

Girls Land Plane After Smashing Endurance Mark

Motor Trouble Compels Landing. Fifty Hours Made Through Driving Rain. Both Girls Are "Feeling Fine."

LOS ANGELES, Jan. 10. (AP)—Bobbie Trout and Edna May Cooper, both in their middle twenties, are co-holders of a brand new women's endurance flight record of 122 hours, 30 minutes today.

The girls came to earth with the record unscathed at 5:30 p. m. last night after a hectic flight ended by a cracked cylinder in the 170-horsepower motor of their small monoplane, the Lady Rolph. They almost tripled the former women's record of 42 hours, 16 minutes set by Miss Trout and Elinor Smith of New York.

As fresh as though the five-day flight had been only a pleasure spin of a few minutes duration, Bobbie and Edna each had a "glad to be back" and a "hated to come down" for the startled crowd.

The end of the flight came so suddenly that those on the ground did not realize it was over until the Lady Rolph had coasted to a quick halt on the sluggish runway and the fliers jumped out into the mud.

The first intimation they were having trouble came at noon when observers noticed a tail of black smoke wafting behind the plane as it circled the municipal airport. The girls, however, admitted they discovered evidence of motor failure ten hours before the end.

"Oil splashed against the windshield and the cabin filled with scald fumes," Miss Cooper said. Still they gave no intimation they were coming down.

"The motor wouldn't turn enough revolutions to gain altitude," said Miss Trout, one of the few women who hold a transport pilot license, said, "and it began missing, so we came down."

"I wouldn't want to go up again tomorrow," Miss Trout said after the landing, "but I feel fine."

Miss Cooper said she hated to come down short of the 150 hour mark of the army plane Question Mark, but added brightly, "It was a pretty good flight at that."

Neither would talk about the hardships imposed by two storms, which provided rain for nearly 50 hours of their flying, nor the cramped life in the small cabin of the Lady Rolph.

not read at once. It occupied one sheet of paper, and was of about 300 words.

"I am advised," the president wrote, "that these appointments were constitutionally made, with the consent of the senate formally communicated to me, and that the return of the document by me and reconsideration by the senate would be ineffective to disturb the appointments in their offices."

"I cannot admit the power of the senate to encroach upon the executive functions by removal of a duly appointed executive officer under the guise of reconsideration of his nomination."

"I regret," he said, "that I must refuse to accede to the request."

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10. (AP)—The senate last night asked President Hoover to return the nominations of three members of the new power commission so it might reconsider the approval given them.

The action, unprecedented so far as senate procedure showed, since the commissioners have assumed office, was taken by a roll call vote of 44 to 37, after five days' debate. The reconsideration move was launched against Chairman George Otis Smith and commissioners Draper and Gay.

and because, upon taking oath of office, they dismissed Solicitor Charles A. Russell and Chief Accountant William V. King.

The general "power trust" issue figured extensively in the debate. Several of the reconsideration advocates contended the electric influence influenced the commissioners in their action; Senator Dill, republican, Washington, said the republican party was "dominated by the power trust."

The opposing side argued that the dismissal was a routine operation of law applying to all employees of the commission; that neither "power trust" nor government power politics were at issue, and that the recall move was beyond the senate's rights, since the commissioners had taken office.

The White House gave out no word on the attitude President Hoover will take, but friends in the senate predict he will refuse to return the nominations. Impassioned—a difficult course—would be the only means then open to remove the commissioners.

Thirteen republicans, 26 democrats and the one farmer-labor member voted for recall. Five democrats joined 22 republicans in opposition. Only one record vote was taken, that on recall of Chairman Smith's nomination. The other names were considered by viva voce votes.

The dismissed men figured in extensive conflict with the old commission, opposing the policies of Executive Secretary Bonner, who also was not retained. Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, author of the recall motion, contended they were let out "for doing their duty."

The opposing forces were led by Senator Clegg of West Virginia, and Senator Clegg of Michigan, both republicans. Senator Bingham, republican, Connecticut, protested that the action constituted "irregular impeachment proceedings," since it was based on action taken by the men in office, rather than on their qualifications before assuming the duties.

