

EX-GOVERNOR PRESENTS HIS SPEECH TODAY

SALEM, Ore., Jan. 12 (AP)—Touching upon virtually every phase of state legislation, from penalties for bank robbers to taxation, embodying in his recommendations suggestions from various other department officials, Governor A. W. Norblad presented the outstanding points of his printed message in his first and last address before the state legislature here today.

The retiring governor consumed about 20 minutes in pointing out pertinent parts of his 46-page discussion of state activities and proposed changes, after calling upon the legislators and visitors to stand in silent meditation a few moments in respect to the memory of Governor I. L. Patterson who died Dec. 21, 1929.

Norblad's message covered 42 subjects, involving sectional, state and national affairs which affect Oregon as a whole. State building needs, improvement in the administration of justice, and discussion of state expense accounts occupied the most space in his message, while the matters of taxation, changes in election laws and highway program also were emphasized by the executive.

"The 1929 legislature devoted much of its time to the solution of outstanding tax problems," he said. "Three revenue enactments included a 5 per cent corporation excise tax, an intangibles tax of 5 per cent on interest and dividends, and a personal income tax."

"If the three laws had been maintained approximately three million dollars could have been cut annually from the state levy on property, thereby eliminating all state taxes on property within the 6 per cent limitation."

He added "I am of the opinion the 1929 enactments should be continued unchanged for at least two years." His recommendations include revision of the intangibles tax to make it constitutional.

The expenditure of \$2,000,000 within the next few years in a building program to relieve the "congested and deplorable conditions" in the state and as a measure to relieve the unemployment situation is recommended. The necessary funds, he suggested, could be raised by bond issue, and "the question is of such serious import that this legislation should authorize the submission of a constitutional provision at a special election to be held early in 1931."

Governor Norblad complimented the state highway commission on its successful operation and urged that the legislature continue to leave the power of adding new highway systems and control of the same to the commission. Changing the name of the Roosevelt highway to the "Oregon Coast Highway" was recommended.

Changes in election laws to enable holding the primary in September instead of in May, and the elimination of names of candidates being numbered were stressed. He urged that the corrupt practices act either be repealed or made effective.

As a matter of economy and uniformity, Norblad suggested closer scrutiny of expense accounts of state officials and department personnel, as well as uniform forms and an established rate for automobile mileage reimbursement.

A non-partisan judiciary by appointment of judges rather than election was presented for consideration. In the interest of improving the administration of justice, he recommended "a change in the exemption of jury service so as to retain for the service of the courts a larger number of the intelligent members of the community."

A charge for the keeping of wards in the various state institutions was offered for legislative action, where estates of these wards or their families could afford to pay for their care and medical attention. The creation of a board of pardons to consist of seven members appointed by the chief justice of the supreme court to serve without pay, was recommended.

Seven points to improve dairy conditions in the state and increase revenue from outside were recommended.

Funds from all self-sustaining commissions in the state should be converted to the credit of the general fund as an economical measure and the state should exercise control over these agencies, he said. The state acquisition of some federal forest land, particularly the Siuslaw national forest was recommended.

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claims against employers. The minimum penalty for bank robbers should be raised from 10 to 20 years to overcome bank banditry and holdups which he characterized as the "most serious subject confronting banking interests today." Norblad declared.

"No person should be sentenced to the penitentiary whose term of service is less than one year," Norblad declared. Half of all funds collected by counties from money collected in enforcement of prohibition laws should be turned over to the state, he recommended.

"Many estates in which there are no known heirs are being wasted under the present probate law," he said. Such estates belong to the state. Ad- visability of appointment of a public administrator was pre- sented. Relative to the fish controversy the governor said he

had always "represented the commercial fishing interests," but believed the value of the Rogue river "as a recreational stream far transcends its value as a commercial stream."
