"Genuine satisfaction never comes from merely spectating," stated H. N. Mac, "but from real participation." Bert Hall agrees with him in citing that even though a thorough course in changing money is given in school, the student will be of no value to the world until he has put his knowledge into actual practice. He likes to see the class tackle this project since it is a practical idea.

W. W. Mac Rea thinks new talent may be discovered that will be useful in future work. Young blood around the office gives fresh vigor to the old staff too, he says.

Struck by the practicality of the plan, Claude McCulloch of Manning, McCulloch and Driscoll, attorneys, blurted out, "I think it's a damn fine idea."

"Chances are we'll get an interesting paper if you kids put it out," said John P. Duke, president of the Oregon Bank and Trust company.

Major C. H. Underwood believes that the contact between the students and the business people will be beneficial. The younger generation will soon be in power, and they need to learn so that they may improve on and develop what this generation could not.

"To gain ideas of life work one must have tried many lines," thinks Charles D. Garcelon. This trying journalistic careers will designate whether or not the student will want to become a newspaper worker—a very fine idea.

Weather Statistics Given By U.S.R.S.; Jan. 10 Coldest Day

According to report received this morning from the government reclamation bureau, the coldest day in Klamath Falls during this month to date was the 10th, when the thermometer registered 7 degrees below zero. January 4 was the warmest day, with 44 degrees registered. December was slightly warmer, with a maximum temperature of 49 degrees and a minimum of 11 degrees. The total precipitation for last month was .927 inches and snowfall was .1 of an inch.

During 1930 the maximum temperature of 59 degrees occurred on July 14, while on January 10 the residents of Klamath Falls shivered as the thermometer registered 7 degrees below zero. The total precipitation for the entire year was only 9.44 inches and the snowfall totalled 44 inches. The year 1929 was comparatively warmer, the maximum temperature being 58 degrees, with the minimum at zero. Precipitation was 8.56 inches and snowfall was 23 inches, exactly 21 inches less than last year.