Hoover's Statement

President Hoover issued a statement expanding the views he and his earlier had sent to the senate in a refusal to reappoint the names of three of the commissioners.

His refusal had brought the announcement from Senator Walsh, democrat, Montana, that he would oppose the appointment of money to pay the salaries of the commissioners.

The chief executive, in his statement said he would not "allow a false issue to be placed before the country."

Resists Intervention

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OREGON WHEAT EXPORTS DROP BELOW NORMAL

SALEM, Jan. 10. (AP)—Wheat exported from the ports of Portland and Astoria during the period from December 1, 1928, to November 30, 1929, totaled 40,927,874 bushels, or 20,991,771 bushels during the first year of the biennium and 19,936,000 in the second year, says the biennial report of Seymour Jones, state market agent, today.

The two-year total in export shipments is a decrease of 19,991,771 bushels compared with the total of 59,899,452 bushels of the previous biennium.

Flour exports from the Oregon ports during the biennium just closed were 2,717,920 barrels, or 1,326,576 the first year and 1,391,344 the second. The total was an increase of 75,768 over the previous two-year period.

Receipts of wheat at Portland and Astoria for the last biennium were 55,468,922 bushels or 41,602 cars. Receipts for the first of the two years were 28,465,026 and the second year 27,003,896 bushels. Total receipts for the two years decreased 14,465,026 bushels compared with the 69,812,897 bushels of the previous biennium.

Market Agent Jones attributed the falling off in receipts and export of wheat to the low price and the fact that many farmers are holding their crops in the "up country."

Other commodity receipts for the last biennium were: Oats, 2,121,567 bushels; barley, 354,864; rye, 100,376; flaxseed, 143,083; northwest flaxseed, 143,083; corn, 2,158,353; feed oats, 12,326; mixed feed oats, 20,766; white kafir, 4,553; yellow milo, 337; hay, 28,113 tons. Oats, barley, corn and northwestern flaxseed increased.

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 10. (AP)—Failure of some revenue laws enacted during the past few years to stand the test of courts, resulting in a wide difference between authorized obligations and revenues now existing, will be pointed out as a need for remedial measures by Governor A. W. Norblad as an introduction to his address to the state legislature, expected to be delivered Monday.

This situation, as well as a recommendation for greater simplicity in financial problems, will be supplementary to his biennial message, the governor announced today. In his supplement he will point out that the state deficit to date is \$3,921,175, and that under existing laws the estimated revenues for the next two years will fall short about \$4,082,000 of meeting estimated obligations.

"Notwithstanding a careful revision of the budgets of all departments of state activities, the requirements for the next two years are \$990,871.17 in excess of estimated revenues for the period," the governor pointed out. "It would now appear even more necessary, under such conditions, to provide sound ways and means of meeting the state's general fund obligations and as far as possible, equitable distribution of the tax burden."

Below zero temperatures continue to take heavy toll of life. With wires prostrated the number cannot be ascertained, but doubtless many hundreds died.

Yangtze river cities reported many deaths and intense suffering. In Shanghai tonight the temperature was zero, lowest in many years. Snow fell intermittently.

NON-RESIDENT AUTO PERMITS ON DECREASE

SALEM, Jan. 10. (AP)—The registration of non-resident vehicles in the state of Oregon for 1930 fell about 10,000 short of the 1929 total but exceeded all other years since records of registrations have been made. The annual report issued by Secretary of State Hal E. Hoss today disclosed. The total was 103,009.

California led all other states in the number of registrations with 58,434, more than half of the state's total. Washington second with 15,366, Idaho third with 3,398, Canada fourth with 1,479, and Colorado sent 1,061 cars. There was one car each from the Philippines, Cuba, England, Mexico, New Zealand and China. The canal zone registered 12, while the lowest state cars received were from South Carolina, with 13.

Grants Pass continued to lead all others in the number registrations made at its station, with 24,034. Ashland was second with 21,019 and Portland third with 7,524. Other cities registering more than 1000 cars, in respective order were Medford, Salem, Klamath Falls, Huntington, Eugene, Roseburg, Albany, Gold Beach, Ontario, Bend, Corvallis, Hood River and Pendleton. There are 9 registration stations in the state.

