a dangerous weapon, and was received August 18, 1930.

FORTUNE HAS RETURNED TO MRS. ARMOUR

CHICAGO, Jan. 8, (AP)— Mrs. J. Ogden Armour, once again a wealthy woman because of more than \$3,000,000 received from an oil company investment of her late husband, was in a new home today.

The move into more desirable quarters was made yesterday following her good fortune in an oil company deal in which she turned over 400 shares of stock in the Universal Oil Products company. The controlling interest was purchased by the Shell Union Oil company and the Standard Oil company of California for \$25,000,000.

In the meanwhile Carbon Petroleum Dubs, who perfected the oil cracking process which the Universal company sponsored, and who received \$3,582,945 as his share in the transaction, explained just how he got his names. His father, Jesse A. Dubs, greatly interested in chemistry, called his son "Carbon" when he was born. Later his name became confused with that of his brother, C. A. Dubs, so his mother suggested he add a middle initial. This he did, choosing a "P" which associates in the Universal company lengthened into Petroleum.

Dubs lives in Wilmette, a Chicago suburb.

New Guinea Hit By Tidal Wave Which Kills and Injures
MELBOURNE, Australia, Jan. 8, (AP)—Six men were killed, one is missing and three were injured in the huge tidal wave which swept the coast of New Guinea on Dec. 24, the administrator of that territory reported today.

The great wall of water from 25 to 50 feet high swept along the coast for 40 miles and rolled 300 yards inland, he said. The Sapora Mission station and the Mandang trading settlement were wiped out.

Predicts Rejection Muscle Shoals Bill
WASHINGTON, Jan. 8, (AP)— Representative Tilson, republican floor leader, after a conference with President Hoover, predicted today the house would reject the conference report on the Muscle Shoals bill.

He said he, personally, did not think the house should accept the compromise reached by the senate and house conferees for government operation.