The months of April and December set new high marks during the past year for registrations over these months in other years. The heaviest month of registrations was in July, while the smallest number were in January.

WILL REDUCE RECLAMATION EXPENDITURES

WASHINGTON, Jan. 10. (AP)—Administration leaders in the house decided today to force the drought relief appropriation bill to conference with the senate under a special rule and thus speed enactment.

The decision was reached at a meeting in the office of Speaker Longworth.

Wants Action.

Chairman Wood, of the house appropriations committee advised the unofficial steering committee that if he failed to obtain unanimous consent today to send the measure to conference he would ask it be given a special legislative status.

Chairman Snell said he would call the house rules committee together Monday and order out a rule to give the measure the right of way.

Breaks Deadlock.

The agreement promised a break in the several days deadlock which has held the \$60,000,000 loan measure in the house, after the senate addition of a \$15,000,000 amendment for food loans.

The appropriations committee chairman has tried daily for several days to obtain unanimous consent to send the bill to conference.

CARGO PLANE OFF ON 2000 MILE FLIGHT

HAMILTON, Bermuda, Jan. 10. (AP)—The monoplane Trade Wind hopped off to the Azores at 12:15 p. m. (11:15 a. m. east) on the second lap of a "pay load" flight from New York to Paris.

Local weather conditions were favorable as Mrs. Beryl Hart and Lieutenant William S. MacLaren took off on their 2000 mile all-water hop across the Atlantic.

The graceful white ship lifted easily after a long run across the clear, blue water of the harbor. Visitors, wearing the summer clothes characteristic of this semi-tropical island, waved and cheered from the shore as the two fliers circled the city and nosed out across the ocean toward their distant destination.

They were carrying a load of about three tons, including 300 gallons of gasoline, twenty gallons of oil and about 250 pounds "pay load."

The water in Hamilton harbor was a bit rough but apparently it made no difference to the trade wind. Lieutenant MacLaren said he hoped to reach Horta in about 21 hours. This would bring them to the Azores at about 8:15 a. m. Sunday, eastern standard time.

GALLOWAY WILL WRITE OPINION

After spending Friday in Klamath Falls in conference several times with the School Board of Districts No. 1 and No. 2, and Assessor William T. Lee, Charles V. Galloway, member of the State Tax Commission, stated before leaving for the state capital that the budget of the school district is regular and proper and that it will not be subject to attack.

Commissioner Galloway also stated that the question of balance carried over by the board may be revised as to amounts, for in his judgment it would be better for the upkeep of the school to borrow needed funds to tide over from one taxpaying time to another than to carry cash balances. Heretofore the school board has levied sufficiently heavy so that money was available to make improvements and care for the upkeep of the different school properties and it has never issued warrants to be paid later. This, in fact, is the question under discussion—whether it is better to have the money on hand to pay or whether it is better for the district to borrow funds between taxpaying periods.

The commissioner complimented the school board in having looked ahead and avoided heavy debts. He stated that only a very few districts in the entire state enjoyed the record for careful financing that this district enjoys.

After going over the matter with other members of the School Tax Commission, Mr. Galloway will forward a written opinion setting out the commissioner's views and recommendations to the school board officials and to Assessor Lee.

REFEREES HIT WORRALD FOR FALSE CHARGES

SALEM, Jan. 10. (AP)—Eight Oregon attorneys whose disbarment was sought on charges brought by Fred C. Worrall were exonerated of any unethical practice of their profession and Worrall's charges were branded as "unwarranted and malicious" and without any foundation in fact in the report of the referees named to hear the charges, which was filed in supreme court this afternoon.

The attorneys were H. T. Boitt, George T. Winslow, A. A. Hill, and Claude A. Barrick, all of Tillamook; E. B. Tongue, Hillsboro; J. P. Kavanagh, Jay; Bowerman and James L. Conley, all of Portland.

The charges which were filed by Worrall grew out of the settlement of an estate in which Worrall was administrator. The report of the referees, which included Nicholas Jaurey, chairman, and Judge John B. Cleland, R. P. Bernard, George R. Wilbur and John M. Pipes, censured the complaint severely, and "deplored a situation which would permit the publication of such falsehood and malicious untruth" as was brought against the defendant attorneys.
